Walker Man Dies Suddenly.

Walker, Oct. 6.—A shroud of gloom has been cast over Walker and entire vicinity on account of the death of Hon. John Wilson, who died suddenly from heart failure in Dr. Sarchett's office about eleven o'clock Sunday morning.

Mr. Wilson was up and about the same as usual, but had complained of not feeling well of late. He went up town, going up to the Masonic hall, and from there to the doctor's office, where he sat reading, waiting for the doctor to come, who was out on a call.

Another party in a room close by hearing his book fall went to him and found him lifeless in death. Help was at once summoned and all that loving hands could do was done to restore him to life, but all of no avail.

His body was taken to the home of his son, P. M. Wilson, with whom he had made his home for years.

Mr. Wilson, familiarly known by all as "Uncle Johnnie," was widely known. His pleasant ways and kind and cheery words to all had endeared him in the hearts of the people of Walker and vicinity where he had resided so many years. He was about 85 years of age.

He was the promoter of the Linn county farmers' institute, having been president ever since its organization, which is about twenty-three years, also president of the Farmers' club, prominent in Masonic circles, being a favorite in both Masonic and Eastern Star lodges.

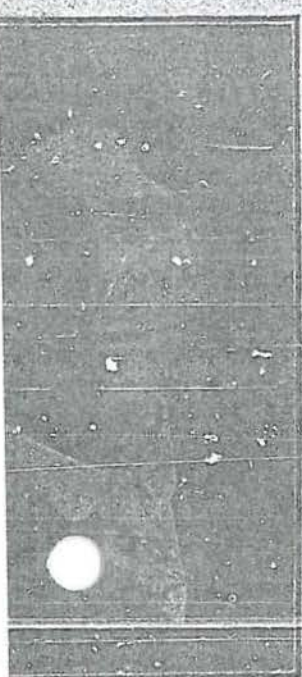

 eer lawmakers of Iowa, died at his
 home at Walker, Iowa, October 4.
 The body arrived here Wednesday
 morning and was taken to his former
 home at Lamotte for interment.

 the funeral. Mr. Wilson was born
 at Bridgton, Scotland, October 3,
 1823, and was therefore 85 years of
 age. He came to this country in
 1849 and for many years conducted a
 general store at Lamotte, his suc-
 cessor in the business being N. A.
 Hoffman. Mr. Wilson was married
 to Miss Barbara McKee, who died in
 1873. They were the parents of
 two sons and one daughter. The
 daughter, Ellen, died in 1874. The
 sons, George and Peter survive. Mr.
 Wilson was a member of the Iowa
 legislature in 1875-76, and was a man
 who was held in high regard by all

MR. SPEAKER—Your committee appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life, character and public services of Hon. John Wilson, beg leave to submit the following report:

WHEREAS, The All-Wise Father of us all removed from this earth on October 4, 1908, John Wilson, an honored member of this House from Jackson county in the Eleventh General Assembly; and

WHEREAS, The life and character of the deceased were such as to entitle him in unusual degree to the admiration and respect of all who knew him; his attainments and his success so conspicuous as to be an incentive to all men to be upright, pure and true; and his service to the state and to his fellow men of so lofty character as to command the homage of mankind, and to entitle him to the "well done, thou good and faithful servant," which is the highest benediction of the Almighty; therefore be it

Resolved: That in his career, which had its origin near Glasgow, Scotland, in 1823, and the major portion of whose eighty-four years were spent upon the prairies of our own beloved commonwealth, we recognize a type of useful, helpful living which we deem worthy of recognition and of emulation; that we admire the indomitable courage with which he lifted

himself from humble beginnings to a position of influence which gave courage and hope to others; that we commend his unselfish devotion to public and private duties and his unwavering fidelity to the cause of right and justice: that we recognize those qualities of large-hearted generosity, of tender sympathy, of wholesome good cheer and consideration for others which made him a power for good over all with whom he came in contact; and be it further

Resolved: That in token of our appreciation of his well spent life these resolutions be spread upon the Journal of the House, and that the Chief Clerk be directed to forward engrossed copies of the same to each of his two surviving sons, as evidence of the high regard in which posterity holds the memory of their father.

HON. SAMUEL H. FAIRALL.

MR. SPEAKER—Your committee appointed to draft and present resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public services of the Hon. Samuel Husband Fairall, late a member of the House of Representatives in the Ninth General Assembly and in the Senate in the Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth General Assemblies, beg leave to submit the following as their report:

Samuel Husband Fairall was born in Allegany county, Maryland, June 21, 1835. He was fifth in direct descent from Samuel Snowden, who was a member of Prince George's County Committee, to carry into execution the association of the Continental Congress. His ancestor, Richard Snowden, was Captain of the provincial forces, 1700 to 1703. After attending various academies he entered Washington College, at Washington, Pa., from which he graduated in June, 1855. Resolving to enter the legal profession at Iowa City, Iowa, he left Maryland and on October 1, 1855, he reached Iowa City. Mr. Fairall entered the office of William Penn Clark, to study law. Mr. Clark was Supreme Court Reporter at this time. On June 21, 1856, he was admitted to practice in the Supreme Court on a certificate signed by ex-Judge J. C. Hall, James Love, afterward Judge of the U. S. District Court, and Colonel Sam Marshall. In November, 1856, the young lawyer wedded Miss Ellen J. Workman, whom he wooed and won during his college days at Washington, Pa. They moved to the old homestead, east of Iowa City, in 1858, where they have since resided, raising a family of five sons and two daughters. There, a few years ago, Mrs. Fairall passed away. Leaving the law office of Mr. Clark, Mr. Fairall, in 1858, formed a partnership with Hon. J. B. Templin, one of the oldest and most prominent members of the bar. In 1861 he formed a partnership with Hon. Geo. J. Boal, until 1873, the firm becoming one of the prominent law firms of the west, having a large lucrative practice in state and federal courts.

La Motte; he was born in 1829, in Ireland; in 1845, he came to Galena and remained there and in Dubuque till 1874, when he removed to Jackson Co.; he owns 230 acres of land; he has improved it with all the buildings there is on the farm since coming here. Married Ann Riley in 1857; she was born in Ireland and came to America about the age of 9 years; they had nine children, six living—James P., Bridgett M., William E., Mary A., Martin J. and Michael E.

F. E. SMITH, school-teacher, La Motte; born May 22, 1852, in Addison Co., Vt.; in about 1858, he came with his parents to Fond du Lac, Wis.; he commenced attending school at about the age of 7 years; continued about eight years; he then attended the Pooler Institute, graduated in 1870, then attended the Lawrence University at Appleton, Wis., about one year; at the age of 18, he commenced teaching; has followed this profession since; he has taught in La Motte about three years. Married Miss Ida Kellogg in 1872; she was born in Ripon, Wis.

ANTONE SEYLEE, farmer, Sec. 7; P. O. St. Donatus; born in Luxemburg, Germany, in 1831; came to America in 1853, and now owns 290 acres. His wife, Elizabeth Karnsdorf, was born in Germany in 1831; came to America in 1852; married at St. Donatus in 1859; they have six children—Dominick, Frank, Nick, Peter, Mary and Margaret.

CHRISTIAN VAN DEN ACKER, carpenter and farmer, Sec. 19; P. O. Duke; born Aug. 15, 1819, in Holland; in 1846, he came to New York City; followed stair-building till 1857, when he came to Bellevue; followed the carpenter trade there till 1863, when he removed to his present farm, consisting of forty acres of land; he also continues the carpenter trade here. He married Grada E. Van Keeken in 1841; she was born in 1820, in Holland; have ten children, six sons and four daughters.

LEZAPSHAN VEACH, farmer, Sec. 23; P. O. La Motte; born in Bourbon Co., Ky., Sept. 18, 1813; came to Illinois in 1815, to Wisconsin in 1835 and to Iowa in 1837 and entered land in Tete des Morts Township; sold out and came to this place in 1853 and now owns 160 acres. His wife, Barbara Martin, was born in 1828; came to America when young and married Sept. 5, 1842; they have eight children—John, Mary, Sylvester, Eliza, Jennie, William, James and Edward. Has been School Director of the La Motte Independent District and Justice of the Peace.

HERMANN WARNKE, farmer, Sec. 35; P. O. St. Donatus; born July, 1846, in Hanover, Germany; in 1869, he came to Jackson Co.; he owns 100 acres of land. Married Christina Lampe in 1874; she was born in Bellevue Township; have three children—John F., Hermann B. and William S.

HON. JOHN WILSON, Postmaster and dealer in general merchandise, La Motte; born Oct. 11, 1823, in Bridgeton, near Glasgow, Scotland; in 1849, he came to Bellevue; afterward removed to Lake Co., Ill., where he remained till the spring of 1851, when he returned to Jackson Co.; engaged in farming till 1866, when he removed to La Motte and commenced his present business; in 1873, he was appointed Postmaster, although he has always assisted in the duties of this office since coming to La Motte; he has been several terms a member of the Board of County Supervisors; he represented this county in the Legislature during the session of 1877, and has held various minor offices. He married Miss Barbara McKay in 1849; she was also a native of Scotland; they had three children, two living—Peter M. and William G.; lost Ellen in 1874, aged 21 years. Republican.

GEORGE W. WILSON, farmer; P. O. La Motte; born Oct. 3, 1823, in Worcester Co., Mass.; in 1849, he came to La Motte, and has been a resident here ever since; he owns eighty acres of land, also three acres in town. He has been engaged for the past twenty-five years in threshing grain and clover, and owned the first threshing machine in the county; he owns the Burdsell clover-huller, which is the only one in the county, and has run it fourteen winters. When about 12 years of age, he commenced to learn the stonemason's trade; followed it several years. He has been President of the School Board. Married Miss E. C. Baker in November, 1846; she was born in 1823, in Worcester Co., Mass.

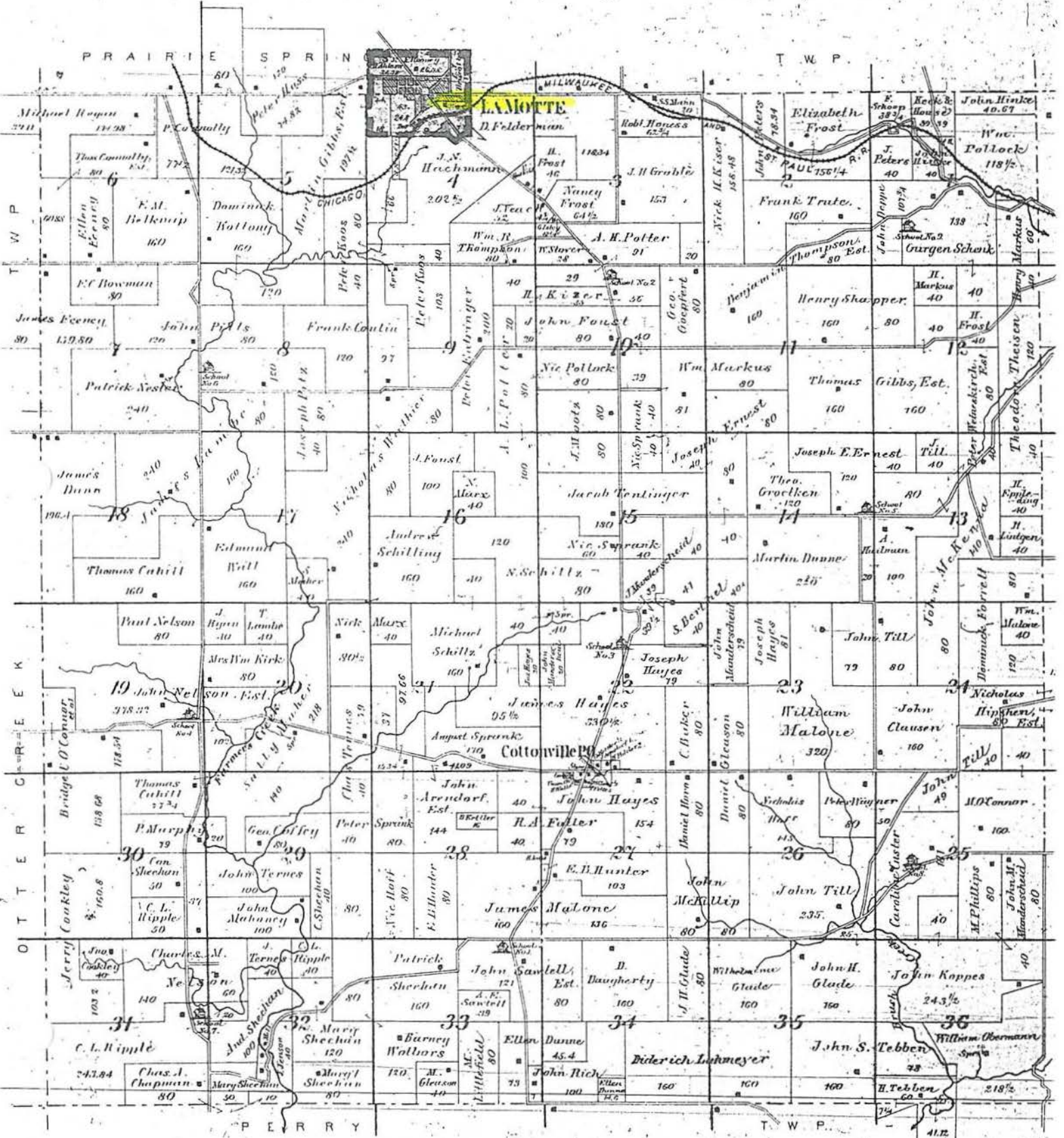

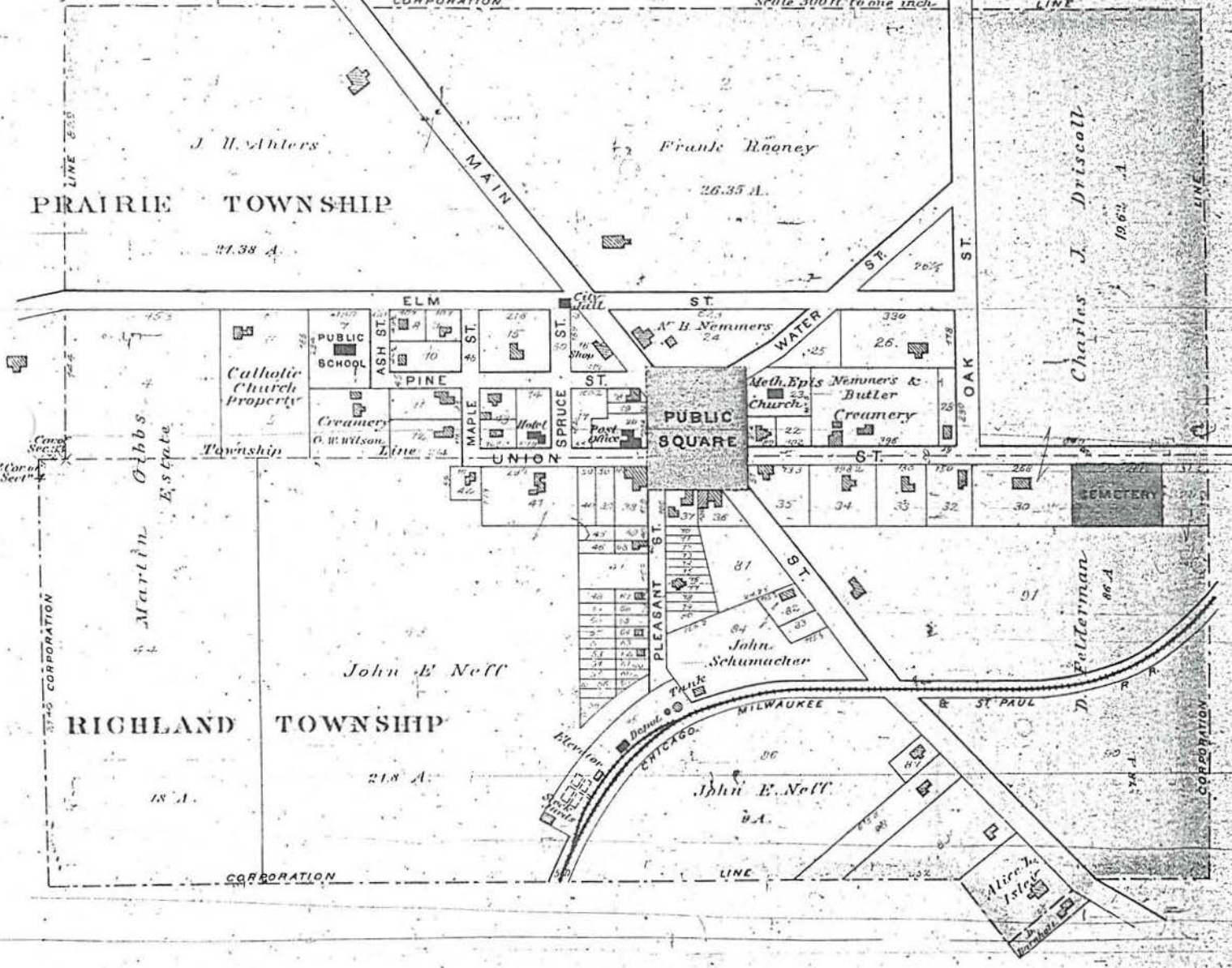


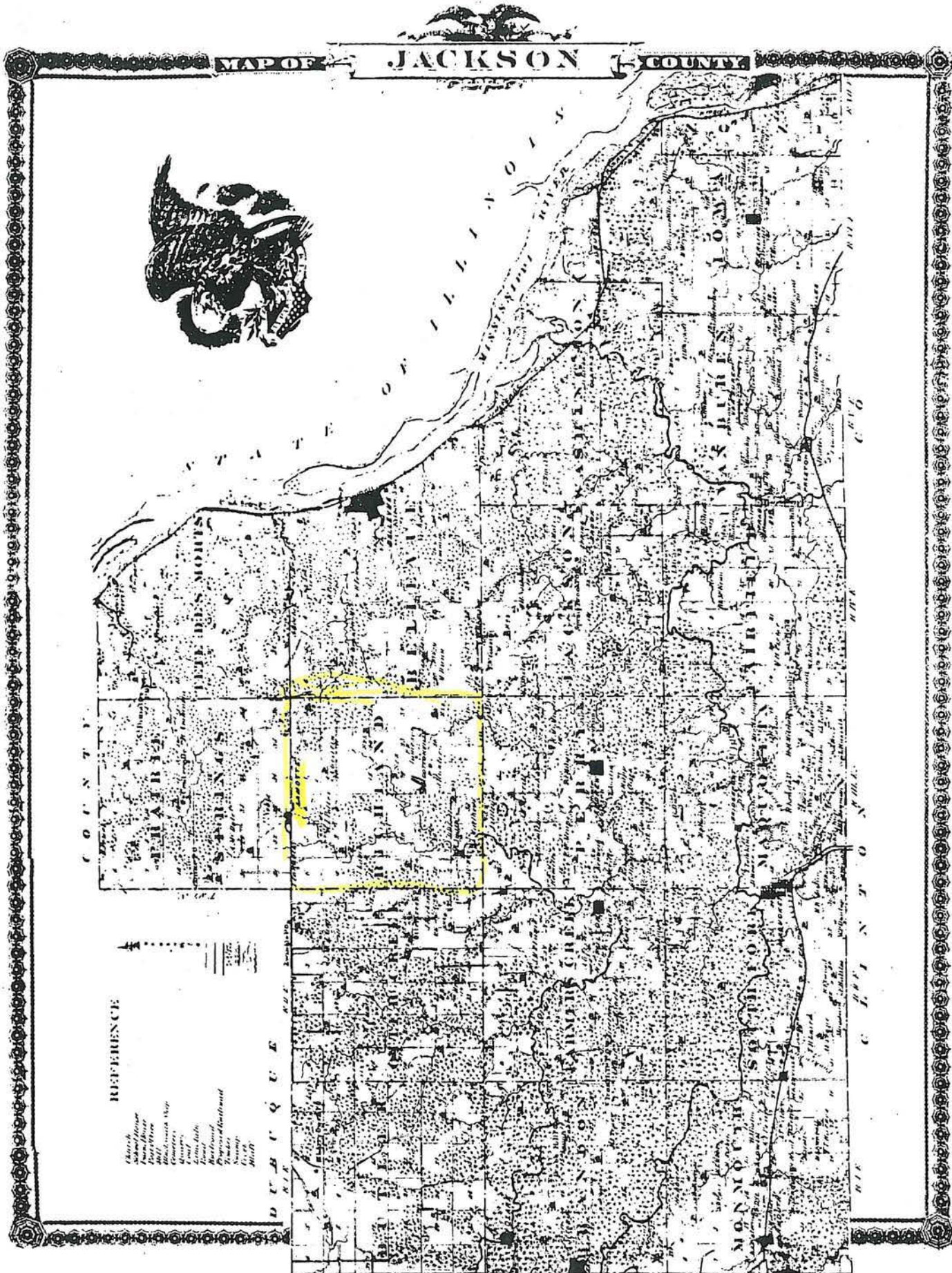

1. COTTONVILLE SECTION 27 Known as "Little Arlington" because so many Civil War veterans were buried there or stones erected in the memory of a deceased veteran. Had not been cared for many years, but was given a through clean-up in 1928 and again in the late 1970s. Since that time has been cated for by neighbors. WPA List/1940 Veterans List/1936 Cemetery survey and index.
2. EAST HILL CATHOLIC SECTION 04 WPA List/1940 Veterans List/1936 Located on the east edge of LaMotte. Well maintained for very old cemetery Has quite a few broken old stones. Survey and map.
3. DORR SECTION 22 Burials have not been noted in any previous atlas or by the WPA. Earliest burial stone Arlene Abbot daughter of Joseph and Sabrina Dorr, died July 26, 1846 at age of 26 years. Many members of the Branholt, and Heddingers families.

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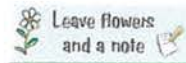
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
