AN OLD SOLDIER IS DEAD.

Maj. Andrews Dies After a Severe Illness of Over a Month's Duration.

The death at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon of Maj. J. Andrews, while not unexpected is sad news to his many friends in this city. The fatal illness dates back about a month, although the Major hasn't been in good health for two years, when he had a severe attack of the grip.

Major Andrews has been a familiar figure in Davenport and Scott county politics since 1869, with the exception of a few years spent in Kansas. He was born in Providence, Rhode Island, in 1833 and came to Iowa for the first time in 1855. The following year he went to Ohio where he was married to Miss Elizabeth S. Dunbar. In 1858 he returned to Iowa settling on a farm near What Cheer, Keokuk county. He organized company F Eighth Iowa Infantry and took field in August 1861. The following February he was promoted to the rank of major. In the battle of Shiloh he received a wound in the head which incapacitated him for further service and he was honorably discharged. He died the bullet received during that battle to his dying day. After the war he represented Keokuk county in the Grand Assembly for two years, and two years was county clerk. He returned to Davenport in 1869 and engaged in the commission business. In 1876 was elected clerk of the District and circuit courts by a majority of 38, which his re-election was increased to 14. He was a straight forward Republican and a good man. His first wife after a married life of eight years - their three children are now dead. His second wife, a sister of the first six children, survive.

DEATH'S SUMMONS.

IT CALLS MAJOR J. ANDREWS TO THE LONG REST.

The Result of Successive Attacks of Grippe--A Sketch of his Life--His Army Record--Wounded at Shiloh--In the State Legislature.

Hundreds of friends will be saddened by the news conveyed in this announcement of the death of Major Joseph Andrews, which occurred at his home on High street Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Mr. Andrews was a long-time resident of Davenport, with a record in army and civil and private life of which any man might be proud, and the progress of his illness has been marked with great solicitude by his many friends. Death did not come without warning, however, and for a few days the end has been only a question of time.

HIS ILLNESS

The cause of death was a protracted attack of la grippe. When the malady was in its prevalent and malignant form two years ago the deceased was one of the many who were prostrated by it, and he was subjected to an attack the winter following. This spring the periodical visitation was repeated, and about a month ago the sufferer's condition became such as to confine him to his home. He has gradually become worse, his lungs finally succumbing to the repeated attacks of the disease, until the end was seen to be inevitable. Prior to his first attack of the grippe the Major had known hardly a day of sickness in all his life.

EARLY LIFE.

The subject of this sketch was born in Providence, R. I., April 12, 1833. He came west in 1855, spending the winter of that year in Fayette county, Iowa, and going back east as far as Ohio in '56. There he was married in the same

and hither he returned to live out the years of life that remained to him. Had it not been for the scourge of la grippe this would have meant years of usefulness.

Of a naturally quiet and modest disposition, it has remained for the chronicler of his life's history to call to public notice this interesting career. The major was not fond of talking of himself, and it was by his closest friends that he was best appreciated.

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HIS ARMY RECORD.

It was a short but honorable one. Soon after the outbreak of the war he organized Company F, 8th Iowa infantry, and was made its captain. The company took the field in August, 1861, and in the following February its captain was promoted to the rank of major. That was the end of promotion, however, for at the battle of Shiloh, April 6, 1862, the major received a gun shot wound in the head that rendered him incapable of further service during the struggle. The ball entered the left side of the head, back of the ear, penetrated the skull, and the major carried it with him to the day of his death. For some months after his injury he could not keep his equilibrium; he would immediately fall over upon his right side when he rose upon his feet. A year afterward he could only walk by using two canes, and to his last day, although his recovery was almost complete, he was troubled thus when excessively fatigued. He was granted an honorable discharge from the service of the cause for which he suffered so much.

HIS PUBLIC CAREER.

In 1864 the people of Keokuk county honored the major by electing him their representative in the general assembly of the state. He served two years and was then elected county clerk for two years, removing from his farm into the town of Sigourney in order to assume the duties of the office. He removed to Davenport in April, 1869, and engaged in the commission business

Joseph Andrews, Clerk of the District and Circuit Courts of Scott County, was born in Providence, R. I., April 12, 1833. He is the son of George Andrews, a descendant of Welsh stock. The first ancestor, John Andrews, came from Wales to this country in 1663, married in Boston and settled in Massachusetts, and the five generations, of which Joseph is the last, have always lived in the New England States. His father, George Andrews, married Miss Cornelia Augusta Lippitt, of English descent, whose ancestors came to this country about the same time as the Andrews. They were the parents of six children, all living, of whom Joseph is the fourth child. He performed the duties of clerk and book-keeper in a large shipping house for five years in Providence; came West in 1855 and spent the winter of that year in Fayette Co., Iowa; from there went to Ohio in 1856; he was there married the same year in Noble County, to Elizabeth S. Dunbar. In 1858 they moved to Keokuk Co., Iowa. Mr. Andrews enlisted, as captain of Co. F, 8th Iowa Inf. in August, 1861, was promoted to Major in February, 1862. He was severely wounded at the battle of Shiloh, on the afternoon of April 6, 1862, by gun shot in the left side of the head, back of the ear and penetrating the skull, which ball he still carries in the occipital bone. He went to his native State to have it extracted, but the surgeons decided that it would be best not to undertake it. He for some months lost complete control of his equilibrium, could not stand, but would immediately fall to the right side; it was for more than a year before he could walk without the aid of two canes; he is still troubled in this way when fatigued. It injured his auditory and optic action. He resigned from the army in February, 1863. In 1864 he was elected a member of the Iowa General Assembly from Keokuk County.
