Respected Citizen Laid Away.

Monroe County lost a pioneer citizen of the highest type last Thursday when John Clark aged 88 years quietly and peacefully slept his life away at his home on west Jefferson street. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. E. L. Schreiner and the I. O. O. F. lodge Saturday afternoon. A host of grieving friends were present to pay their last respects to the departed pioneer.

John Clark was born Dec. 9th 1817 in Oxford Worcester Co. Mass. When quite young his parents moved to Conn. at 16 years of age then went to New York to live in 1841. He came to Iowa with his uncle W. G. Clark in 1843 and came to Monroe Co. where he has always resided. In 1850 he was married to Sarah Bishop. To this union 5 children was born Mrs. Morgan Edwards of Centerville Mrs. W. A. Eastlack, of Moravia, Mrs. J. B. Dunkin of Albia, Mrs. Harry Gutch of Lovilia, and Olive Clark. In 1845 he was elected first sheriff of Kiskekosk Co. now Monroe county then he held the office of supervisor for about fifteen years. He was elected representative of Monroe county in the 10th general assembly. He joined the I. O. O. F. at Eddyville in 1854 and in 1855 he was one of the charter members to organize the Monroe lodge No. 8 of which he has always been a member. A more complete obituary next week.

A PIONEER GONE.

Another Aged and Respected Citizen
Has Fallen Asleep.

In the death of Hon. John Clark Albia
and Monroe county loses a citizen of
noble worth and humanity a
sympathizing friend. For several weeks
"Uncle John" as he was familiarly
known throughout the community suf-
fered under the strain of the continued
warm weather and was most of the time
confined to his bed. His family felt
some apprehension from the beginning
of his illness, but were constantly re-
minded by him that at his age it made
little difference whether he survived the
summer's heat or departed to that coun-
try for which he had made a lifetime
preparation. All was well; his house
was in order; there were no regrets; he
had lived and labored, and learned and
enjoyed; his measure of life was full;
death had no terrors and he welcomed
the change as he would a journey into a
beautiful new and untried country.

Such were his expressed thoughts be-
fore departing this life and when the
final summons came he urged them not
to grieve but be of good cheer, for he
was safe in the everlasting arms of the
Master of divine love, and on Thursday
evening, August 2, 1906, his end came
peacefully at 6:15 o'clock and he pass-
ed to that bourne whence no traveler re-
turns.

The funeral was conducted from his
late residence on West Jefferson street,
Rev. E. L. Schreiner officiating. The
services were short and simple and the
speaker expressed the sentiments of the
entire community in his short eulogy
upon the life and character of the de-
ceased, whose record was a fit example
of christian fortitude and manly courage
for others to imitate. He read William
Cullen Bryant's "Aged Man" as a fitting
close to the memory of the departed
brother and friend.
