DR. E. B. FENN DEAD.

One of the Oldest Citizens of Osage County Gone.

It is with great regret and sorrow that we record the death of Dr E. B. Fenn to-day. He died Monday night, May 30th 1892, after an illness of three or four weeks. He was one of our best and most prominent citizens-a man who was loved and respected by all who knew him, and one who had occupied a number of important and prominent positions of public trust which he filled with honor and efficiency. In his death the family loses a kind and indulgent husband and father, and the community a loyal citizen and safe counsellor. Dr Fenn leaves a wife and two children, both of whom are married. His son, Geo. P. Fenn resides at Williamsburg, Kansas, and his daughter, Mrs. Jeff Waddle, in this city. The family has the sincere sympathy of a large circle of grief stricken friends, in this hour of trouble and sorrow. The funeral took place from the Presbyterian church, of which the deceased was a faithful member, yesterday afternoon under the charge of the G. A. R. and Masonic orders Rev. Barbor officiating clergyman, assisted by Rev. Boyd of the M. E. church. The church was well filled with sympathizing friends, and Rev. Barbor preached one of the best funeral sermons we ever heard, and from it we extract the following biographical sketch and a few of his comments on the life of the deceased:

It is not best, as a rule, to indulge in extended personal references on occasions like this, but surely, if rules have their exceptions, we may vary from the rule to day.

Our Comrade and Brother, Elbridge Burk Fenn, whose decease we mourn to-day, was born and reared on a farm in Niagra county, New York, in September, 1830. He got the rudiments of his education in the district school and to some extent, while a young man, was engaged in teaching. He also for some time attended an academy in Wiscon-

While yet a young man he decided to enter upon the profession of medicine and in the preparition for this he attended the Western Reserve Medical College at Cleveland, Ohio.

In 1857, being then 27 years of age settled in the practice of his profession at Iowa Center, Iowa; he was married to Miss Elizabeth W. Cochrane, of lowa Center, Iowa, who to-day survives him as the chief mourner of this oc-

wise and level-headed, honest and conscientious. Hence he was successful and trustworthy and safe as a physician; wise and of good judgment as a counsellor and Ruling Elder in the church; efficient and trustworthy in whatever position he occupied. I need not say that as husband and father, friend and neighbor, he was greatly beloved.

But I wish, most of all, to speak of his character as a Christian. It is not enough to say that he had long been an active Ruling Elder in the Presbyterian church, here and elsewhere, we must add to this the fact that in his every day life he habitually exhibited the Christ-like traits. For some years the broken condition of his health has in-terferred with his Christian activi-ties, but I have never known him to-refuse any duty of which he was capable, and whether he was able to respond to the calls of duty or not, he dways evinced a zeal and love for the Lord's work. His tlesh was weak but his Spirit was always willing.

One thing that much impressed me was his Christ-like spirit of forgivness. I remember a few occasions when he has frankly told me, as his Pastor, that he felt that he had been ill-treated by friends or neighbors, but he only seemed to speak of it because he was worried and vexed. He never, to my knowledge, manifested a spirit of resentment. He allowed all such things to pass, yielding meekly and cherishing no spirit of malice. His impulses were too noble and generous for anything

Now, I speak of these things because they help us to be resigned to-day to the will of Heaven. It is all the harder to part company from him because of his beautiful character, but when we mist do so, there is infinite satisfaction in the thought that our loss is his gain. Our golden text to day says: "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord." He died in the Lord. We have no shadow of doubt on that point. And so we contemplate him as "blessed."

Blessed—what does that mean in his

At the close of the ceremonies at the church, notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather, a large concourse of friends followed the remains of the deceased to their last earthly resting place, where the last sad and sorrowful rites to a good and noble citizen were performed by Post No. 19, G. In the provi-dence of God he was led to engage for a time in the newspaper business in Panora, Iowa. He also served two terms as a member of the legislature of that state and was for a time Superintendent of Public Instruction. One thing in his life that he often referred to with great satisfaction to himself was the fact that while he was a member of the Iowa legislature he was the author of a resolution by which the word "white" was stricken from the state constitution.

When the war broke out he was appointed and served for a time as I'rovost Marshal of his dirtrict. He then enlisted in the 4th Iowa Infantry and served for three years as a soldier, all of which time he served as hospital stewart.

In 1866 he came to Kansas and located at what is now the town of Quenemo, then the Agency of the Sac & Fox Indians. He there held the position of Post physician and surgeon under the government.

Eight years later, in 1874, he came to Lyndon and entered upon the practice of medicine. Here, in the newly settled condition of the country, his duties were extremely arduous, requiring him to travel long distances and frequently pass days and nights without rest. Hence at the end of five years he accepted a re-appointment to his position among the Sac & Fox Indians then re-moved to their new reservation in the Territory. He served there for six years more, greatly esteemed and loved by the Indians, among whom he acted as both physical and spiritual advisor, and in 1885 he returned with his family to Lyndon, where, altho' broken in health, he has been actively engaged in the duties of his profession and as secretary of the Board of Examiners for Pensions until a few days ago.

Altho' we all saw and contemplated with apprehension the signs of his fall-ing health, we realized not that the time of his departure was so near. The news the other evening that he was dying came like a shock. The whole community is bowed in grief. We have been called to give up one of our oldest and worthiest citizens. It is sad to contemplate that his familiar form will be seen among us no more forever! That those who sought him in the hour of affliction and distress will seek him in vain! That no more in church or society shall we enjoy his genial companionahip. Truly may we say to-day, as a community, that we have suffered a great loss.
