OBITUARY.

Rebecca C. Penniwell

was born January 26, 1842, in Marion township, Fayette county, Ohio, and died at her late home in Leon, Iowa, March 27, 1904, being 62 years, 1 month and 20 days old. She was the twin sister of Mrs. Sarah J. Bridges, who died at Seattle, Washington, March 25, 1903, both of whom were daughters of Solomon and Catherine Penniwell, who died in Leon several years ago.

The deceased lived with her parents in the neighborhood where she was born from infancy until past 13 years old, when in the fall of 1855 she came with the other members of the family, to Decatur county, Iowa, where, with the exception of about two years spent in Des Moines, Iowa, she has lived ever since.

She was united in marriage to Samuel H. Lorey, who survives her, on the 24th of March 1861. To this union were born 10 children, namely, Frank P., Irma, Sallie C., William S., Minnie B., Glen K., May M., Claud L., Forest L., Helen L., all of whom survive her but Irma and Glen, who died several years ago.

Mrs. Lorey has always been a quiet and peaceable neighbor. She never made any extra claim to extra goodness, but always took the "Golden Rule" as her guide in life. The deceased was converted in early life and many years has been a member of the Methodist church, and lived a consistent christian life, holding on to her profession of faith through many trials and disappointments. She has ever been a help meet to her husband, and a kind and indulgent mother to her children. She will be missed by them who knew her best. She died as she had lived in peace. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. I. N. Woodward, and the lady was laid to rest in the Leon cemetery on Tuesday, March 29, 1904.

Wm. C. Garrett.

Decatur City is called upon to mourn the loss of one of her aged citizens, in the person of Wm. C. Garrett.

Wm. Carlyle Garrett, was born in Hyland county, Ohio, July 1, 1823, and died in Decatur Iowa, on Tuesday, March 22, 1904, aged 80 years, 8 months and 21 days. Mr. Garrett was the fourth child of Robert W. and Sarah I. Garrett. His early life was spent in his native state where he was united in marriage with Elizabeth Spencer in 1846. She died in March, 1859. To this union five children were born—

Living except Louisa I., who died March 21, 1872.

Mr. Garrett was united in marriage with Rachel Stella Yost, October 20, 1859. She died March 15, 1898. To this union four children were born, Clyde W., Burgess W., Sarah A. and Eva A., all of whom survive him. In 1851 Mr. Garrett came to Iowa and settled in Van Buren county, where in the fall of 1863 he was elected to represent Van Buren county in the Fourth General Assembly. In the spring of 1867, having sold his farm in Van Buren county, he removed to Davis county where he resided until March 1882, when he removed to Decatur county which has since been his home. He was a man of sterling qualities and deep convictions, kind and gentle, yet true and strong in his denunciation of evil. He was of the type of whom pioneers are made. The kind from whom

come the sons and daughters who will be loyal and true to God and native land.

The funeral services were held from the Christian church in Decatur at 10 o'clock a. m., Thursday March 24, S. B. Ross and Rev. Hecathorn officiating. Music by the choirs of the M. E. and Christian churches.
