SAMUEL M'CALL IS DEAD

Well Known and Prominent Resident
of an Early Day Passes Away
at Santa Monica, Cal-
ifornia

Word has been received in this city of the death of Samuel B. McCall, a well known and prominent resident of Boone Co. in an early day, who passed away at the soldiers' home at Santa Monica, California, on March 5th. The funeral was held on March 7th and the remains laid to rest in the cemetery at that place.

The deceased was one of the pioneers of Boone county and came here with the family in 1846. He took an active part in the political life of the early days and served as the first clerk of the courts of the county. He was a soldier of the civil war and also of the Mexican war. At the close of the civil war he retired with the rank of captain. Forty years ago he removed from the county and went west. For many years he has been at the soldiers' home at Santa Monica. He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Margaret Parks, of this city and William McCall of Moin-gona.

Three fires within twenty-four hours was an event in this city Tuesday and Wednesday. The first fire occurred at 1127 Seventh street, on Tuesday afternoon and was caused by a gas man working in the basement of the building opening the gas pipe and the gas igniting from the lighted candle. Biographical Sketch of S. B. McCall

(By C. L. Lucas)

Among the men whose acts made up the history of Boone county, Iowa for the first twenty years, following its organization there was none more prominent than Hon. S. B. McCall. That the people of the county during this period held him in high esteem, is evidenced by the number of times they placed him in official position, by their suffrages.

S. B. McCall was born in the state of Indiana in the year 1828 and moved to Dallas county, Iowa, in 1846, and to Boone county in the spring of 1847 which was two years before the county was organized. He was the first man to act on an official capacity in the county. On the 8th of May, 1849, he was appointed organizing sheriff of Boone county by William McKay, at that time judge of the 5th judicial district of the state and who resided at Fort Des Moines. Judge McKay designated the first Monday in August 1849, as the day on which a special election should be held.

Among the duties which by law fell to the lot of Sheriff McCall, was, the division of the county into as many voting precincts, or townships, as the necessity of the people required, and to give names of those townships and designate the places at which the electors of each township should meet to cast their votes. Accordingly he divided the county into three townships of equal size. The south one-third of the county was named Pleasant township and the place named for holding the election was Belle Point. The central one-third was named Boone township and the place of voting was the house of John M. Crooks, now about a mile south of the corporate limits of Boone. The north one-third of the county was named Boone river township and the place of voting was the house of Thomas McNeal.

The name of Mr. McNeal did not appear among the county officers elected at this special election, but two years later, in 1851, he was elected county

But the company did not march many miles until it ascertained that there were no Sioux Indians in the state at that time, and after being out but a few days the company returned home and disbanded.

When the civil war broke out in the spring of 1861, Judge McCall was the first man in Boone county to call for volunteers to go south to put down the rebellion. He was first Lieutenant of Company E, Third Regiment, Iowa volunteers, when that regiment was mustered into the service June 10 1861. He was promoted captain of the company June 26, 1861, which position he held until June 18, 1864 at which time he was mustered out of the service, having served three years.

With the company Captain McCall was in a number of skirmishes in north Missouri, among which may be mentioned Shelbyville, Hagers Woods, the routing of Martin Green at Kirksville, and Blue Mills landing, the latter being rather a hard fought battle.

After these engagements the regiment was assigned to duty further south, where in time it took part in the hard fought battles of Shiloh, at Corinth and at the capture of Vicksburg.

Why it was that Captain McCall was not promoted to a higher position during his three years active service is rather surprising, but it must be remembered that neither Captain Berry, Captain Williams nor Captain DeTarr, the other three captains who went from Boone county, were promoted.

In 1863 being then in the service and at the front Captain McCall was elected to the legislature of Iowa, by the republicans of Boone and Greene counties. It will be seen by this, that Captain McCall who had always been a staunch democrat changed his politics while in the army and since then has been a staunch republican.

After retiring from the service he was appointed a Brevet Major of the 1st Iowa Cavalry, and he held to the close of the war. When

The name of Mr. McNeal did not appear among the county officers elected at this special election, but two years later, in 1851, he was elected county judge and was again elected in 1853. In 1851 he was elected a member of the lower house of the Iowa legislature by the voters of Boone, Green and Story counties. At this date he resigned the office of county judge and was succeeded by J. B. Montgomery.

In 1857, Mr. McCall was again elected county judge and during the two years of this term many changes of the boundaries and names of the townships were made.

For several years preceding the civil war Judge McCall was officially connected with the state militia. At the time of the big Indian scare in the spring of 1857, Judge McCall was captain of a company of men called the Boonsboro Tigers, which went north to beat back a supposed invasion of the Sioux Indians, and to protect the settlers from the barbarous treatment of those relentless savages.

At that time he was mustered out of the service, having served three years.

With the company Captain McCall was in a number of skirmishes in north Missouri, among which may be mentioned Shelbyville, Hagers Woods, the routing of Martin Green at Kirksville, and Blue Mills landing, the latter being rather a hard fought battle.

After these engagements the regiment was assigned to duty further south, where in time it took part in the hard fought battles of Shiloh, at Corinth and at the capture of Vicksburg.

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After retiring from the service he was appointed a Brevet Major of United States volunteers which place he held to the close of the war. When Boonesboro was incorporated in 1865, Captain McCall was elected city recorder. In 1865 he was the republican candidate for county judge, but was defeated by M. K. Ramsey.

About the year 1870 he went west. For a number of years he held a position at the Soldiers' home at Santa Monica, California. This position he held about sixteen years, when the duties of the office became so burdensome for him that he resigned, but continued to be an inmate of the home up to the time of his death which occurred March the 5th, 1911, aged 83 years.

Captain McCall was a man of good ability, of prepossessing personal appearance and in both his private dealing and public acts was strictly honest. None of his official acts were ever called in question. Boone county never had a more deserving man.

INTERESTING LIFE SKETCH BY
HON. A. J. BARKLEY.

MR BARKLEY WAS A

He had the county seat located on nw¼ section 29, township 84, range 26 in 1851 and named the town Boonsboro. In March, 1857, he led a company of men into northern Iowa to protect the settlers who had suffered at the hands of the Indians about the time of the Spirit Lake massacre. Twice he represented the county in the legislature, first at Iowa City and later at Des Moines. He was captain of Co. E, 3rd Iowa infantry during the Civil War. At one time he served as deputy county treasurer and under Johnson was revenue collector. He possessed a magnificent physique, tall, broad-shouldered and straight as an arrow, with much of that quiet, easy dignity ascribed to Daniel Webster and General Augustus Caesar Dodge. Regret Delaying of Statehood
I regret that Arizona was not admitted to statehood by the last congress, and I trust that the next congress will admit it," Colonel Roosevelt began. "The objections to admit it I regard as without warrant of fact. Apparently these objections have been chiefly or entirely due to the fact that Arizona has adopted its constitution the referendum, initiative and recall.

I do not agree with the form which Arizona adopted the recall, especially as regards the judiciary; while I regret that Arizona should have adopted the recall in this fashion I not merely admit but insist that is a matter purely for Arizona's decision, and that neither the opinion of myself nor any other outsider has the slightest bearing on Arizona's right to the privileges of statehood. What the views of New York or Texas upon the question may be nothing whatever to do with Arizona's right to its own views.

State Judge of Own Needs.
"The principles of the initiative referendum may or may not be adapted to the needs of a given state under given conditions—I believe they are useful in some communities and not in others—but to deny a territory the right of statehood because it has adopted these principles is as wrong as to say that Vermont should not be admitted because its governmental system is based on the principle of the initiative and referendum meeting.

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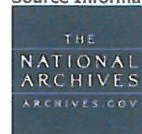
