




OBITUARY.

William Sanderson was born in N. Y. City February 2, 1828, and died in Anamosa, Iowa, Aug. 13, 1907, aged 79 years, 6 months, and one day. Mr. Sanderson was of English descent, and a man of more than ordinary scholastic attainments, having completed a full college course and a course in law. For a number of years he followed the profession of a teacher, having been at one time at the head of the public schools of LeClaire, in Scott county, which county he later represented in the state legislature.

Before taking up his college work Mr. Sanderson had mastered the cabinet maker and builder's trades. These in connection with his other attainments, gave him a prominent place in the construction of the Iowa State Capitol building.

His wife having passed on before, and himself broken in health, he, a number of years ago, retired from active life and made his home with his only son and child, J. H. Sanderson, now superintendent of the prison farm near this city, where, after a brief illness, caused by a partial sunstroke, he passed away as above indicated.

Mr. Sanderson was a member of the Baptist church, and up to his last brief illness found daily comfort in his Greek Bible, which was his constant companion. He also spent much time with Schiller and Gibbon.

He leaves one brother and one sister, both living in New York, and the family of his son, who cared for him in his declining years and ministered to him most tenderly in his last illness. A sister preceded him to the silent land several weeks ago.

Those who knew him well and best speak of him as a kind father and loving husband. He has gone from us. Peace to his ashes.

The funeral services were held at the residence of the son, on the prison farm, yesterday at 2:30 P. M., conducted by Rev. C. H. Beaver, of the Congregational Church. The order of exercises was as follows:

Hymn, "Rock of Ages;" Scripture sentences and lesson; prayer; Hymn, "One by One;" obituary and remarks; prayer; Hymn, "Over There."

The text was Rev. 22:5—"And there shall be no night there." This was suggested, Mr. Beaver said, by the fact of the sunstroke above referred to and the clouded mental faculties following until death came and opened the door of the nightless world on high. Darkness is the symbol of ignorance, and as we all see through a glass darkly here the perpetual light of Heaven comes to us emblematic of joy, the place where evil is excluded and we have companionship with all the holy ones. Are we all prepared for that home of the sainted dead? This is only a very brief outline of a most comforting presentation by Mr. Beaver.

The friends then reviewed the calm face of the departed and interment and the benediction followed at Riverside.

The choir consisted of Mrs. H. G. A. Harper, Mrs. J. D. Cunningham, Rev. C. H. Beaver and T. E. Booth, with Mrs. W. B. Skinner at the piano.


