D. M. FIRE MAY ABANDON EAST

The Retirement of Robert Howell From General Agency May Bring Change.

Robert Howell, general agent in the east for the Hawkeye Fire Insurance company, with headquarters in Philadelphia, will retire from the general agency business January 1 to become special agent in the east for the same company. Mr. Howell, a brother of President H. B. Howell, with Harry Skinner, son of the vice president, established the eastern department of the Hawkeye two years ago. Mr. Skinner retired to become special agent for the Spring Garden.

As the result of Mr. Howell's retirement it is likely that the Des Moines Fire Insurance company will withdraw from Delaware and New Jersey, where it has been represented by the Howell general agency. The company has not decided definitely to leave this field, though it has considered the matter. It is not eligible for entrance into any additional eastern territory except Maryland.

T. A. Robinson, Iowa state agent for the Royal, has resigned, and in the future will devote his time to his private affairs. C. R. Tyrrell, special agent for western Iowa, succeeds him.

DAYTON, O., Dec. 28.—Charles M. Anderson, former member of congress, the Third Ohio district, died at his home in Greenville today. He had been resident manager of the central branch of the Soldiers' home for twenty years.

LEWIS HOLLINGSWORTH IS DEAD

Man Long Resident of Des Moines and Well Known in City Passes Away.

Lewis Hollingsworth, for many years a resident of Des Moines and well known in the city, died yesterday at his residence, 344 West Nineteenth street.

He was born at Columbiana, O., March 5, 1831; spent his boyhood and early manhood near Salem, O., and came to Iowa in 1854, locating at Shanghai, now Coal Creek, Ia., in Keokuk county. He was

married in 1853 to Miss Hannah C. Fawcett. During the civil war Mr. Hollingsworth was a member of the legislature. He was a strong abolitionist and when a young man was active as a member of the "underground railway." He later held several county offices in Keokuk county. In 1870 he removed to Sigourney, where he made his home until his removal with his family to Des Moines in 1891.

He is survived by his wife and two children, Mrs. Luella Harris of Salem, O., and Horace Hollingsworth of Des Moines, as well as a sister, Mrs. Margaret H. Van Law of Zaneville, O. He was a prominent member of the Methodist church, with which he united many years ago.

Funeral services will be held from the late residence, 344 West Nineteenth street, Wednesday morning at 10:30 o'clock, the Rev. O. W. Pifer officiating. The services will be conducted under the auspices of the Masonic order with the Master Masons and Knights Templar in charge.

NESS TO FIGHT BAILIFFS

Sheriff Elect to Demur to Petition of Men Who Seek Shield in Soldiers' Preference.

Sheriff-elect Ben Ness is preparing to demur to the petition filed by Bailiffs Springor and DeFord, who are seeking to hold their places under the old soldiers' preference act. Mr. Ness contends that when Sheriff Loper's term expires, the terms of the bailiffs expire also. They are therefore not hold-overs in any sense, so that the men he names are not named as take their places, but to succeed them. This, he contends, disposes of the claim that he is ousting them, when as a matter of fact, he contends, they are ousted by the running out of their terms. Efforts are being made to have the case tried this week.
