**DR. HOLYOKE DEAD.**

We are pained to learn of the sudden death  
 of Dr. Thomas Holyoke, of Grinnell, of par-  
 alysis, which occurred about 8 o'clock on the  
 evening of the 10th instant, (last Saturday).  
 The Dr. had been in his usual health the day  
 before, except that, we learn that he ex-  
 pressed himself to his friends as believing  
 that he had symptoms of paralysis during  
 Friday, and that same evening he was strick-  
 en with the terrible disease, which paralyzed  
 one half of his body. Lingered all day Sat-  
 urday suffering from the effects of the first  
 stroke, and died at about the hour before  
 mentioned.

Dr. Holyoke was one of the pioneer citi-  
 zens of Grinnell, who accompanied the Hon.  
 J. B. Grinnell, and assisted in laying out the  
 town in which he lived to see grow into a  
 thriving village and become an educational  
 centre second to none in the northwest. He  
 was an honest upright man, loved by all who  
 knew him, and leaves vacant in the communi-  
 ty in which he moved, a place hard to supply.

He represented this county in the lower  
 branch of the Legislature acceptably in the  
 Ninth General Assembly, besides filling oth-  
 er public stations with honor to himself and  
 his fellow citizens.

His funeral discourse was preached by  
 President Magoun, of Iowa College, on Mon-  
 day last, after which his remains were sadly  
 followed to their last resting place by his  
 many friends.
