Mr. Charles Rogers, as Dick Vinton, the bill-poster, proved to the audience that during his absence from Cleveland he utilized his time to the best advantage, acts in an easy, graceful and natural manner, and can scarcely be excelled in his imitations of prominent actors. Last night, in his imitations of Jefferson, Mayo, McCullough and others, he more than surprised the audience and found it most difficult to leave the stage. Death of C. W. Lowrie,

The *State Register* last week gave the news of the death of Col. C. W. Lowrie at Colfax. The *Register* item says:

Word was received in this city yesterday morning to the effect that C. W. Lowrie had died at Colfax. But few of his friends here knew that he had gone away or was ill, but he went to Colfax about a week ago complaining of ill health. He died entirely unattended by relatives. Col. Lowrie was a well known figure on the streets of Des Moines, having lived here about four years and grown into a fair law practice. He was 62 years of age, was born in Wyoming county, Penn., and had lived in Iowa thirty years, most of the time in Boone and Keokuk. He leaves a wife who has been an invalid many years and who lives with her daughter, Mrs. Wm. T. Cosgrove, in the East. This was their only child, except one that died in infancy at Keokuk. Mrs. Cosgrove was telegraphed for and the funeral will occur at Keokuk.
