- He spent his youth on the family farm in Seneca County, Ohio
- He read law with Gen. H. H. Gibson in Tiffin, Ohio
- He moved to Iowa in 1856, locating at Marengo, Iowa in Iowa County, Iowa. There he formed a partnership with Mr. Guildline, who came to Iowa also. This firm lasted just a few months because of Mr. Guildline's death. His next partner was J. P. Drier until 1862 when Mr. Drier went to the Civil War. His partner then was Amos L. Kagy
- In 1867 Judge Murphy came from Marengo to Davenport and there they formed a partnership along later with H. A. Lynch.
- He was killed after being hit by a large falling boulder in Colorado.

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UNTIMELY FATE.

Death of Hon. Hugh M. Martin.

Sorrowful News for all Davenport and the State—The Sorrow Laden Telegram—Sketch of Mr. Martin's Career—A Grievous Loss.

The worst fears concerning the Hon. Hugh M. Martin have been realized. The accident to him on the Eureka trail of Gunnison chain in Colorado on Thursday last, by which one of his legs was broken in two places, has proved fatal. He is dead! This afternoon the following telegram came to Mr. A. P. Doe:

CRESTED BUTTE, Aug. 30.

Mr. Martin died at a quarter past ten o'clock last night. His family did not arrive. I will take the remains home.

This intelligence will create feelings of profound sorrow not only throughout this city, but in Iowa county, through Central Iowa, and many other portions of the State. To the members of the Bar in Davenport and everywhere in the commonwealth, the news will be an affliction. Few men had more personal friends.

Hugh M. Martin was born near Tiffin, Ohio, on the 4th day of August, 1833. His father was a farmer, and an influential citizen in Seneca county. Hugh M. spent his boyhood on the farm. He was educated in the common schools of the district, at the Republic Academy in the same county, and at the Heidelberg College in Ohio. He read law in Tiffin with Gen. W. H. Gibson, and was admitted to practice in 1855. In 1856 he removed to Iowa, locating in the town of Marengo, Iowa county, and there he formed a partnership with J. H. Murphy, which has been maintained until the present time. They were very successful in practice. Mr. Martin was a staunch Democrat in politics, though he had little of the faculty which politicians possess of

A QUESTION

As to the Right of Habeas Corp the Amendment—A Question Refuses to Issue One—A Judge grants the Writ.

One day last week a saloon named Hollebit, in Jones county rested for selling beer in violation of amendment to the constitution—having been issued by a just peace.

The prisoner's counsel applied to Rothrock of the supreme court of habeas corpus that the quest enforcement of the amendment liabilities are provided might be heard. Rothrock refused to issue the writ, saying that the amendment was in effect the prisoner had sold the beer, was no question for him to decide about on a war with the railroad action in the matter between the Chicago & Northwestern and C., M. & St. P. roads at Clinton—when a locomotive car were ready at Tipton to bring Rothrock's order to set aside and by a district judge should be granted! He would not hear the case in that railroad case; an liquor case he held—before he held that the man was guilty of an offense, and could be punished. There is no provision for punishment. The case for Hollebit, after the refusal of Rothrock to act in that matter, went to Judge Hayes, of the 7th district, who granted the writ of habeas corpus on the same ground upon which his application to Judge Rothrock was based—and Judge Hayes granted the writ. He said he was willing to discuss the questions involved, but that they were important questions that had been decided in this State, and he would not hear what both sides had to say on the matter. This is just and right. The State is entitled to a writ of habeas corpus in this country when the amendment is violated.

was elected Prosecuting Attorney for
Lowa county district in 1857,
but the office was abol-
ished by the new constitution which
went into effect in 1858. He was elected
a member of the Ninth General Assembly
which assembled in January, 1862, and
served through the regular and spe-
cial sessions of the term so well that his
party, the war democrats, nominated him
as their candidate for congress in the then
Fourth congressional district, and he car-
ried the district on the home vote by 1,100
majority over Hon. J. B. Grinnell—but
the soldiers vote gave his opponent the
election. He was a candidate for attorney
general on the democratic ticket in 1868.

In May, 1859, Mr. Martin was united in
marriage at Marengo to Miss Ellen A.
Parker—and she survives him, with her
son Wellington, who has nearly attained
his majority. What a loss is theirs! And
that of his brother Nathan, also.

In 1867 the law firm of Martin &
Murphy removed to Davenport, where they
immediately entered upon large practice—
and here they have lived and prospered
ever since. In 1876, by the admission of
Mr. W. A. Lynch, as a member, the firm be-
came Martin, Murphy & Lynch. In
1878 Mr. Martin was elected
city attorney by the council, and served
eight years in the position whether the ad-

was a deep and brilliant lawyer—studious,
careful, ready, thorough in preparation of
his cases; a gentleman in demeanor to op-

movements. He was public-spirited, too,

On the fourth day of August; the late
 Hugh M. Martin, Seth P. Bryant and E.
 S. Carl, climbed to the top of Treasure
 mountain in Colorado. As they stood
 there amazed at the magnificent views,
 Mr. Martin said, "Gentlemen, this is my
 birthday; I am forty-nine years old to-day.
 Congratulate me!" And the three friends
 clasped hands in honor of the occasion,
 and entered into conversation over the
 labors, struggles and joys of manhood.
 Little thought they that it was about their
 last friendly talk alone—and that when
 Mr. Carl left, the trio was broken forever.
 The survivors, and all others in fact, who
 ever did business with Mr. Martin, regard
 his death as if it were a personal loss, he
 was so genial and kind with all his ability
 and education, and his noble presence.

A telegram was received last evening
 from Dr. Peck, who with Mrs. Martin and
 her son, and the Hon. J. H. Murphy, was
 on his way to Crested Butte to care for
 Mr. Martin, stating that they had receiv-
 ed news of Mr. Martin's death, and that
 they meet Mr. Bryant with the remains at
 Salida, Colorado, and start for home Thurs-
 day (this) evening. Salida is the junc-
 tion of the railroads from Crested Butte
 and Leadville to Denver, and is 180 miles
 south-west of the latter place. So it is
 likely that the party will arrive here on
 Saturday evening next. It was
 on the 30th of July that Mr. Martin and
 Mr. Carl left Davenport to join Mr. Bry-
 ant at Gunnison.
