He entered actively into politics, and at a time when politics was bitter he was the lead. ing Democrat ci the county. triumphed at a special election held in the winter of 1862 and was elected state senator for a district which included Story, Boone and other counties; and he accordingly served out the term to which Col. John Scott had been elected in 1850 and which had become vacant by reason of the colonel's going into the army. He was a man of fine presence, good




