The funeral of John W. Quinn yesterday, an old settler of this city, but latterly a resident of Washington, Iowa, at which place he died last Tuesday, was one of the largest we have ever seen in this city. Iowa Lodge No. 2 of the Masonic Fraternity, of which the deceased was formerly an honored member, conducted the funeral services, and escorted the body to the grave.

A GOOD REAPER.—Yesterday morning, in company with quite a number of gentlemen, (mostly farmers) who had been invited to be present, we witnessed, at the farm of Gen. Fletcher, in this vicinity, the operation of one of W. A. Wood's Self-Raking Reapers in cutting wheat. The working of the machine called forth the admiration of all present, and especially of those most competent to judge of its merits. The formation of the machine is complete, and it is worked with great ease by two horses. The raker works on the principle of the human arm, having an elbow of iron and fingers of steel, propelled by means of an endless chain affixed to the running gear of the machine. This makes the raker much more simple and less liable to get out of repair than those awkward things seen on other machines. The advantages claimed by the inventor of this machine are—

- 1st. The Rake, by a simple and rapid motion, grasps the cut grain at the butts and sweeps it across the platform, making a perfect separation from the falling grain without entangling or scattering the straws.
- 2d. The separation being effected, the grain is compressed in a compact and regular gavel against the wing board and delivered at the side of the machine, in good shape for binding, out of its track on its next round.
- 3d. The driver, by a motion of his feet, can regulate the size of the gavels without any change for light or heavy grain.
- 4th. The height of the cut can be regulated by a simple lever with the hand while the machine is in motion, and the draft is at least one-third lighter than any other Self Raking Machine, from its simple construction and the direct operation of the power to drive the rake.
