The 12 hour, "go as you please race" for a purse of \$200 was advertised open to the world; Brann, the Maquoketa pedestrian entered and paid his entrance fee on July 3rd, and when the men were called for the start he was barred out.—The other contestants claimed that when they entered for the race they were promised that Brann should be kept out. The following is an extract from a postal received from the Secretary by W. C. Brann under date of July 1st:

"The 12 hour race is open to any resident of the State, or the immediate vicinity in Illinois."

It seems by this that Jackson County is not in the State, if it is not entirely out of the world. Brann, while he knew he was unjustly barred out of the race and was entitled to a square deal, offered the other contestants two miles the start, which was refused. Brann does not blame the other contestants, but blames the management for advertising the race open to all, and putting him to so much expense, and then refusing to either pay his expenses or let him into the race. Evidently Brann has been swindled and the association should be well advertised. Pipping, the Dubuque-Clinton dead beat, tried to pick a quarrel with him but Brann was in Clinton to walk, not to fight bidders, but intended if he was forced into it to make bloody work of it. Brann has accepted H. L. Goodman's challenge for a 50 mile whirl for the championship of America.

On June 30, 1879, of heart disease, Dr. GEO. W. TRUMBULL, aged 59 years and 4 months. Funeral from the residence of his son, George M. Trumbull, 476 Marshfield av., on Wednesday at 10 A. M., by carriages to Graceland.—Chicago Times.

Dr. Trumbull was a resident of this county and was well known by nearly all the old citizens of this valley. The Monticello Express says:

Dr. G. W. Trumbull a former resident, and at one time Mayor of Monticello, died suddenly in Chicago, last Monday morning. The cause of his death is not yet known here. The Dr. was a large heavy man, but greatly affected with asthma. He had just arrived in Chicago from Colorado, where some of his children are. He came to Iowa in 1853, and was 59 years old at the time of his decease. He was possessor of considerable wealth, having always been largely engaged in land speculations. He was a man of strict integrity of character, a good citizen, a warm and steadfast friend, and a model husband and father. The bereaved wife and children will have the heartfelt sympathy of all who ever knew the deceased.

Ex-Supervisor Harry Trumbull is a son of the deceased.
