### Col. Van Anda.

The death of Col. S. G. Van Anda, which took place at the hospital at Independence, last Monday, removes from earth another of the men who perilled their lives for their country. For the past six or seven years he had been at Independence, and failing in bodily health, so that his death, which was caused by a stroke of apoplexy, a sorrow though to his family and friends, was not unexpected.

From the History of Delaware county, we condense the following particulars of his life: He was born in Sunbury, Northumberland county, Pennsylvania, April 20, 1835. In 1851 he entered the Ohio Wesleyan University, at Delaware, Ohio, and graduated in 1854. Meanwhile he read law, and was admitted to the bar in 1855. The same year he came to this county, and settled at Delhi, practising his profession until 1862, when he enlisted in the 21st volunteer infantry, and was appointed Major, and promoted in May, 1863, to be Lieut. Colonel. He was in command of the regiment until it was mustered out, and was a great favorite with the men under his command.

In 1759 he was married to Lydia B. Weatherby, who survives him, as also two children, Charles and Kittie, now residing in this city. From the time he left the army until about seven years ago, he was engaged in the practice of his profession, here in Manchester. At that time began to be perceived the indications of that malady that destroyed his usefulness, and finally ended his life. The hardships of military life, and the anxiety of a commander, no doubt helped to undermine a constitution naturally strong and vigorous, and tended to shorten his life.

The body of Col. Van Anda was brought here Monday night, and the funeral took place Wednesday afternoon, at the M. E. church, the Rev. E. L. Miller preaching the sermon. A large concourse of people was present, and it was noticeable that among them were many of the older and earlier residents, from various parts of the county, who knew the Colonel in early times, and through all the years retained their first liking for him. His two brothers, one from Minneapolis, the other from Nebraska, were here to attend the funeral, and the remains were followed to the grave by a large procession of neighbors and friends. His faults are buried with him, his good qualities only are remembered. To the brave soldier is due our gratitude, to the bereaved family our earnest and sincere sympathy.

COL. S. G. VAN ANDA, a former prominent citizen of Manchester, died at the hospital at Independence on the 1st. He was the lieutenant-colonel of the 21st Iowa during the war, and was nominated for several positions on the democratic state ticket at different times after the close of the war. He was sent to the Independence hospital several years ago, and his death resulted from apoplexy.

The bill provides for the amendment of existing laws so that soldiers who were enlisted before August 6, 1861, and were not mustered until after that date shall be paid a bounty of \$100. Under the proclamation of the president of May 3, 1861, and the orders issued by the war department in pursuance thereof, no soldier could receive the bounty who was not actually mustered in before August 6, 1861.

JUDGE STONEMAN, of the superior court of Cedar Rapids last Saturday declared the registry law unconstitutional. The case was one brought by Col. Clark vs. election judges in the fifth ward of that city, who was refused the privilege of voting on election day, not having registered. The complainant averred that during the time when under the law he might otherwise have become registered, he was necessarily absent at Des Moines in attendance upon the U. S. court in which he was practicing attorney. The defendant demurred to the plaintiff's petition. The demurrer raised the question of the constitutionality of the registry act. The decision of its unconstitutionality was based upon the Massachusetts case of Copan vs. Foster, and similiar cases in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Oregon the
