Ninety years covers nearly the entire period of the history of the United States, so far as it touches the development of its territory west of the Alleghenies, and in the death of Mr. John McCormick Whittaker, who, for the past thirty years has been a resident of this county, we chronicle the departure of one who was a prominent actor in the earliest days of that wonderful history. He was born Feb. 11, 1801, in Clermont county, Ohio, when that great State was yet a territory. In 1827 he was a trader with the Indians in Michigan Territory.  service of the State. For seven years  
 he was the "locating agent" appointed  
 by the Legislature to select and locate  
 the 500 000 acres of land donated to the  
 State for the purposes of internal im-  
 provement, but devoted by the constitu-  
 tion to the support of the schools. This  
 great and responsible work devolved  
 solely upon him, and was performed  
 with signal success. The State of Iowa  
 being fairly launched upon its great car-  
 eer of development and progress, Mr.  
 Whitaker was ready to depart from it,  
 and in 1861, he came to California, set-  
 tling in this county where he has since  
 lived, passing his declining years in  
 quiet tranquility, and passing at last to  
 the unexplored Beyond full of days and  
 honors.

**WOLF, J. 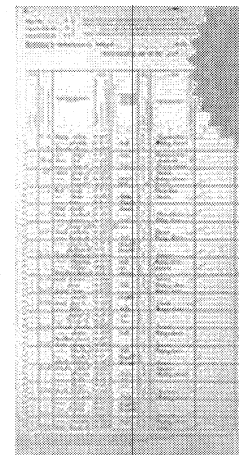

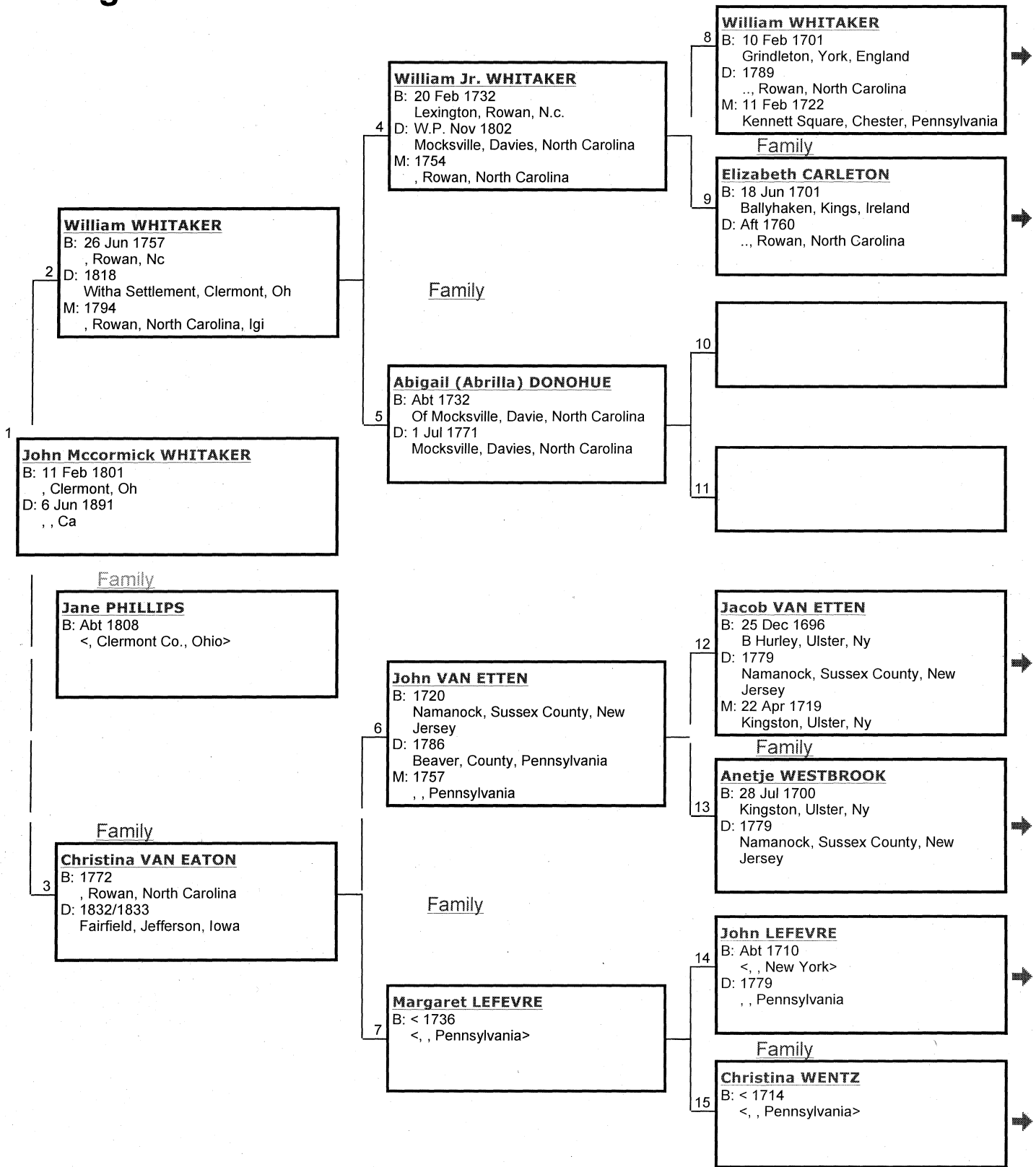
