This great and responsible work devolved solely upon him, and was performed with signal success. The State of Iowa being fairly launched upon its great career of development and progress, Mr. Whitaker was ready to depart from it, and in 1861, he came to California, settling in this county where he has since lived, passing his declining years in quiet tranquility, and passing at last to the unexplored Beyond full of days and honors.


