YESTERDAY the numerous friends of Hon. S. H. Casady gathered around his bier to take a last look at the cold and inanimate clay, and to pay the last sad rites to his remains. The vast concourse which congregated at the house is some indication of the love and esteem in which he was held in this city. After the services at the house, which were conducted by Rev. R. M. Smith of the Broadway M. E. Church, the remains were taken charge of by Excelsior lodge of Masons—of which lodge the deceased had been for several years an attentive and honored member—and the last impressive rites of the Order were conducted at the grave by Past Senior Grand Warden, G. W. Elninger.

The life thus closed has been honorably and usefully spent. Mr. Casady was one of the early settlers of the West—taking up his residence in Sioux City, in 1856, we believe. The next year he was nominated for the legislature from the district then composed of Pottawattamie, Harrison, Crawford, Monona, Woodbury, and other northwestern counties. He was elected—defeating by a large majority his Republican competitor, Hon. J. W. Denison—and served his district with zeal and efficiency. He continued to reside in Sioux City until he removed to this City some five or six years ago. He was a man of natural urbanity and pleasing address, just and honorable, and these characteristics won for him a large circle of warm friends, who sincerely mourn his untimely death.
