In the Hardin county primaries Saturday Mr. Weiden of Iowa Falls, who was elected representative two years ago as an independent, was renominated as a regular. The senatorial endorsement was given to George W. Ward of Eldora, who will, however, have to contend in the district convention with D. C. Chase of Hamilton and Mr. Peterson of Wright.

Senator Burton, of Kansas, being twice convicted of making merchandise of his senatorial office, has finally yielded to the threat of immediate expulsion from the senate, and has handed his resignation to the governor of Kansas. The governor of Kansas has appointed as his successor Mr. F. D. Coburn, who has long been secretary of the Kansas state board of agriculture and who is regarded in that state as an apostle of good farming.

The rate bill in congress does not appear to be in the way of quite so early a disposition as was indicated a few days ago. The conference committee reported Saturday; but some things done by that committee to the pass section and in other places are assailed, as having been outside of the proper jurisdiction of a conference committee.

OBITUARY

DEATH OF J. L. DANA

Hon. John Lockwood Dana, one of the oldest and most prominent and respected citizens of Nevada and Story County, passed away at his home in this city at 10:15 last evening, aged 80 years, 2 months, and eleven days. Mr. Dana had been in failing health through the winter, and had lost about forty pounds in weight; but when he returned a few weeks ago from Seattle, where he and Mrs. Dana had been with their children for the few previous months, he seemed to his friends upon the business street to be in about his usual condition. He was around looking after his business matters, and it is now understood that he was trying to put them in shape, for him to leave them. As an incident of this effort, upon his very last trip down town on Tuesday forenoon of last week he called at the Representative office to leave for preservation a document of historical value that he had found in looking over his papers; and the fact that he should have done this illustrates both his carefulness and that he must have been feeling fairly well at that time. But about six o'clock on the same day he was suddenly seized with a chill, which developed rapidly into uraemia, and he sank almost immediately into a state of coma, from which he never wholly emerged. He survived in this condition for a week and died as stated on Tuesday evening of this week.

Mr. Dana was born near New Haven, Huron county, Ohio, March 25, 1826, and died at Nevada Iowa, June 5, 1906. He spent his boyhood on a farm near Fremont Ohio, attended Oberlin College, and also attended a law school at Cincinnati, was admitted to the bar, was married at Pistoria, Ohio, February

D. Corey arrived Wednesday evening. Mrs. Corey has not been able to come; but Mr. Clyde Lockwood, the other son-in-law, will be here for the funeral

A Quaint Oath.

The judicial oath in the Isle of Man is so quaint as to deserve printing. It runs thus: "By this book and the holy contents thereof and by the wonderful works that God hath miraculously wrought in heaven above and in the earth beneath in six days and seven nights I do swear that I will, without respect of favor or friendship, love or gain, consanguinity or affinity, envy or malice, execute the laws of this isle justly between our sovereign lord the king and his subjects within this isle, betwixt party and party, as indifferently as the herring's backbone doth lie in the midst of the fish."

On the Slopes of Vesuvius.

Despite the danger to which they are exposed from 80,000 to 100,000 people live upon the slopes of Vesuvius, besides the 500,000 inhabitants crowded into Naples. The reason is that the fertility of the soil is perennial, the peril only occasional. The volcanic ejecta are rich in alumina, silica, magnesia, lime, potash and iron, which by their decomposition go to make splendid land. Some of the best vines in Italy grow on the skirts of Vesuvius. If the volcano were away not one-tenth of the many cultivators could subsist in the same area.

Funeral of J. L. Dana.

The funeral of the late Hon. J. L. Dana was conducted from his late residence Sunday morning at nine o'clock by Rev. W. B. Sandford of Waterloo, assisted by Rev. Arthur M. Boyd of this city. The services were simple but appropriate, and the attendance of old friends and neighbors was greater than there was room for within doors. The music was by the Presbyterian choir; and the tributes of respect to the departed citizen, lawyer and legislator were earnest and sincere. The body was laid to rest in the Nevada cemetery.

At the same time there were also buried in a grave beside her father's the ashes of Mrs. Mahel Dana Lockwood who died at Portland, Oregon, about three years ago. Her body was then cremated; and her ashes were brought by her husband, Clyde Lockwood, when he came to Mr. Dana's funeral. The funeral thus became a memorial for her as well as for her father, and the last rites were for them both.

Mr. Lockwood arrived from Portland early Sunday morning, and the funeral was delayed from Saturday to Sunday, pending his arrival. He and Mr. Frank Dana started back for Portland and Seattle Sunday evening; but Mr. Corey, the other son-in-law, will remain for a few weeks.
