12. Other applicable information He does not appear in 1850, 1852, 1860 or 1870 Iowa Censuses. Scott County History lists him as a Whig, winner of election to prosecuting attorney, 1853. He was petitioner for Masonic Lodge in Le Claire, 1854, and member after petition granted. Official reports for 13th Iowa list him as from Davenport, age 40, when aptd quartermaster 13 Oct. 1841; mustered 4 Nov. 1861, and resigned 1 April 1862. Official Roster for 8th Cavalry lists him as from Sidney, Iowa; aptd Lt. Col. 30 July 1863, mustered 30 Sept. 1863; promoted to Col. 9 June 1865, mustered out at Macon, Georgia, 13 August 1865. He is mentioned several times in the regimental history. Iowa Graves Registration Record shows only that he is buried in Manhattan, Kansas.

Col. H. G. Barner, who died last Thurs-
 day night, after a long and lingering ill-
 ness, was born June 25th, 1821, and was
 therefore, in the 58th year of his age. Dur-
 ing the war he was made Colonel of the
 Eighth Iowa Cavalry, and received the
 wound from which he had since suffered
 until the time of his death. He was a law-
 yer of marked ability and had occupied
 numerous civil positions of honor. The
 funeral services were held at the Metho-
 dist Church at two o'clock Sunday after-
 noon, under the auspices of the Free Ma-
 sons, of which order deceased was a prom-
 inent member. The sermon was preached
 by Rev. E. Gill, 1st Peter I 24-25. The re-
 mains were followed to the cemetery by
 a large concourse of the sorrowing and
 sympathizing friends of the family.
