JUDGE LARIMOR DIES AT CHICAGO

FORMER WELL KNOWN CITIZEN OF COUNCIL BLUFFS SUC- CUMBS TO INFIRMITIES.

Sioux City, Ia., March 24.—Adam V. Larimor, formerly of Council Bluffs, later a long time resident of Sioux City, where he became wealthy, died in Chicago today where he had gone for an operation. He was 76 years of age.

Judge Larimor will be well remembered by the old timers in Council Bluffs. He came to this city in 1854 and resided here for a period of about twenty-five years. He was a unique character in many respects and was somewhat noted for his stubbornness of disposition.

It is related that he landed in Council Bluffs with only 50 cents capital, but with the energy which was characteristic of his general make-up he succeeded in amassing quite a large fortune. He served as county judge for several years, during the time that office was in vogue, and from this service dates his title. He also represented this county at one time in the state legislature.

Judge Larimor moved to Sioux City in

1880, lived there for a number of years, came to Omaha for a short time and then relocated at Sioux City.

He remained a bachelor until his 70th year. A short time before that period he made a trip abroad in the hope of benefiting his health and in England met a lady who broke down the barriers which he had so long maintained. She came to Sioux City about five years ago and there became Judge Larimor's first and only bride.

He had been in failing health for a number of years and had submitted to previous operations.
