Death of Hon. J. L. Corse.

It is made our painful duty to announce
 the death of our distinguished fellow towns-
 man, John Lockwood Corse, who expired at
 midnight of Thursday, March 18th, at his
 residence on South Main street. Mr. Corse
 had suffered for several weeks from an en-
 largement of the liver and a general debility
 from which he soon discovered he could
 not rally, and for over a week past has daily
 expected his final hour. He retained his
 consciousness to the last and had arranged
 his business affairs in anticipation of his de-
 cease. The funeral services will be held at
 the Presbyterian Church at 2 o'clock, Sun-
 day afternoon.

J. L. Corse was a native of Delaware and
 was born in the city of Dover, in that State,
 on the 5th of March, 1813, and consequently
 was 55 years and 14 days of age. Early in
 life he moved to Philadelphia, where he
 learned the trade of carriage making, and
 in 1834, was married, his estimable wife hav-
 ing departed this life about a year and a
 half ago. In 1835 he moved West,
 and for a short time lived in St. Louis, Mo.,
 and Belleville, Ill. From the latter point
 he removed to Burlington in 1842 and at
 once engaged in business by erecting a car-

has cast a pall over the feelings of the pub-
lic such as occasionally befalls every people
when one whose long years of public serv-
ice and kindly relationship is removed from
