Henry Weatherington, a pioneer resident of Rincon Valley, died at his home early Monday morning after a protracted illness. Deceased was a native of Ohio and was 84 years old. The funeral services will be held at Rural cemetery Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

In his time Mr. Weatherington was a man of considerable prominence in this county. He served on our board of supervisors and held other official positions. He had many friends, especially among the older people of this vicinity.

The death of Mrs. Eliza E. James, beloved daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Hughes, occurred at the Hughes home in Bennett Valley at 2:30 o'clock Monday morning. Deceased died of consumption after a long illness. She was about 40 years of age. The funeral services will be held from the residence in Bennett Valley at 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

AN OCTOGENARIAN.
The States He Has Seen Come Into the Union.

Uncle Henry Weatherington celebrat- ed his eightieth birthday on Tuesday. He was born in 1813 in Fort Franklin, which stood upon the present site of Columbus, the capital of Ohio, when that great city was all in the future and its site a frontier fort under command of Gen. William Henry Harrison, for whom Mr. Weatherington was named. Mr. Weatherington Sr. was an officer at the fort and was a resident there with his family when our octogenarian was born. Uncle Henry started west long before Horace Greeley's advice to young men was given. He saw Ohio emerge into statehood from her territorial swaddling clothes, which she abandoned in 1802. Louisiana is just one year older than he. The State of Indiana (class of 1816) is four years younger. Mississippi, Illi- nois, Alabama, Maine, Missouri, Arkan- sas, Michigan, Florida and Texas are all younger than he. As a member of the constitutional convention of Iowa Mr. Weatherington helped to escort Miss Iowa, the northwestern heiress, into the fast increasing family of old E. Pluribus Unum, who, said a Georgia Congress- man, "was the only man I ever knew who parted his name in the middle that ever amounted to anything." Mr. Weatherington stood by Iowa until Wis- consin and Minnesota came into the charmed circle, and then he took a no- tion to go farther west. He met a rush of states from that direction with Cali- fornia in the lead and Oregon, Colorado and Nevada close behind her, North and South Dakota caught on and Montana and Idaho brought up the rear. All these great States have been organized and peopled since Uncle Henry first saw the light in the frontier fort of Franklin on the Scioto river in Ohio, now the seat of the capital of an imperial State in population, wealth and in the great men it has since given to the Union. Mr. Weatherington is in good health and may yet see Arizona and New Mexico round up the roll of States. In such a record of the birth of states there are few men who can say, as he can, "All of which I saw and part of which I was."

He identified the affidavit of registration made by Alfred Wheeler, as one that had been received by him. He said he had received it Monday, October 24, 1892, through the mail. He had marked the affidavit "filed" himself. The affidavit came in a package with about fifty others and came from his deputy, Mr. Monmonier. He testified that he was reasonably familiar with Monmonier's signature and identified the one on the affidavit as having been made by him.

The affidavit was read to the jury by Mr. Leppo and was received in evidence and marked exhibit 2.

Mr. Juilliard said he thought there was a note in the packet explanatory of the number of affidavits. The affidavit was received October 24, it was marked filed 22.

On cross-examination by Judge Campbell, Mr. Juilliard explained that he had marked the affidavit filed October 22 because it came to him purporting to be in the hands of his deputy October 22. He had been advised that that was the proper course.

Here the judge stated that that was a well-known proposition of law, meaning that the possession of the deputy is that of the principal.

Alfred Wheeler, the man who made the affidavit for registration in question, was the next witness. He swore, positively, that he was not in Healdsburg, Saturday, October 22; he did not see Mr. Monmonier and would not have known him if he had seen him. He identified the affidavit made by him on Oct. 24, Monday, in Healdsburg. He said he made it in Judge Coffman's office that day. He reiterated the statement that he did not swear to the instrument before T. L. Monmonier at any time, as he did not know the man.

Considerable merriment was created, when, in response to a question by Mr. Leppo in regard to his complexion, he

Monmonier about having sworn Wheeler.

Being asked by Mr. Leppo Monmonier had ever spoken to him about the matter, he said he had spoken to him but not about it. He was positive he had told Monmonier that Wheeler put to have signed. Then Mr. Leppo cured the admission from witness Monmonier had signed the affidavit was without knowing whether he had been sworn to or not.

Thomas L. Monmonier the deputy was then sworn. He spoke in a low tone of voice, in response to questions propounded to him by Judge Campbell. Said he was deputy clerk under Mr. Juilliard for the purpose of registering voters.

Continuing, Mr. Monmonier said Oct. 24th he had found Wheeler's affidavit in his desk. He had been in the habit of making affidavits, leaving final filling out of them later or he signed a number of them. He was a little nettled at Mr. Leppo's questions and said all he knew about the affidavit was that he saw it before he signed. Said he could not remember, positively, just when he had mailed it to the clerk. He did not see Mr. Wheeler and did not know him.

On cross examination by Mr. Leppo witness said he had found several or four affidavits, not signed, in the register. Could not tell, but thought affidavits not signed, had been taken by him Saturday. Did not remember Coffman ever filling out affidavits. Said a man had never told him about affidavits had been instructed by Mr. Juilliard to receive affidavits for registration October 22.

When asked by Mr. Leppo if he had not been instructed by Mr. Juilliard to take affidavits taken after the 22 would not be entered in the great register, witness said he could not remember.

Said the first time he had heard of trouble about it was when the Iowa Central Committee issued the circular. The affidavits signed with the names of the affidavits were lying loosely on the table when he found them October 24.

Ex-sheriff Mergrew was then sworn. He was called to establish the fact that Mr. Monmonier's reputation is good.

Justice Brown was called for the purpose.

Judge Campbell stated that he had sworn a number of others, and the prosecution said they would admit that Mr. Monmonier's reputation was

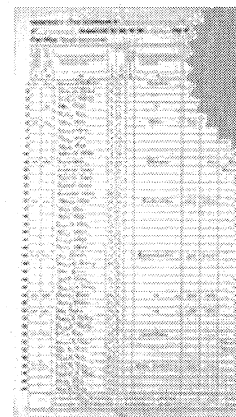

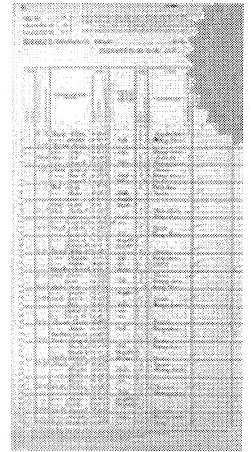

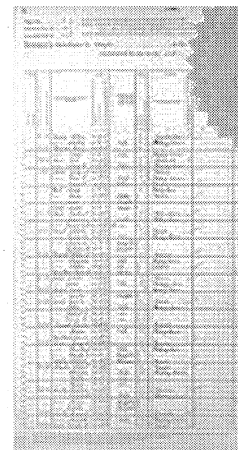
