- *In 1859 he moved to Pajaro Valley with his family. Here he was a fruit grower and rancher.*

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Three were killed, scores injured and hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of property ruined, according to a hurried canvass made when the city aroused itself from half an hour of helplessness in the grasp of the elements.

Out of a blazing sky, under which the city was sweltering with the temperature at the 100 point, came the storm, roaring from the north, driving a mass of clouds that cast a mantle of almost total darkness over the town. The gale, reaching a velocity of nearly seventy miles an hour, swept the streets clear, unroofed houses, tore detached small structures from their foundations, wrecked one office building, overturned wagons and carriages in the streets and swept Washington's hundred parks, tearing huge branches from trees and even uprooting sturdy old elms, the landmarks of a century.

Washington, July 31—Three people were killed in the hurricane that swept the city, according to revised reports.

Henry Smiler, a colored man, was killed by a fall from a ladder.

Washington, July 31—Thousands of workmen are clearing the debris and it will be a week before the streets are cleaned. It will be years before the parks are restored.

The dead are Walter Hillon, a real estate dealer, and Thomas Pealey, a tinner. Six were injured and three probably fatally. The damage will amount to over a million dollars. Fifty houses were unroofed.

Chicago, July 31—Showers relieved the intense heat today and this morning the temperature dropped from 90 to 83 degrees at 10 o'clock. It is very humid.

Chicago, July 31—Low temperatures prevail in most of the western towns and it is predicted that thunderstorms will break the heat tonight. Light showers brought no improvement and the crops of Illinois, Nebraska, and Iowa are badly damaged. Excited buying is going on, caused by a one and two cent jump in corn. Traders predict a great shortage in corn as the heat in the east continues. A dozen deaths have been recorded so far.

Gilroy, July 31—According to the careful estimates made by the local fruit growers and handlers, the Santa Clara valley during the last week lost through sunburn nearly 30 per cent of its prune crop, estimated at about 9,000,000 pounds.

The hot spell of the latter part of the week ending July 12 withered the prunes at the stems and in some parts the ground is covered with the immature fruit, dried up.

The local growers foresee a corresponding rise in prices due to the shortage, and are hoping that this will serve to equalize conditions. Already offers are from half a cent to a cent higher than before. The ultimate amount of the damage can not be known, as the prunes are still dropping in some sections.

ESTEEMED PIONEER HAS PASSED AWAY

N. B. Allison Died This Morning at an Early Hour After Short Illness

Napoleon Bonaparte Allison, one of the best known pioneers of this valley and who was probably the oldest resident in this valley, died shortly after midnight this morning after an illness that had lasted three months. Mr. Allison had been ailing for some time, and his advanced years made it impossible for him to recuperate and he finally succumbed today after a gallant struggle.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the residence and the interment will be made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Allison was a native of Ohio and was aged 92 years, 11 months and 19 days. He crossed the plains to California in 1854 and settled first at Placerville, where he resided until he removed to Solano county a few months later. Solano county was his home for about five years and in 1859 he came here to the Pajaro Valley with his family. He had lived on the Allison Way near the San Juan road all of that time up to his death and was a fruit grower and rancher all that time. Mr. Allison was a quiet man and was highly regarded as a citizen. He had most estimable qualities, was a kind father, a dutiful husband and a sterling citizen in every respect. His death will be mourned here by all and especially by the older residents. His wife preceded him to the grave seven years ago.

He is survived by the following children: Mrs. A. E. A. White of Watsonville, Mrs. Arthur T. Dresser of Berkeley and Byron Allison of Watsonville.

BUILDING GREAT FLOAT

Apple Annual to Make Fine Show in Salinas Parade

Manager Harry Perkins of the apple show is busily engaged in making the apple show float, which will appear in the illuminated auto parade on Saturday night at Salinas at the windup of the Big Week. The float will be 13 feet long and 10 feet wide and will be mounted on an auto truck. On the front will appear a great white horse in the act of bucking. The horse to be covered with white flannel and illuminated with 80 electric lights. William N. Cumming will be astride the bucking broncho and the horse will be almost lifelike.

Behind the horse will be a huge apple, eight feet high, which will be supported by four local young ladies attired in yama-yama costumes and garlands of apple blossoms. These young ladies will be the Misses Leontine Shee, Josephine Morse, Mildred Speck and Elizabeth Steglich. Fifty electric lights will be placed around the apple, the floor and sides of the float will be arranged in a grotto effect and if the float does win a prize its designers will be not taken. It will represent the carnival spirit of the apple show and will definitely the Salinas Rodeo as well as the horse and the apple carrying out these ideas in a novel manner.
