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Hon. Wm. E. Leffingwell, one of Clinton county's oldest settlers and a prominent jurists of the Northwest, died at his home in Lyons last Wednesday at the age of 63 years. For ever thirty years Judge Leffingwell has been well and favorably known all through the Northwest not only for his brilliant powers as an attorney and, statesman but for the many sterling qualities which go to make the man. Since his removal to Clinton county Mr. Leffingwell has held many positions of honer and trust. At the outbreak of the war Mr. Leffingwell was among the first to put his shoulder to the wheel in raising troups.

For many years deceased has been a Free Mason and at one time held the highest state office in the gift of that order. At the time of his death he was a member in good standing of the various higher degrees of Scottish rite masonry and was highly esteemed by all the traternity.

For a number of years past he has resided in Chicago, but his failing health compelled him to relinquish practice in the courts, and he returned to his home in Lyons in hopes of regaining his health. But it was to late; hard mental work had so thoroughly undermined his constitution that a rally was impossible and he passed quietly away, surrounded by friends and relatives. The entire community are sincere in their sympathy with the bereaved family.

He leaves a widow, two sons, Frank and W. B. and a daughter, Mrs. Dr. Mitchell. The funeral will take place under the ausic es of the Masonic fraternity to-day.

The Congregational Sunday school had a pleasant picnic at Stony Point, Tuesday. The ferry boat did the transportation.


The lawn sociables of last week were so well attended and such enjoyable affairs that several others are "cooking" and will be announced soon.

Leffingwell occurred Friday morning at 10 o'clock. with brief services at the house and the elaborate ritual services of Delphic Chapter Rose Croix, Scottish Rite Masons. At 10:30 the body was taken in charge by the Masonic traternity and the funeral cortege moved to Oak. land cemetery where the Masonic funera services were conducted by G. M. Curtis' Master. W. W. was again subdivided into two circuits. The circuit judges who held court in Clinton county are as follows:

1869 to 1872, Geo. B. Young, Clinton; 1872 to 1881, Daniel W. Ellis, Lyons; 1881 to 1885, Charles W. Chase, Clinton; 1885 to 1887, A. J. Leffingwell, Lyons.

The county court was established in 1851. The first county judge for Clinton county was A. R. Cotton, who served from 1851 to 1853. He was succeeded by Edward Graham from 1853 to 1856; Daniel McNeil, 1856 to 1860; John C. Polley, 1860 to 1864; Pitkin C. Wright, 1864 to 1866; George B. Young, 1866 to 1868, when the court was abolished.

BIOGRAPHICAL.

So far as can be ascertained, at the time of holding the first term of court in Clinton county no lawyers resided in the county. The first resident attorney, as reported upon the authority of Hon. A. R. Cotton, himself one of the earliest in the county, was Samuel R. Murray, who located in Camanche in 1840. He died at Dubuque in 1844, while in attendance upon the public land sales. J. S. Stowers came to DeWitt in 1844. He is still living at Wheatland, though not in active practice. Others soon followed.



William E. Leffingwell came from Muscatine county in 1845, and located at DeWitt. It is reported that for a time he lived upon a farm near Elvira, which report is probably true. Mr. Leffingwell afterwards moved to Lyons, and later practiced in Chicago, but retained his residence in Lyons, where he died August 13, 1884. Judge Leffingwell was tall, erect, dark of hair, eyes and complexion. He was prominent in Masonic circles and a full length picture of him in full Masonic uniform is one of the ornaments of the consistory rooms in Lyons. He was a natural orator, and among the traditions of the Clinton county bar are the stories of his eloquence and legal victories. His fame as an orator and advocate soon became more than state-wide.
