#### Death of Micajah Reeder.

Our neighboring county to the south has lost its pioneer resident in the death of Micajah Reeder, who passed away Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the home of his daughter, Mrs. R. H. Edmundson, in Concord township. He was the oldest surviving member of the legislature, having represented Louisa county in the House of Representatives in 1852-3. He was in his 85th year, and was one of the characters of the county, his life being part of its history since 1837, the year he came from Indiana. He was a native of Pennsylvania and lived in Ohio before coming to Indiana. In 1835, in Indiana, Mr. Reeder identified himself with the M. E. church, entering the ministry. He had charge of a circuit there two years. In 1843 he joined the Iowa conference of the same church, traveling two years on the Crawfordsville circuit, one on the Fairfield circuit, one on the Yellow Springs, Des Moines county, one on the Jackson county circuit, and served many years as a minister in Louisa county. He was distinctly a pioneer in his proclivities. He joined the California overland delegation from that county in '49, and about 25 years ago went to Kansas to aid in opening up the State. He purchased land of the government on coming to Louisa county. He was united in marriage seven times, and his last wife died 15 years ago. Three of his daughters are wives of leading citizens of Concord township. For the past two years he has been blind and death was the result of a paralytic stroke 36 hours before.—Muscatine-News Tribune.

### In Memoriam.

**Micajah Reeder** was born in Montgomery county, Ohio, Dec. 29, 1811, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. R. H. Edmondson of Concord township, May 29, 1896, making him at the time of his death 84 years and five months old.

When six years old he moved with his father's family to Wayne county, Indiana; from there to Tippecanoe county, same state, and there passed the remainder of his childhood. He was converted at 19 and united with the M. E. church. He soon began studying for the ministry believing that God required this of him. He entered the ministry in 1833 and traveled two years on the Princeton work; it covered three hundred miles and took one month to go over, preaching every day and evening through the week, and three times on Sabbath. On Dec. 10, 1836, he was united in marriage to Miss Nancy Stirlen, near Terra Haute, Indiana. The next year he, with his father and some of his friends, came to Iowa Territory, and settled in Grandview township. The most of his time between 1837 and 1852 was passed in improving his farm and traveling in the cause of his Master. In Aug., 1852, the democrats of Louisa county, elected him as representative to the State Assembly to convene at Iowa City the following winter and which office he filled to the best wishes of his constituents, always keeping the Golden Rule in view. He filled various offices of trust in both church and state. In September, 1852, he was called upon to mourn the death of his beloved wife, she leaving him with five small children. One son, James Wesley, who died a soldier's death at Corinth, Miss Jane, now Mrs. R. H. Edmondson; Ellen, now Mrs. S. S. Snyder of Fredonia; Amanda, now Mrs. J. E. Lee of near Letts; and a little infant daughter, who was soon laid to rest beside its mother. In Feb., 1856, he was again united in marriage to Miss Harriette Spurgeon. One son was born to them, John M., who is now living in Oska-loosa, Iowa.

**Weather-Crop Bulletin.**

DES MOINES, IOWA, June 30, 1896.—The temperature of the past week was favorable for all crops although slightly below the seasonal normal. The rainfall was unequally distributed, numerous localities reporting heavy thunderstorms with wind squall of considerable force, on the 24th and 25th. In all sections there is an ample supply of moisture in the soil for the present needs of the crops.

Reports from all districts indicate that corn is making good advancement, and a large portion of the crop will be laid by during the coming week. The late planted and replanted fields give promise of producing a fair crop.

Oats suffered material injury in all sections visited by heavy rain and wind storms, a portion of the rank grain being lodged beyond recovery. The full extent of damage cannot as yet be estimated.

There are numerous reports of damage to spring wheat by rust.

The harvest of hay and fall grain is in progress, and a considerable acreage of barley is about ready for the reaper. The yield of hay is generally satisfactory. Pastures yield abundantly, and the prospect for potatoes was never better.

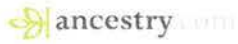

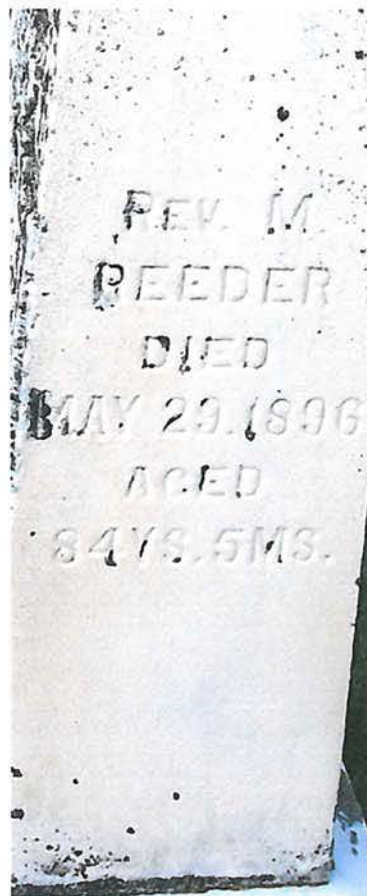
