ANOTHER PIONEER GONE.

Death of Hon. Laurel Summers, for Fifty- Three Years a Resident of Scott County.

Hon. Laurel Summers died at his home in LeClaire Tuesday afternoon. He was widely known throughout the state, and wherever known was held in respect on account of his energy, his honesty, and his integrity.

Born in Montgomery county, Ken- tucky, Oct. 2, 1812, he was 25 years old when, in 1837, he located in what is now Scott county in the then territory of Wisconsin. He made a government claim and embarked in farming. In 1838 he was elected to the first territorial legislature, and was re-elected the two succeeding years. In 1844 he was elected to the legislative council and served two years. He filled a seat in the state legislature for one term, be- ing elected in 1851. In 1853 he was appointed United States marshal of the district of Iowa under President Pierce, served through his administra- tion, and was reappointed under James Buchanan, and served eight years. Since 1861 he has followed contracting and various other occupations. He was elected to the mayoralty of Le Claire four terms, and served as deputy sheriff of Scott county for three years. In 1874 he was elected one of the trus- tees of the Iowa Agricultural college.

It is seldom that anyone can show a record which so attests to the respect and esteem in which they are held as Laurel Summers. His honors were the fruit of industry, perseverance, and intelligence far above the average, and his death leaves another large vacancy in the fast thinning ranks of Scott county's pioneer settlers.

Funeral of Laurel Summers.

The following Davenporters attended the funeral of the late Laurel Summers of LeClaire: Ald. Lemuel Parkhurst, Milton Parkhurst, Dr. J. A. DeArmond, James Davenport, H. B. Harford, J. H. Manwaring and Mrs. L. Kellet. The funeral was largely attended by the numerous friends of the deceased living in and about LeClaire. He was one of the early settlers of Scott county and was one of the prominent characters of its early history, having served in the first territorial legislature in 1828 and being re-elected the two succeeding years. In 1844 he was elected to the legislative council and served two years. Again in 1850 he was elected to the state legislature. In 1853 he was appointed United States marshal for the district of Iowa under President Pierce. He was reappointed under President Buchanan and served eight years. He was mayor of LeClaire four years and served as deputy sheriff of Scott county for 3 years. He was highly respected by all who knew him for his honesty and integrity, and the kindness of his manner.

on a level grade. How, then, is it practicable to such roads—at least in the major older states?

We will suppose that the average township is equal to three square, and that to put in touch great country road, and especially markets and railroad stations, it is necessary to give it two intersecting "dation" roads, making in all square miles of improved road course the existing roads would be utilized, but on this principle it is assumed that these roads can be constructed for \$4,000 per mile, and kept in repair for 5 per cent. annually of the cost. This would give \$48,000 sum needed for which to issue bonds. The yearly charge would then be 5 per cent. interest on \$48,000—\$2,400 fund, 1 per cent. annually, for 5 years, \$480; total, \$2,880. These are not here included in the amount because they are needed in all cases but under the present systems are completely wasted.

The outcome of the plan here proposed would be that as the sinking fund would liquidate the bonds at maturity township at the end of thirty years have at least twelve miles of the good road paid for, and which is always maintained at a less cost than now expended on roads that are times well nigh impassable. But an infinitesimal part of the benefit is derived from the improvement. In all cases the only reason why city men do not reside in some choice localities is that they cannot have the convenience of driving over good roads. Laurel Summers was born in Montgomery Co., Ky., Oct. 2, 1812; was a son of Enoch and Elsie Summers, *nee* Hadden, natives of Kentucky, who were married in 1811, in Montgomery County of that State. In 1823 they removed to Morgan Co., Ind., where Enoch Summers entered land and farmed until his death, which occurred in 1845. The family then removed to Iowa, where the mother died in Jackson County, in 1867, having been the mother of six children—Laurel, Presley, Redman, Shelton, Dolly and Caleb. Mr. and Mrs. Enoch Summers in early life were members of the Baptist church, but upon the organization of the Christian church, joined that denomination, and affiliated with them until their death. He gave time and money to the building up of the church, and was one of its most zealous workers. The subject of this memoir remained on the farm in Morgan County until 1830, when he went to Indianapolis, where he learned the trade of brick mason. This he followed until 1837, when, being drawn thither by the then prevailing current, he came West, and located in the Territory of Wisconsin, in what is now Scott Co., Ia. He here made a Government claim and embarked in farming. He also established a cattle ranch partnership with his brother, buying cattle from Indiana. The investment did not prove a lucrative one, and it was abandoned soon after. In 1838 he was elected to the first Territorial Legislature, and was re-elected the two succeeding years. In May, 1841, he married Miss Mary Parkhurst, who was born in Ontario Co., N. Y., Jan. 11, 1822, and was a daughter of Sterling and Ann Parkhurst, the former a native of Massachusetts, and the latter of New Hampshire, who were married in the State of New York. The union of Mr. and Mrs. Summers has been blessed with five children—Helen L., now Mrs. C. P. Whitford; Elsie A., widow of E. S. Curtis; Sarah, now Mrs. W. P. Headley, Lewis C., who died in infancy, and Augustus D. Mr. Summers followed his trade until 1844, when he was elected to the Legislative Council, and served two years. In 1850 he was elected to the State Legislature, and in 1853 was appointed United States Marshal of the district of Iowa under President Pierce; served through his administration and was reappointed under James Buchanan, and served eight years. Since 1861 he has followed contracting and various other occupations. He was elected to the mayoralty of Le Claire four terms, and served as deputy sheriff of Scott County for three years. In 1874 he was elected one of the trustees of the Iowa Agricultural College at Ames, and served in that capacity four years. Mr. Summers was educated in the Democratic school of politics, and still adheres to the principles of that party.

Frederick Thelemann, Le Claire, was born in Hanover, Germany, Nov. 21, 1823. In 1849 he came to the United States, landing in Baltimore, Md., May 17, and immediately proceeded to

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with remarkable energy, and under all circumstances had the courage of her convictions. She was associated with Mrs. Dr. Peck and other ladies on the Davenport library board, and was also one of the nine trustees selected by Mrs. Clarissa Cook for the Davenport library, being the only lady selected in fifteen years. She held the office of treasurer of the Davenport Library Association for a number of years, and devoted a great part of her life to Catholic Church work. She organized the first Catholic Union Society in Davenport and was its first president, and also represented that society on the board of the associated charities of the city.

HON. LAUREL SUMMERS.

HON. LAUREL SUMMERS was born October 2, 1812, and his birthplace was in Montgomery County, Kentucky. He was a son of Enoch and Elsie (Hadden) Summers, who were also natives of that State. In 1830 young Laurel decided to learn a trade and went to Indianapolis, Indiana, where he became a brick-maker's apprentice. Having mastered the trade he secured work as a journeyman and saved his hard earnings until having accumulated a small amount of money he decided to come farther west. In 1837 he settled in the Territory of Iowa in what is now Scott County, entered a tract of Government land and embarked in farming. In connection with his agricultural interests he and his brother dealt to some extent in live stock, driving the stock overland from Indiana. In 1838 he was selected by his friends as a candidate for the lower branch of the Territorial Legislature, and was unanimously elected. His career during the term made him many friends and ardent supporters, and he was subsequently elected to succeed himself the two succeeding terms. In 1844 he was elected to the Legislative Council and served two years, and in 1850 he was elected

to the State Legislature. In 1853 he was appointed United States marshal of the District of Iowa under President Pierce. He served through President Pierce's administration and was reappointed under James Buchanan and served four more years. During his term in the Legislative Council it was his vote that located the capital at Iowa City, for which he deserved great credit at the time, owing to its central location. Prior to the war and during his political career there were few men in the State of Iowa who wielded the influence that Mr. Summers did. He was noted for his honesty and integrity and thought all men were like himself until he found them otherwise.

In May, 1841, he was united in marriage to Miss Mary, daughter of Sterling and Ann Parkhurst, who were pioneer settlers of Scott County.

Mr. Summers after retiring from participation in the conduct of State affairs served his home city four terms as mayor, and was also deputy sheriff under Harvey Leonard three years. In 1874 he was elected one of the trustees of the Iowa Agricultural College at Ames and served in that capacity for four years. Fifteen years prior to his death his health began failing, caused no doubt by overexertion mentally, and he gradually went down until April 15, 1890, when he passed away, leaving a family and a large number of friends in all parts of the State to mourn his loss.

JUDGE ASAH EL H. BENNETT.

ASAHEL HICKS BENNETT was born in Swanzey, New Hampshire, in 1806. He was educated in New Hampshire and admitted to the bar of the County of Cheshire and State of New Hampshire in the year 1836. For twenty years thereafter, until his removal to Davenport, Iowa, he held a position as one of the foremost lawyers of the State.

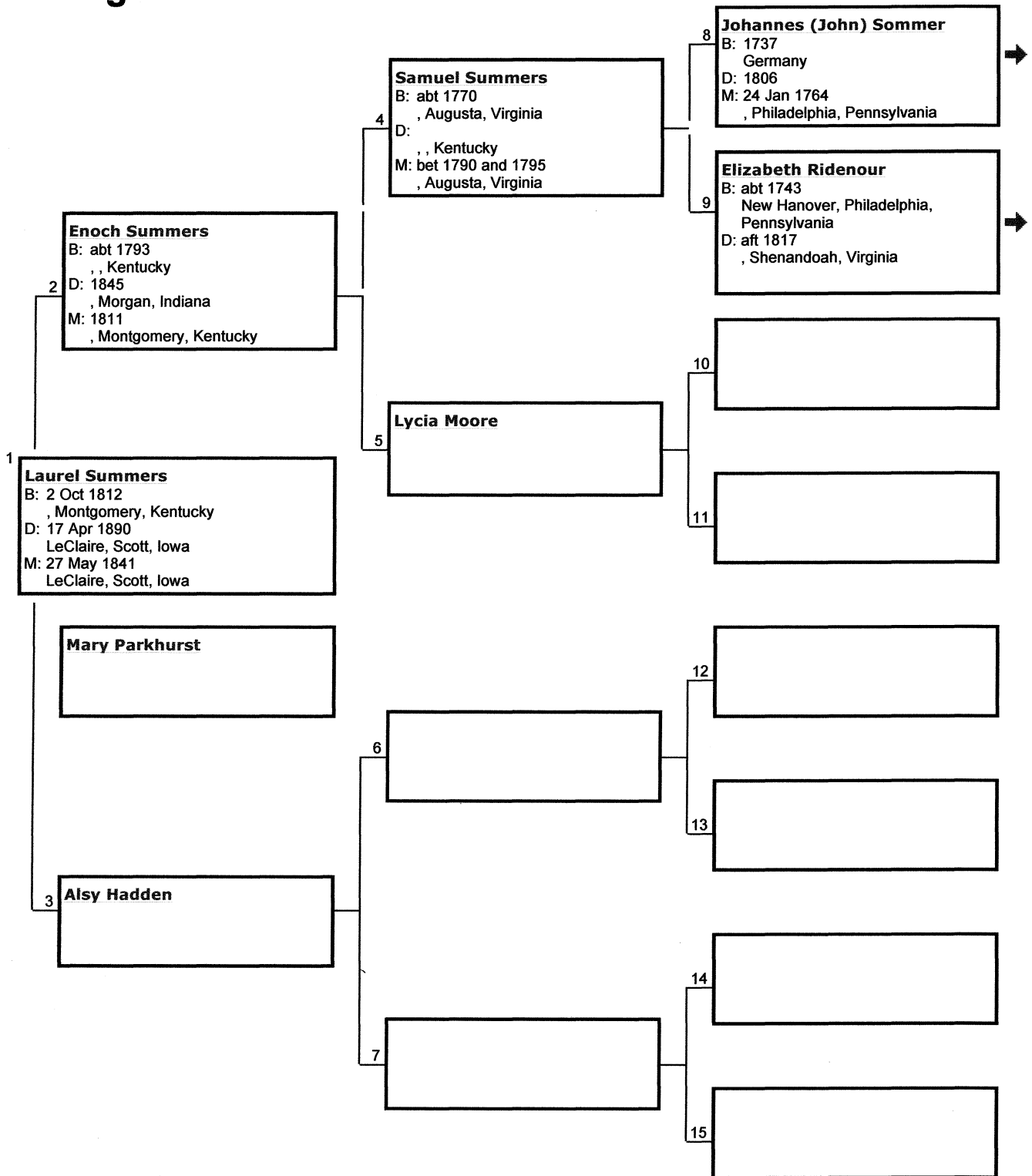

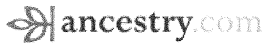
