D. Myron Tripp Killed in Road Mishap Friday

**Asst. Attorney General Died Friday
Morning at Webster City**

Atty. D. Myron (Dick) Tripp, of Newton, formerly of Colfax, died early Friday morning at a hospital in Webster City, Iowa, from injuries received Thursday when he stepped from a moving automobile in which he was riding and was thrown to the pavement, in an attempt to stop another car that was weaving all over the highway. His skull was fractured in the fall and he never regained consciousness.

Mr. Tripp was riding with H. O. Hicock, right of way engineer of the state highway commission, and for several miles, they had followed the weaving car. Mr. Hicock stated that,

"I drove alongside of the weaving car and Tripp stepped on the running board to stop it. He jumped in the opposite direction from which the car was going and smashed his head to the pavement."

The driver of the truck, Benjamin Thatcher of Des Moines is being held in the Webster City jail in default of a \$750 bond.

Funeral services were held Sunday at the Christian church in Newton, with Rev. Paul Becker of Des Moines officiating.

The high esteem in which Mr. Tripp was held not only in his home county, but throughout the state was shown when near one thousand people gathered at Newton Sunday to pay their last respects. Two churches were used with loud speaker connections to accommodate the people attending.

D. Myron Tripp was born Sept. 6, 1882, in Clear Creek township, son of Mr. and Mrs. Garner M. Tripp, pioneers of Jasper county. His early education was in the Colfax Schools.

After completing his school work here he attended Drake University, graduating from the college of law in 1906. He immediately joined his

father, Garner M. Tripp, in Colfax in the practice of law, remaining here until 1920 when he moved to Newton and opened a law office.

During these years Mr. Tripp has been honored with a number of public offices of trust. He served as city attorney for the City of Colfax, County Attorney for Jasper county. In 1934 he was elected State Senator from this district and last February he was appointed by Attorney General O'Conner an assistant attorney general in charge of the State Highway Commission.

He was a member of the Church of Christ and always a worker, having served for years as an elder and later a deacon in his church.

In 1906 he was united in marriage to Vera B. Stouffer of Colfax and to them two sons were born, Francis preceding his father in death, and Myron, who is a student of electrical engineering in Chicago. Besides his wife and son, he is survived by four sisters and two brothers, Mrs. Eleanor Cox of Colfax, Mrs. H. J. McMurray, Newton; Miss Grace Tripp, LaCrosse, Wis., Mrs. Leo Hauptert of Newton, and two brothers, N. W. Tripp, Windsor, Colo., and A. J. Tripp, Brighton, Colo., besides many other relatives and friends.

Rev. Becker of Des Moines, who preached the funeral service, was a personal friend and he paid the highest of tribute to Mr. Tripp as a man of high ideal, and a christian gentleman on every occasion.

In the congregation that came to pay their last tribute to Mr. Tripp were judges from the supreme court, high state officials, boyhood friends and friends and associates of later years.

of Iowa, died in a Webster City
hospital early Friday.

Fractures Skull in Fall To Pavement Trying To Stop "Weaver"

Fatally injured when he stepped
off the running board of the auto-
mobile in which he was riding and
fell to the pavement, D. Myron
(Dick) Tripp died in a Webster
City hospital at 5.30 a. m. Friday.

Mr. Tripp, an assistant attorney-
general of Iowa, attached to the
Iowa highway commission, suffer-
ed a skull fracture when he at-
tempted to stop a truck that was
weaving back and forth across
the highway near Webster City.

Accident at 8 p. m.

The accident occurred at about
8 p. m. Thursday evening. Ac-
cording to H. O. Hickok,
right of way engineer of the high-
way commission, with whom Mr.
Tripp was riding, they attempted
to stop a truck that was weaving
back and forth across the highway.

Mr. Tripp climbed onto the
running board of his car, Hickok
said, and signaled the other driver
to stop.

He jumped in the opposite di-
rection from which the car was
going, Hickok stated, and was
thrown to the pavement, striking
his head.

Funeral services were held at the
First Christian church Sunday at-
ternoon, with an attendance so
large that an overflow group heard
the obseques over an amplifier ar-

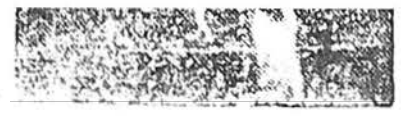

LABOR DES MOINES, Iowa,
May 15. —(P)—J. C. state labor federation president) Lewis, canny wire puller for the labor cause, served notice today on primary candidates that organized workers are tending to their knitting and keeping away from intra-party primary fights. INJURY FATAL TO NEWTON MAN

Highway Commission
Attorney Dies After
Skull Fracture.

HURT LAST NIGHT

Dick Tripp, 55, of Newton, attorney for the state highway commission, suffered a skull fracture near here about 8 o'clock last night and died at the hospital here at 7 o'clock this morning.

Tripp was injured when he stepped off the running board of the car in which he was riding and fell to the pavement. The accident happened on No. 20 near Duncombe.

He was riding with H. O. Hickok, of the highway commission. Hickok said they attempted to stop a car that was weaving back and forth across the highway. Tripp climbed onto the running board of his car, Hickok said, and signaled the other driver to stop. Tripp jumped in the opposite direction from which the car was going, Hickok said, and smashed his head to the pavement.

The driver of the other car was held by Webster county officers.

Tripp's body was removed to Newton by a Newton undertaker.

His wife, two sisters and two brothers-in-law were at his bedside when he died. It was said that he had only held the office as attorney for the highway commission a short time.

Des Moines Man Held For Death Of Myron Tripp

Charged With Driving An Automobile While Intoxicated

Fort Dodge (AP)—Failing to furnish bond, Benjamin Thatcher of Des Moines was held for grand jury action today following arraignment on charges of driving an automobile while intoxicated.

Thatcher's arrest grew out of an accident near here Thursday night in which D. Myron Tripp of Newton, state highway commission attorney, was fatally injured.

Tripp cracked his head against the pavement as he stepped from a car driven by H. O. Hickock, highway engineer, after signalling Thatcher to stop his machine.

and died at his home in Oskaloosa, Iowa, September 2, 1935, at the age of seventy-three years. His entire life was spent in Mahaska county with the exception of five years.

Mr. Shangle received his education in the country schools and graduated from Penn College, Oskaloosa, in 1883. He taught school for a number of years; studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1889.

He was united in marriage to Mattie Fauquier at Oskaloosa, June 4, 1902. His wife survives him.

Mr. Shangle was always interested in the affairs of his home town, county and state. For eighteen years he was secretary of the city school board, and had been identified as trustee, member of the executive committee, and treasurer of William Penn College. For years he was secretary of Mahaska County Fair Association, was active in the Ioway Tribe No. 4 of Red Men. He took a great interest in his farm property, and in political activities.

Mr. Shangle was elected to the state senate in 1932 and left the term unfinished. As a Democrat he took an active part in all the deliberations of his party.

Be It Resolved, That in the passing of the Honorable L. T. Shangle, the State of Iowa mourns the loss of one of its honored and distinguished citizens.

D. MYRON TRIPP

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee, which was appointed to report resolutions commemorating the life, character, and services of the late D. Myron Tripp, begs leave to submit the following report:

D. Myron Tripp was born on a farm in Clear Creek township, Jasper county, Iowa, September 6, 1882, and died May 15, 1936, at Webster City, Iowa.

He received his education in the Colfax public schools, Des Moines University, and Drake University, graduating from Drake University College of Law in June, 1906. Following graduation he practiced law with his father, the late Garner M. Tripp, at Colfax, until 1920 when he moved to Newton. He served as city attorney of Colfax, and as attorney and member of the Newton city council.

In 1906 he was united in marriage with Miss Vera B. Stouffer, who, with one son, Myron D. Tripp, survive him.

In 1933, as a democrat, he was elected state senator from the twenty-

ninth district, Jasper county, to fill a vacancy caused by the death of Senator O. P. Myers.

In 1934 he returned to his private practice of law and in February of that year was appointed by Attorney General Edward L. O'Connor as an assistant attorney general for the highway commission, with headquarters at Ames, and was serving in this capacity at the time of his death.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That in the death of the Honorable D. Myron Tripp the state has lost a valuable and honored citizen, and that we extend to his widow and son our sincere sympathy.

Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be printed in the Journal of the Senate as a commemoration of the life and worth of the deceased, and that enrolled copies hereof be transmitted to the widow and son.

T. F. DRISCOLL

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life and services of the late Honorable T. F. Driscoll, Senator from the First District, Lee county, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following report:

Timothy Francis Driscoll was born November 18, 1896, of Irish parentage, at Belfast, Iowa, and passed away in Des Moines on February 23, 1937, while a member of the Senate of the Forty-seventh General Assembly.

Mr. Driscoll was educated in the grade schools, and graduated from the High School of Farmington, Iowa. Spending his entire life in Lee county, he was highly successful in farming and stock raising, and was active in banking, and the production of stone products.

On February 22, 1922, he was united in marriage with Margaret Rita Burke of Argyle, Iowa, and to this union were born nine children, six daughters and three sons, all of whom survive him. Mr. Driscoll was a World War Veteran, a member of St. Boniface Catholic Church, Knights of Columbus, American Legion, the Elks Lodge, and the Moose.

He was elected to the Iowa Senate in 1934, and was completing his first term when death overtook this highly esteemed and dearly beloved public servant.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Forty-seventh General Assembly: That in the passing of the late Honorable T. F. Driscoll, the state has lost an honorable and valuable citizen, a man of high ideals in Christian living and faithful, useful citizenship.
