<u>House File 636</u>, an Act relating to legislative branch consolidation of functions by combining the Legislative Service Bureau, Legislative Fiscal Bureau, and Legislative Computer Support Bureau into a single central legislative staff agency, providing for legislative publications procedures, modifying the sales tax exemption for items sold or services provided by the new agency, including related matters, and providing an effective date.
