SENATE MESSAGES CONSIDERED

<u>Senate Joint Resolution 2002</u>, by committee on Natural Resources and Environment, a joint resolution designating the American cream draft horse as the official state horse of the State of Iowa.

Read first time and referred to committee on Natural Resources.

Senate File 2191, by committee on Education, a bill for an act relating to the development of a policy governing responses to a fire alarm activated on school grounds outside of a scheduled fire drill by school districts, accredited nonpublic schools, charter schools, and innovation zone schools, and including effective date provisions.

Read first time and referred to committee on **Education**.

<u>Senate File 2196</u>, by committee on Education, a bill for an act relating to the provision of information relating to school immunization exemptions.

Read first time and referred to committee on **Health and Human** Services.

Senate File 2243, by committee on Technology, a bill for an act relating to sexual exploitation of a minor by the creation, adaptation, or modification of a visual depiction to give the appearance that an identifiable minor is engaged in a prohibited sexual act or the simulation of a prohibited sexual act, and making penalties applicable.
