#### INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

<u>House File 2651</u>, by Best, a bill for an act relating to certain health care plan's cost-sharing for essential health benefits.

Read first time and referred to committee on Commerce.

House File 2652, by committee on Appropriations, a bill for an act relating to school security, including by modifying provisions related to the issuance of school bonds, requiring schools to conduct school safety reviews and have access to a public safety answering point, establishing the firearm detection software grant program within the department of homeland security and emergency management, requiring the department of public safety to convene a task force related to the safety and security standards of schools and school infrastructure, making appropriations, and including effective date and applicability provisions.

Read first time and placed on the Appropriations calendar.

House File 2653, by committee on Appropriations, a bill for an act relating to school districts, including by modifying provisions related to the district management levy, waiving certain specified duties,

responsibilities, and requirements for the school year beginning July 1, 2023, and ending June 30, 2024, and including effective date provisions.

Read first time and placed on the Appropriations calendar.

<u>House File 2654</u>, by committee on Ways and Means, a bill for an act relating to tax collections for buildings or improvements erected or made by a person on land owned by another person.

Read first time and placed on the Ways and Means calendar.

House File 2655, by committee on Ways and Means, a bill for an act placing assessment limitations for property tax purposes on commercial child care facilities, and including effective date, applicability, and retroactive applicability provisions.

Read first time and placed on the Ways and Means calendar.
