INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

<u>House Joint Resolution 2006</u>, by committee on Ways and Means, a joint resolution proposing amendments to the Constitution of the State of Iowa relating to requirements for certain state tax law changes and requiring a single rate for individual income taxes.

Read first time and placed on the Ways and Means calendar.

<u>House File 2658</u>, by committee on Appropriations, a bill for an act relating to state child care assistance program reimbursement rates and eligibility for the children of certain child care providers.

Read first time and placed on the Appropriations calendar.

House File 2659, by committee on Ways and Means, a bill for an act relating to the licensure of medical cannabidiol dispensaries.

Read first time and placed on the Ways and Means calendar.

House File 2660, by committee on Ways and Means, a bill for an act relating to eligibility for claiming the research activities tax credit available against the individual and corporate income tax, and including retroactive applicability provisions.
