The House met pursuant to adjournment at 8:34 a.m., Wills of Dickinson in the chair.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

House Joint Resolution 2007, by committee on Ways and Means, a joint resolution nullifying administrative rules of the department of revenue relating to electronic filing procedures for certain tax returns and including effective date provisions.

Read first time and placed on the Ways and Means calendar.

House File 2665, by committee on Ways and Means, a bill for an act relating to fur-bearing animals, including the establishment of a raccoon bounty program and fund and the assessment of fur dealer license fees, making appropriations, and providing penalties.

Read first time and placed on the Ways and Means calendar.

House File 2666, by committee on Ways and Means, a bill for an act relating to the farm tenancy net income exclusion available against the individual income tax, and including effective date and retroactive applicability provisions.

Read first time and placed on the Ways and Means calendar.

House File 2667, by committee on Ways and Means, a bill for an act relating to the treasurer of state's duties, including Iowa educational savings plan trust and Iowa ABLE savings plan trust requirements and disposition of unclaimed property, and including retroactive applicability provisions.

Read first time and placed on the Ways and Means calendar.

<u>House File 2668</u>, by committee on Appropriations, a bill for an act relating to insurance coverage for biomarker testing.

Read first time and placed on the **Appropriations calendar**.

<u>House File 2669</u>, by committee on Ways and Means, a bill for an act relating to the sale of wine, including private wine sales and wine auction permits, providing fees, and making penalties applicable.

Read first time and placed on the Ways and Means calendar.
