INTRODUCTION OF BILL

House File 2688, by committee on Appropriations, a bill for an act providing for a rural veterinary practice innovation and revitalization fund and program to assist veterinary practices in certain counties, and making appropriations.

Read first time and placed on the Appropriations calendar.
