House File 2164, an Act relating to insurance companies acting as surety for bail bonds, including licensure requirements to act as a bail enforcement agent or business.

<u>House File 2248</u>, an Act relating to robbery in the first degree, robbery in the second degree, and the applicable statutes of limitations.

House File 2262, an Act relating to money transmission services, providing penalties, and including effective date and retroactive applicability provisions.

House File 2263, an Act relating to the insurance commissioner's authority concerning insurance producers, business entity producers, and preneed sellers, continuing care retirement facilities, and continuing care retirement programs.
