PIONEER LAWMAKERS ADDRESS

Representative Brent Siegrist introduced David Yepsen, who addressed the House as follows:

President Sinclair, Speaker Grassley, Members of the General Assembly, Pioneer Lawmakers and Honorary members.

It is an honor to be invited to make this address.

A special thank you to Representative Brent Siegrist and former Representative Scott Newhard for inviting me to do this. I first told them no... that I've retired, have lost my fastball and want to quit while I was ahead. Besides, I also gave this Pioneer address 27 years ago.

They said that's okay. No one here now was here back then so I could just give the same speech... Everyone in this room does that in a campaign...

I said I'd write a new one.

I'd also like to remember something Gov. Terry Branstad once told me. I mentioned to him after a press conference that I had to deliver the commencement speech at my high school's graduation in Jefferson that year.

He quickly cut me off and said "Don't go too long. They won't remember a thing you say but they will remember if you go too long... There's a reason he never lost an election.

For openers, I want to thank the current members of the GA—and their loved ones—for your service. Serving here comes at a cost - time away from loved ones, businesses and farms. It's those folks back home who have to pick up the slack... And it's a job you do for relatively little pay.

When I started working for the Register in 1974, an Iowa legislator was paid \$5,500 a year. Adjusted for inflation, that figure today would be \$36,000.

And a District Court judge made \$25,000. When adjusted for inflation, that's \$165,000 today.

Now, I know it's hard to ask for a raise. But I'm an old political writer so I'm not afraid of making people mad... So let me say to the people of Iowa: Your hired help working for you here in this building deserves a raise.

I also want to thank both the professional and the partisan staffers working here. I thank the people in the lobby. They also work long hours for what they see as a better Iowa.

And this year, even the protesters are working overtime for there are lots of grievances they seek to redress.

Someday historians will look back at these times and note how incredibly difficult they are.

Our country is at war. Iowans and Americans are again making the ultimate sacrifice. Our gratitude and prayers go out to all who wear the uniform and who are going in harms' way.

We face crises on the farm. Just like the 1930s, some of it is caused by tariffs.

You face health care problems and problems of water quality.

You have the difficult task of balancing the needs of our largest industries with the needs of our health and the requirement that we protect God's creation.

Then there are the challenges of digital technologies. From its impact on children, to the impact of data centers, to speed cameras, much of a legislator's work is reacting to new technology. Happens every session. One of the epic fights in this room was over how Iowans should use the new technology of oleo margarine. And are you coming to grips with Artificial Intelligence? I mean, is this really David Yepsen up here?

Historians will make comparisons with the challenges you face those of your predecessors. One of MY predecessors covering politics for The Register was George Mills. He used to tell stories to me of the protests here during the Great Depression.

He even pointed out that hook you can still see on the ground floor of the rotunda. He told me it was put up in the fall of 1936 to screen President Franklin Roosevelt coming into the capitol in his wheelchair to meet with his Kansas Gov. Alf Landon, his Republican opponent that year—along with other midwestern governors.

I fear you'll need another such meeting here.

On a happier note, being in this room brings back fond personal memories for me.

This is my third speech from this podium. There was that earlier Pioneer Lawmakers speech. And there was one after I was elected Boys State Governor in 1967. I was 16.

During my reporting days, my wife was pregnant with our first child. I was sitting over there on the left when Kathy Jury working in the speakers office came running out and said "your wife's on the phone!" Sure enough that was THE call.

"Are you ready to be a dad? Then get over here to the hospital."

The next day Representative Minnette Doderer was back there and rose for a short point. "Yesterday was a great day for Iowa women," she said. Everyone looked around. "Yesterday David Yepsen's wife gave birth to a daughter and that's going to make him a lot more sensitive to the needs of women."

In grade school daughter Elizabeth ran for class office. Of course I gave her lots of advice. But she came home one day with tears in her eyes. She'd lost. "All the boys voted for the boy but all the girls didn't vote for me." I felt terrible but she learned a life lesson.

And I learned never to go into political consulting.

Up there in the crow's nest I was getting ready to anchor Public TVs coverage of a condition of the state speech when I started to have an allergic reaction to something. My face started to swell. No way I go on camera. They took me to the hospital and brought Kay Henderson in to fill in.

I spent the speech in the ER.

And up there on your right was where Joyce Russell from Iowa Public Radio used to anchor live coverage of the floor debates. When she went up THERE, the mikes down

HERE went up too — farmers back home on tractors with big red radios were listening so it was a good time to make a speech.

Speaker Del Stromer motions me over and whispers. “Go up there and tell Joyce to shut that blankety-blank thing off. I’m trying to shut down this place.

Then there is the air conditioning in this room. George Mills told me that one of the worst things done around here was air conditioning the capitol because it prolonged the sessions.

I told that story to Speaker Don Avenson one sweaty night as HE was trying to shut down a session. He thought about shutting off the AC. But he wasn’t sure whether the Legislature or the Executive controlled the switch.

I loved late night sessions. Got to sleep on the floor up there in the back of the gallery. Reporters once determined there was an unwritten rule that no gambling bill could ever pass until after the sun goes down.

Do odd things still happen during shut downs? Big flurry of amendments. Representative Vern Harvey of Bettendorf once voted against an amendment in committee that was intended to reduce suburban property taxes.

I grabbed him and asked “Why did you do that? It’s to benefit your people!”

He shot back: “I don’t know why. I DO know this bill was written by farmers and in the Iowa Legislature God never made a dumb farmer.”

Speaking of farmers, Ruhl Maulsby of Rockwell City was tired of repair bills. So he tried to tack an amendment onto a Regents appropriation banning the construction of any more flat-roofed buildings on campuses. A little common sense from the farm, right? But it sent the Regents’ lobbyists into a tizz.

And do you still have 7 a.m. ag committee meetings here? Those were always tough for reporters to make. Especially if you’d been out with the labor Democrats the night before. But I showed up at 7 one morning, saw Senator Berl Priebe having coffee and asked where the ag committee meeting was.

Oh, we’re all done.” he chuckled.

Speaker Stromer later went to work for Sen. Charles Grassley. One time we were campaigning around Warren County in Del’s big red red Cadillac. Our next stop was the Indianola City Hall. Dell pulled up right in front and Grassley says “uh, park around the corner Del. We can walk.”

I guess Grassley didn’t want to be seen getting out of a Cadillac.

There’s a reason he’s won so many elections too.

As was mentioned in the introduction, a few years ago I left Iowa to run the Paul Simon Public Policy Institute at Southern Illinois University.

I enjoyed my time in Illinois working with students.

Fun politics too. If you want to feel better about your budget problems, go read about the ones in Illinois.

And our two state capitol buildings have a number of similarities. Some of the same architects and designers worked on each.

But Iowa's building is much better maintained and is much cleaner.

In more ways than one. We have no former Speakers of the House in a federal prison in West Virginia.

I could go on telling old war stories. That's what's done at Pioneer Lawmakers. But you have work to do.

So in closing, each of us knows that someday, we will be held to account. And you can say you worked and fought to make Iowa a better place.

We can disagree on what that looks like, but to quote Theodore Roosevelt...

The credit belongs to the man actually in the arena—whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood—who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes up short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming. But who DOES actually STRIVE to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause And who—at the best—knows—in the end the triumph of high achievement. And who at the worst, if they fail—at least fail while daring greatly—so that their place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who know neither victory nor defeat.

So thank you all for being in Iowa's arena.


