Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)

Federal Program. LIHEAP is a federally funded block grant program administered by the Administration for Children and Families of the United States Department of Health and Human Services. A block grant is an amount of federal funds that is awarded to a state or local governing agency, based on a formula, to be spent for a broadly defined purpose with relatively few restrictions. This allows the state or local agency receiving the funds to target expenditure of the funds and design administrative mechanisms to effectuate the purposes of the program.¹

LIHEAP block grant funds are allocated to all 50 states and the District of Columbia pursuant to formulas based on each area's residential energy or heating expenditures and heating degree days. In applying for a LIHEAP grant, a state must meet the application requirements set out in federal law. The primary purpose of the program is to assist low-income households with the payment of residential heating costs.²

LIHEAP also includes emergency contingency funds which the President may request Congress to appropriate to meet additional home energy assistance needs of one or more states that arise from a natural disaster or other emergency.³ Recently, state LIHEAP directors urged President Bush to release emergency funds to pay cooling costs resulting from this summer's heat wave.⁴

State Program. In Iowa, LIHEAP is administered by the Bureau of Energy Assistance, Division of Community Action Agencies, of the Iowa Department of Human Rights.⁵

The Division of Community Action Agencies is overseen by the Iowa Commission on Community Action Agencies, which is comprised of nine members who are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate, and serve three-year terms. By law, one-third of the commission's members must be elected officials; one-third must be representatives of business, industry, labor, religious, welfare, and educational organizations, or other major interest groups; and one-third must have incomes at or below poverty level.⁶

The Division of Community Action Agencies works with a network of 18 community action agencies to administer a variety of programs, including LIHEAP and the Weatherization Program. Community action agencies serve all 99 counties in the state and are primarily nonprofit organizations that network with other local organizations to serve low-income, elderly, and disabled residents. The local organizations receive funding from federal, state, and local public and private sources.⁷

The Bureau of Energy Assistance of the Division of Community Action Agencies administers LIHEAP for the purposes of assisting qualifying low-income lowa households with a portion of their residential heating costs for the winter heating season, encouraging regular utility payments, promoting energy awareness, and encouraging reduction of energy usage through energy efficiency, client education, and weatherization.⁸

Eligibility for LIHEAP is determined pursuant to state income guidelines based on income and the size of the household. Applications are accepted on a first come/first served basis at local community action agency offices. A household that is eligible for LIHEAP is also automatically eligible for weatherization services.⁹

lowa's Outreach and Targeting Study. In 2000, the Division of Community Action Agencies retained a consultant to study how LIHEAP could enroll more low-income households, particularly those with high-priority recipients such as the lowest income households, households with children age six or younger, households with elderly members (defined in lowa as age 60 or older), and households with disabled members. The resulting study, entitled Outreach Strategies for lowa LIHEAP Program: Innovation in Improved Targeting, recommended using a joint application for multiple programs including LIHEAP and targeting outreach efforts to recipients of benefits from other programs for low-income households. The study also recommended allowing entities other than community action agencies, such as public schools, child care resource and referral centers, child support enforcement agencies, and faith-based organizations, to disseminate information about LIHEAP and take applications for the program, and increasing administrative support to such nontraditional outreach entities.¹⁰

lowa Law. Chapter 216A, subchapter 6, governs the Division of Community Action Agencies of the Iowa Department of Human Rights. There are also administrative rules governing LIHEAP.¹¹

For federal fiscal year 2006-2007, the General Assembly appropriated over \$34.5 million of anticipated federal funding for LIHEAP in the state. This appropriation specified that up to 15 percent of the amount appropriated be used for residential weatherization or other related home repairs for low-income households; up to 10 percent of the remainder be allocated to LIHEAP's administrative expenses; and not more than 5 percent be used for assessment and resolution of energy problems, such as assisting low-income households in negotiating payment plans with utilities.¹²

For state fiscal year 2005-2006, the General Assembly made a supplemental appropriation from the State General Fund of over \$2.8 million to LIHEAP, authorized the unused funding to carry forward to the next state fiscal year, and requested the Legislative Council to authorize this interim study committee to review the issues set forth in the committee charge. 13

Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP)

Federal Program. WAP is a federal grant program that was established in the United States Department of Energy in 1976 to help reduce the heating and cooling costs of low-income persons, especially the elderly, disabled, and children, by improving the energy efficiency of their homes. The program finances the installation of energy efficiency measures in the homes of qualifying households free of charge by weatherization service providers. The federal program provides funding and technical guidance to the states to carry out the purposes of the program but, like LIHEAP, each state administers its own weatherization program, sets eligibility standards, and selects service providers. State Program. In Iowa, WAP is administered by the Bureau of Weatherization, Division of Community Action Agencies, of the Iowa Department of Human Rights.

Pursuant to WAP, the 18 local community action agencies in the state select and oversee entities that use trained crews and contractors to install cost-effective weatherization measures in eligible households. As indicated earlier, a household that is eligible for LIHEAP is automatically eligible for weatherization services.¹⁶

Energy efficiency measures are installed in an eligible household after a computerized energy audit is performed to determine the cost-effectiveness of each measure in a dwelling. Such measures may include installing high-density wall and attic insulation; sealing doors, windows, and ducts; basic heating and cooling repairs; and education on proper use and maintenance of measures installed. Weatherization crews also test heating systems and gas appliances for carbon monoxide.¹⁷

WAP has also participated in a Baseload Reduction Program which is a partnership between utility companies and WAP to reduce electric baseload consumption in low-income homes through installation of new, energy-efficient refrigerators and freezers in those homes.¹⁸

lowa Law. Like LIHEAP, WAP is administered pursuant to lowa Code Chapter 216A, subchapter 6, which governs the Division of Community Action Agencies of the Iowa Department of Human Services. There are also administrative rules governing WAP.¹⁹

LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (LIHEAP) Fiscal Year 2006 lowa Fact Sheet

What is LIHEAP?

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is a federally funded block grant administered by the lowa Department of Human Rights/Division of Community Action Agencies. It is designed to help eligible low-income lowa households in the payment of a portion of their non-business residential heating costs for the winter heating season. The state contracts with community action agencies throughout the state for local program delivery.

The LIHEAP payment is made directly to energy suppliers for households who heat with natural gas, electricity, liquid propane, fuel oil, wood, coal, and corn.

Five-percent of program funds are allocated under the Energy Crisis Intervention Program (ECIP). These funds can be used for emergency fuel delivery, emergency service reconnection, repair or replacement of furnace/heating system, temporary shelter, and purchase of blankets and/or heaters, fans and air conditioners.

Up to five percent of program funds may be allocated to conduct assessment and resolution activities. Such activities include: budget counseling, energy education, outside referrals, arranging deferred or budget payment plans, staying a disconnect or negotiating payments or reconnections on the behalf of clients. Other activities include improving accessibility to the program to potential clients, making home visits, traveling to alternate intake sights and providing publicity concerning availability of Energy Assistance.

Fifteen percent of program funds are transferred to the Weatherization Assistance Program.

In 2006, 89,638 households (217,894 individuals) received benefits from LIHEAP. The average assistance award was approximately \$451.

How is LIHEAP funded?

Currently funds are received in the form of a block grant from the United States Department of Health and Human Services.

What are the eligibility guidelines for LIHEAP?

A household applying for LIHEAP must report total household income for all persons 18 years of age and older. The household has the option to choose an income qualification period of either annual income or the past ninety (90) days.

Applications for the regular LIHEAP program will be accepted from November 1, 2005, (October 1, 2005 for the elderly and disabled) through April 15, 2006.

The total household income for an applicant must be at or below 150 percent of the 2005 federal poverty guidelines, which are listed below:

For households with more than six members, add \$1,222.50 / \$4,890.00 for each additional member.

Are there any exceptions to the guidelines?

Residents of publicly assisted housing units who are not vulnerable to the rising cost of heat are ineligible.

Where can LIHEAP applications be obtained?

Citizens may apply at their local community action agency from November 1, 2005, (October 1 for elderly/disabled persons) through April 15, 2006.

How does a household apply for LIHEAP?

All households interested in applying for LIHEAP must fully complete the one page application. It is very important that the application be filled out completely. Application forms may be obtained from any community action agency outreach office or neighborhood center. Applications may also be obtained from the lowa Department of Human Rights, Division of Community Action Agencies, Lucas State Office building, Des Moines, lowa 50319 - Telephone number 515-281-4204.

Applicants must furnish their social security number, a copy of their most recent heating and electric bill and proof of the household's gross income for the past ninety days or for the past calendar year.

Completed applications need to be mailed to your local community action agency outreach office or neighborhood center, or in care of LIHEAP, Iowa Department of Human Rights, Division of Community Action Agencies, Lucas State Office Building, Des Moines, Iowa 50319.

How is the LIHEAP award determined?

The energy assistance award is based on the amount of the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance block grant appropriation and the number of qualifying households. The individual grant is based on household income, household size, type of primary heating fuel, type of housing, and targeting factors. Those targeting factors assure that households with the greatest need will receive the highest level of assistance.

How are payments made?

Payments are made to the home energy suppliers in the form of a single payment. The client's assistance shall remain as a credit on the client's account until the program assistance is expended or the account is terminated. The basic energy assistance award is to be applied to the cost of the heating source supplying the household's non-business residential primary heating fuel.

Eligible households who pay an undesignated portion of rent towards energy costs will receive assistance sent directly to the household.

The assistance award for households whose primary source of heat is wood will be forwarded to the household electric supplier if a suitable wood vendor is not available. If no electric supplier exists, a direct payment may be made.

All payments are awarded on a first-come/first-serve basis.

LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FFY 2006 FACTS & FIGURES

- lowa received \$52.05 million* in federal Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) funds for FFY 2006. Additionally, \$2.85 million was provided in state general funds. 89,638 households were certified eligible and approved for benefits this year. This represents a 5% increase in the number of households applying over the previous year.
- 89,638 lowa households (217,894 individuals) received heating assistance benefits to assist with a portion of their heating costs.
- The average statewide heating assistance benefit was \$451.
- 30.8% of households assisted by LIHEAP have an elderly household member.
- 91.3% of households assisted by the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program are NOT on welfare, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF).
- 45.4% of households assisted by LIHEAP have a disabled member.
- 24.81% of households assisted by LIHEAP have a child less than 6 years of age.
- 60.3% of LIHEAP households are below 100% of federal poverty guidelines.
- Benefits are targeted to vulnerable households with low incomes and high heating costs. Elderly, disabled, families with young children, and working poor (who often don't receive any other form of assistance) are also targeted groups.
- 72.7% heat with natural gas; 11.2% heat with liquid propane gas; 14.3% heat with electricity; 1.4% heat with fuel oil: 0.4% heat with wood/coal/other.
- 72.3% live in single family homes; 27.7% live in duplexes/apartments/mobile homes.

10 11 subchapter II, which provides for the low=income home energy
10 12 assistance block grants. The division of community action
10 13 agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the
10 14 funds appropriated in this subsection as provided in the
10 15 federal law making the funds available and in conformance with
10 16 chapter 17A.
10 17 2. Up to 15 percent of the amount appropriated in this
10 18 section that is actually received shall be used for
10 19 residential weatherization or other related home repairs for
10 20 low=income households. Of this allocation amount, not more
10 21 than 10 percent may be used for administrative expenses.
10 22 3. After subtracting the allocation in subsection 2, up to
10 23 10 percent of the remainder is allocated for administrative
10 24 expenses of the low=income home energy assistance program of
10 25 which \$377,000 is allocated for administrative expenses of the
10 26 division. The costs of auditing the use and administration of
10 27 the portion of the appropriation in this section that is
10 28 retained by the state shall be paid from the amount allocated
10 29 in this subsection to the division. The auditor of state
10 30 shall bill the division for the audit costs.
10 31 4. The remainder of the appropriation in this section
10 32 following the allocations made in subsections 2 and 3, shall
10 33 be used to help eligible households as defined in 42 U.S.C.,
10 34 chapter 94, subchapter II, to meet home energy costs.
10 35 5. Not more than 10 percent of the amount appropriated in
11 1 this section that is actually received may be carried forward
11 2 for use in the succeeding federal fiscal year.
11 3 6. Expenditures for assessment and resolution of energy
11 4 problems shall be limited to 5 percent of the amount
11 5 appropriated in this section that is actually received.
