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REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN

OF THE

GOVERNMENTAL REORGANIZATION STUDY COMMITTEE

Senate Concurrent Resolution 135 which was adopted by the Second Regular Session of the Sixty-third General Assembly directed the Legislative Council to consider study proposals, determine priorities, and authorize such studies as may be feasible. The Council reviewed the joint and concurrent resolutions which were introduced in the 1970 Session but not adopted, and established the Governmental Reorganization Study Committee and directed it to evaluate and establish priorities among the various recommendations regarding reorganization of state departments and agencies, particularly the recommendations of the Governor's Economy Committee as proposed in Senate Concurrent Resolution 133. In addition the Committee was also directed to consider Senate Concurrent Resolution 106 and House Concurrent Resolution 127 which propose a revision of the state penal and correction system, House Concurrent Resolution 112 which concerns possible duplication of administrative activities of the Departments of Agriculture and Health, House Concurrent Resolution 133 which suggests establishing a Department of Transportation, and House Concurrent Resolution 145 which relates to an agreement of the Warehouse Division of the Commerce Commission with the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Each subcommittee has met with many state officials and with members of the Governor's Economy Committee. After reviewing recommendations, subcommittees reported their approval or disapproval of recommendations to the full Committee.

The Study Committee requested thus far that 83 bills be drafted. The Legislative Service Bureau is presently drafting these proposals. The Bureau has found in several instances that recommendations designated by the Governor's Economy Committee as requiring legislative action may be implemented through administrative action. This fact became apparent in several instances when the draftsman reviewed in detail the law which would supposedly be affected by a proposal prior to writing the bill draft. On the other hand, it was also found in several instances that recommendations designated as requiring administrative action require legislative action. Among the major items which the Committee has instructed the staff to draft are bills designed to accomplish the following objectives:

- 1. Provide for a regional jail system.
- 2. Reorganize the Conservation Commission.
- 3. Reorganize the Liquor Control Commission.
- 4. Establish a Department of General Services.

Work has commenced on all of the above noted bills, as well as work on a large volume of other bills. It has become apparent that a great deal of work will be required before the bill drafting assignments will be completed.

It should be noted that the liquor laws of Iowa have in the past been amended on such a piece-meal basis that it appears the best method of attack is to provide an almost complete revision of Chapters 123 through 127 of the Code. The various chapters and sections contained in the liquor laws are so dependent upon each other that a substantive amendment to one section requires an amendment to another section and results in a type of chain reaction.

The bill to establish a General Services Department will transfer printing, purchasing, data processing, the duties of the car dispatcher, state communications, and building and grounds to the newly created department. Consideration is being given to transferring the mechanical functions of issuing occupational or professional licenses to this department. In establishing the centralized purchasing function within a General Services Department, consideration must be given to those functions presently performed by the Executive Council. It is anticipated that the Executive Council will continue to function, however the administrative functions of the Council be transferred to the General Services Department and the functions of the Executive Council will be to make policy decisions. A computer search of the Code was made in order to determine the duties assigned to the Executive Council by law. The search indicates that there are 195 duties assigned to the Executive Council which fall outside of Chapter 19 of the Code, the basic chapter establishing the powers and duties of the Executive Council. The Committee will have to decide which functions are administrative or policy, which the Executive Council will retain, which will be transferred to the General Services Department, or which functions will be transferred to other departments. A summary of the search has been prepared for use of the Committee. It is not anticipated that the Board of Regents' institutions or the Highway Commission will be subject to the centralized purchasing requirement of the General Services Department at this time.

The bill providing for the reorganization of the Conservation Commission is somewhat similar to a bill being prepared for the Environmental Preservation Study Committee, the purpose of which is to consolidate all agencies concerned with poliution into one agency. Since the work being done on the Environmental Preservation Study Committee bill will duplicate that of the Governmental Reorganization Study Committee, commencement on the Covernmental Reorganization bill has been postponed until completion of the Environmental Preservation bill.

The regional jail bill, actually a regional correction center bill, will be a fairly large bill requiring a number of policy decisions. The instructions for drafting this bill call for the initial establishment of five regional correction centers. County facilities will continue to be used in conjunction with regional correction centers. A decision as to what type of person will be assigned to a regional correction center will have to be made. A computer search of the Code indicates that there are almost five hundred penal sections in the Code, and at some time in the future these sentencing sections will have to be considered. It appears possible at this point to correlate the sentencing provisions with the regional jail concept by definition. The regional jail bill, in the same manner as several other proposals, will eventually have to be considered in conjunction with the efforts of another study committee, i.e. the Criminal Code Revision Study Committee. Also to be considered in regard to this bill are studies being conducted by the Crime Commission.

The assignment given to the Governmental Reorganization Study Committee is very large. The Committee has concentrated on studying recommendations contained in the Governor's Economy Committee Report, which has precluded it from studying the other assignments given to the Committee. The other assignments, previously noted, are creation of a Department of Transportation, consideration of possible duplication of administrative activities within the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Health, consideration of an agreement of the Warehouse Division of the Commerce Commission with the Commodity Credit Corporation, and revision of the state penal and correction systems. The latter is actually being accomplished by the regional jail bill and the Criminal Code Study Committee.

The short interim period has not allowed the Committee to consider all proposals in draft form at this time. The drafting assignments have been made, but it appears that many of the drafts will not be completed until shortly before the convening of the next session of the General Assembly or perhaps until after the convening of the General Assembly. A great amount of staff time is required to complete the committee assignments and because the staff must perform functions for other study committees, it has not been able in some instances to proceed promptly.

A chart of Committee action is attached to this report. The first column of the chart indicates the subheadings contained in the Governor's Economy Committee Report through the use of initials or abbreviations, the second column indicates the page of the report upon which the recommendation is found, the third column indicates subcommittee and committee actions, the fourth column indicates whether or not a bill draft has been approved, and the fifth column lists the drafting request number of the Legislative Service Bureau.
