### The Iowa Tuition Grant Program

### **ISSUE**

This *Issue Review* provides background about the Iowa Tuition Grant Program and the issues of:

- Parity in higher education funding between private and public institutions.
- Need-based financial assistance.

#### **AFFECTED AGENCIES**

College Student Aid Commission

#### **CODE AUTHORITY**

Chapter 261, Code of Iowa

### **BACKGROUND**

The Iowa Tuition Grant Program was established in 1969. The Program provides financial assistance to Iowa students who choose to attend one of Iowa's independent colleges or universities. Students who demonstrate financial need and attend eligible Iowa institutions qualify for awards up to \$3,650 (maximum grant for 1998-99 academic year), to be applied toward tuition and fees. **Table 1** below depicts participation in the Program since FY 1995.

who do not meet the full financial need requirements may receive less than the maximum

grant. The average grant is calculated by dividing the total available funding for the year by the number of recipients.

Funding for the Iowa Tuition Grant Program has increased and exceeded the percentage growth in total General Fund appropriations each year since FY 1996. See **Table 2** below.

The average increase in the Iowa Tuition Grant Program since FY 1988 has been 7.6%, while the average increase in total State General Fund expenditures has been 7.9% for the same period.

#### PARITY IN FUNDING - PRIVATE VERSUS PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION

One of the main goals of the Iowa Association of Independent Colleges and Universities has been to achieve parity in State funding for Iowa residents who attend private higher education institutions as it compares to the State support per student at the Regents Institutions.

For example, let's assume, if an Iowa resident student provides the annual cost of tuition and fees at a Regents Institution of \$2,700, but the actual State-funded cost to educate a student is \$7,400 per year, the State General Fund is in effect providing a "subsidy" of \$4,700 per student. The independent higher education institutions maintain that the State should provide the same "subsidy" to Iowa residents that attend private schools.

The Board of Regents issues a biennial report that calculates the General Fund unit cost of instruction at each Institution. Results of the most recent report (FY 1997) are illustrated in **Table 3**.

As **Table 3** illustrates, the average State "subsidized" cost at the Regents institutions for FY 1997 was approximately \$4,700. This compares to the State "subsidy" provided to private college students in the form of the maximum tuition grant of \$3,150 for the same period. The tuition grant for FY 1996-97 provided 67.0% of the average State funding per student (net of tuition) at the Regents institutions.

#### FINANCIAL NEED DETERMINATION

Virtually all prospective college students and their parents complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The information provided in the Application is used to determine the Expected Family Contribution (EFC). Several factors are considered in calculating the Expected Family Contribution, including family income, family size, number of family members in college, selected assets, and age of parents. The Expected Family Contribution is the amount the federal government determines the family should be expected to contribute towards college costs. The Expected Family Contribution is compared with the estimated cost expected at the institution the student expects to attend, to determine the financial "need." **Attachments A** and **B** illustrate typical undergraduate student expenses at all of lowa's higher education institutions for FY 1997 and FY 1998 respectively. The examples in this **Issue Review** use data for FY 1997 as it corresponds to the most recent report issued by the Board of Regents regarding unit cost.

The Expected Family Contribution is universally accepted and used by all college and university financial aid offices to determine the financial need for a variety of federal, state, and private financial aid resources. The Iowa College Student Aid Commission uses the federal Application data to determine financial need for tuition grant applications by setting an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) cap. The cap is then adjusted based on the number of applicants and tuition grants awarded in order to expend the entire General Fund appropriation for the Program each year. If all funds are not expended, the excess reverts to the Scholarship and Grant Reserve Fund to be used for other financial aid programs administered by the Commission. The cap established by the Commission for FY 1996-97 was \$9,500.

As an example, following are results of an actual lowa resident Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for the FY 1996-97 academic year.

#### • Example of Actual Application

- Family situation Married couple with three children. The father is age 42, the mother age 38. Ages of the children at the time of application were 17, 16, and 14. The application is for the oldest child. This child will be the only family member enrolled in college during 1996-97.
- Adjusted gross income of the parents was \$66,500.
- Adjusted gross income of the student was \$2,500.
- Expected family contribution (EFC) was \$9,500.
- The student asked for the application results to be submitted to the three Regents Institutions and Buena Vista University.

Based on the example above, this student's financial "need" for FY 1996-97 resulted in the following:

- University of Iowa Total cost of \$8,886 less EFC of \$9,500 = no need.
- Iowa State University Total cost of \$8,524 less EFC of \$9,500 = no need.
- University of Northern Iowa Total cost of \$8,272 less EFC of \$9,500 = no need.
- Buena Vista University (Storm Lake) Total cost of \$20,933 less EFC of \$9,500 = financial need of \$11,433.

Based on the above example, this student would have qualified for the maximum tuition grant of \$3,150 at Buena Vista University, leaving remaining financial "need" of \$8,283. If this student chose to attend Buena Vista, the student would have qualified for additional State aid programs in the form of the Iowa Grant (\$793 average award) and Iowa Work-Study (\$947 average award). In addition, the student may have been eligible for other institutional-specific aid (scholarships, grants, loans, etc.).

However, this student would not have qualified for any "need-based" federal, State, or other aid at any of the Regents Institutions. The student may have qualified for some institution-specific aid (scholarships, loans, etc.). It should be noted, that in all scenarios, this student would qualify for an unsubsidized federal Stafford loan of \$2,625 and the parents would most likely qualify for the federal Plus Loan Program.

#### **BUDGET IMPACT**

The Commission is requesting a General Fund appropriation of \$48.4 million for FY 2000. This is an increase of \$3.7 million (8.3%) compared to the estimated FY 1999 appropriation. The Commission is also requesting that the maximum tuition grant be increased from \$3,650 to \$4,000. This funding level requested is expected to increase the average grant to \$3,285 for 14,731 recipients. This is an increase of \$253 (8.3%) in the average grant and no change in the number of recipients compared to estimated FY 1999.
