## A BILL FOR

1 An Act providing for and making appropriations for financing  
2 state postsecondary education programs including programs  
3 under the state board of regents, the higher education  
4 facilities commission, and the department of public  
5 instruction.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 Section 1. There is appropriated from the general fund  
2 of the state to the higher education facilities commission  
3 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1975 and ending June  
4 30, 1976, the following sums, or so much thereof as may be  
5 necessary, to be used for the funding of the following pro-  
6 grams for the purposes designated:

9 1. HIGHER EDUCATION FACILITIES  
10 COMMISSION

11 For salaries, support, maintenance  
12 and miscellaneous purposes ..... \$ 130,547

13 2. TUITION GRANT PROGRAM

14 To finance tuition grants to full-  
15 time resident students attending ac-  
16 credited private institutions of  
17 higher education in Iowa under sec-  
18 tions two hundred sixty-one point  
19 nine (261.9) to two hundred sixty-  
20 one point sixteen (261.16), inclu-  
21 sive, of the Code ..... \$ 9,000,000

22 3. SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

23 To finance scholarships awarded  
24 by the higher education facilities  
25 commission under subsection four  
26 (4) of section two hundred sixty-  
27 one point two (261.2) of the Code ..... \$ 325,000

28 4. VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL TUITION  
29 GRANTS

30 To finance tuition grants to full-  
31 time resident students attending a  
32 vocational-technical program at an  
33 area school in the state under sec-  
34 tion two hundred sixty-one point  
35 seventeen (261.17) of the Code ..... \$ 75,000

1       Sec. 2. There is appropriated from the general fund of  
2 the state to the higher education facilities commission for  
3 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1975 and ending June 30,  
4 1976 the sum of seven hundred fifty thousand (750,000) dol-  
5 lars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be paid to  
6 the college of osteopathic medicine and surgery for a sub-  
7 vention program created pursuant to sections five (5) and  
8 six (6) of this Act. The subvention shall be used for the  
9 admission and education of not more than thirty percent of  
10 each of the lower two classes of students in the college of  
11 osteopathic medicine and surgery for the fiscal year begin-  
12 ning July 1, 1975 and ending June 30, 1976. Funds shall only  
13 be expended for resident students and funds expended on behalf  
14 of the second year class shall not exceed four hundred thousand  
15 dollars and the funds expended on behalf of the first year  
16 class shall not exceed three hundred fifty thousand dollars.  
17 For the purposes of this section and for the 1975-1976 academic  
18 year, resident students are students who were residents of  
19 this state for twelve months prior to the time they enrolled  
20 in the first year academic class, or who are persons who  
21 graduated from a high school located in Iowa.

22       Sec. 3. Section two hundred sixty-one point two (261.2),  
23 subsection four (4), Code 1975, is amended to read as fol-  
24 lows:

25       4. Prepare and administer a state plan for a state sup-  
26 ported and administered scholarship program. Said state plan  
27 shall provide for scholarships based on ability ~~and need~~ to  
28 deserving students of Iowa, matriculating in Iowa universities,  
29 colleges, area vocational schools, area community colleges,  
30 or schools of professional nursing.

31       The provisions of this section shall be effective July  
32 1, 1976, however if a deserving student who receives a scholar-  
33 ship for the 1975-1976 academic year also receives a scholar-  
34 ship for the 1976-1977 academic year, it shall be based on  
35 both ability and need.

1 Sec. 4. Section two hundred sixty-one point twelve  
2 (261.12), subsection two (2), Code 1975, is amended to read  
3 as follows:

4 2. One thousand three hundred dollars.

5 Sec. 5. NEW SECTION. SUBVENTION PROGRAM.

6 1. There is established a subvention program for resident  
7 students who are enrolled in the college of osteopathic medi-  
8 cine and surgery of Des Moines, Iowa. The subvention program  
9 shall be administered by the higher education facilities com-  
10 mission in the manner provided in this section and section  
11 six (6) of this Act.

12 2. In making a final determination of who is a resident  
13 of Iowa, the higher education facilities commission shall  
14 adopt rules for the academic year commencing in 1976 and for  
15 each academic year thereafter consistent with those followed  
16 for determining Iowa resident students in section two hundred  
17 sixty-one point fifteen (261.15) of the Code and be subject  
18 to the provisions of chapter seventeen A (17A) of the Code.

19 Sec. 6. NEW SECTION. PAYMENT OF SUBVENTION. The registrar  
20 of the college of osteopathic medicine and surgery shall file,  
21 not later than August first of each year, a certificate of  
22 enrollment which shall include the number, names and addresses  
23 of all students enrolled, by class, and shall indicate which  
24 students are resident students. If the number of resident  
25 students does not equal thirty percent of the total enroll-  
26 ment of a class, the higher education facilities commission  
27 shall deduct the sum of twenty thousand dollars for each class  
28 member under the required percentage. The higher education  
29 facilities commission shall compute the amount of the subven-  
30 tion and shall transmit the funds to the college of osteopathic  
31 medicine and surgery by August fifteenth of each year for  
32 which funds are appropriated by the general assembly.

33 Sec. 7. There is appropriated from the general fund of  
34 the state to the state board of regents for the fiscal year  
35 beginning July 1, 1975 and ending June 30, 1976 the following

1 amounts, or so much thereof as may be necessary to be used  
2 for the following purposes:

14 program budgeting to the legislative fiscal committee by

10 Sec. 11. Section eight point twenty-nine (8.29), unnum-  
11 bered paragraph four (4), Code 1975, is amended to read as

13 The state board of regents, with the approval of the state  
14 comptroller, shall establish a unified uniform budgeting and  
15 accounting system for the institutions of higher education  
16 under its control, and shall require each of the institutions  
17 of higher education to begin operating under the unified  
18 uniform system not later than ~~July 1, 1974~~ June 30, 1976.

19 Sec. 12. Notwithstanding the provisions of section eight  
20 point thirty-three (8.33) of the Code, all unencumbered or  
21 unobligated balances of appropriations made by this Act for  
22 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1975 remaining on June 30,  
23 1976, except funds appropriated in subsection twelve (12)  
24 of section ten (10) of this Act, shall revert to the general  
25 fund on August 31, 1976. In all other respects the provisions  
26 of section eight point thirty-three (8.33) of the Code shall  
27 apply to this Act.

28 Sec. 13. Moneys appropriated by this Act shall not be  
29 used for capital improvements.

30 Sec. 14. When any of the laws of this state are in con-  
31 flict with this Act, the provisions of this Act shall govern  
32 for the fiscal year 1975-1976.

33 Sec. 15. All federal grants to and the federal receipts  
34 of the agencies appropriated funds under this Act are appro-  
35 priated for the purposes set forth in such federal grants

1 or receipts.

2 EXPLANATION

3 This bill appropriates funds to the Higher Education  
4 Facilities Commission, the Board of Regents, and the Department  
5 of Public Instruction for programs under their jurisdiction  
6 as provided for in this Act.

7 1. Higher Education Facilities Commission Office Operation.

8 No additions to the Commission's table of organization  
9 have been included. The Governor's recommended salary and  
10 fringe benefit increases (\$9,178) have not been included.  
11 A Commission request for approximately an \$8,000 increase  
12 in outside professional services has been included.

13 2. Tuition Grant Program.

14 The 1974-75 appropriation of \$6,000,000 currently serves  
15 approximately 6,500 students of a gross applicant total of  
16 11,730. The \$9,000,000 appropriated in this Act is expected  
17 to serve approximately 6,900 students of a gross applicant  
18 total of 12,700. The \$1,000 per student maximum award is  
19 increased to a maximum level of \$1,300 per student. Due to  
20 an application deadline of January 18, 1975, for the tuition  
21 grant, no provision has been included for half-time students,  
22 proprietary school students, nor for hospital schools of  
23 nursing students for the 1975-76 school year which are all  
24 under consideration for future inclusion.

25 3. Scholarship Program.

26 As a result of federal matching funds, all qualified state  
27 scholars received monetary award offers in 1974-75 with state  
28 funding at a level of \$325,000. Currently, this two-year  
29 scholarship program serves 980 students in all of Iowa's  
30 colleges and universities with awards ranging from \$100 to  
31 \$610 per student. Both academic excellence and financial  
32 need are required for eligibility in this program.

33 For 1976-77, this bill converts this program to provide  
34 for scholarships based on academic achievement only to  
35 secondary school seniors in Iowa. Recipients would be selected

1 on the basis of academic criteria established by the Higher  
2 Education Facilities Commission.

3 4. Vocational-Technical Tuition Grant.

4 Awards under this program are need-based and restricted  
5 to tuition aid for Iowa residents enrolled in full-time career  
6 education courses at public area schools. The statute sets  
7 a maximum award of \$400 a year with a two-year limitation.  
8 In 1974-75, the \$50,000 appropriation was spread over 200  
9 students at \$200 each and \$10,000 allowed to the Commission  
10 for operating expenses.

11 Under consideration is a proposal to shift federal funds  
12 from the scholarship program described above thereby allowing  
13 for awards to go to the \$400 level as provided by statute  
14 and at least double the number of recipients.

15 5. Osteopathic Subvention Program.

16 The subvention provided for in this appropriation provides  
17 for the following:

18 A. Continuation of the subvention for the 1974-75 fresh-  
19 man class at the college.

20 B. Includes a subvention for the 1975-76 freshman class  
21 at the college on much the same basis as for the 1974-75 class  
22 proposed to be continued.

23 C. Appropriation be made to the Higher Education Facilities  
24 Commission for audit and disbursement of funds rather than  
25 to the comptroller.

26 6. Board of Regents.

27 This appropriation provides for the following:

28 A. Salaries are included at the 1974-75 levels. Increases  
29 resultantly will be provided for in the legislative salary  
30 bill scheduled to follow later in the session.

31 B. Non-salary expenditure items, which include the  
32 categories of general expense, fuel and purchased electricity,  
33 equipment and library books, repairs, replacements, and  
34 alterations and special needs as identified by the Regents,  
35 are included at a level of 13.6 percent above the 1974-75

1 appropriations for these items.

2 C. A special salary adjustment for faculty and adminis-  
3 trators at the University of Northern Iowa is included in  
4 the amount of \$300,000.

5 7. Department of Public Instruction.

6 This appropriation provides for the following:

7 A. A general office increase allows two additional staff  
8 (curriculum consultants) to be funded by the state.

9 B. Funds are provided to allow general office salaries  
10 to be increased from a 93.5 percent funding level to a 95  
11 percent level of the State Board of Public Instruction's  
12 departmental salary schedule adopted some years ago.

13 C. Migrant Education, Drug Education, and Environmental  
14 Education are specially funded in this bill. All other areas  
15 for which funds are shown represent continuation of programs  
16 heretofore funded.

17 D. It is the intent of the Committee on Appropriations  
18 that in granting or denying appeals from local school dis-  
19 tricts in whole or in part, the School Budget Review Com-  
20 mittee shall put in writing an explanation stating the specific  
21 reasons for its action.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the higher education facilities commission for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1975 and ending June 30, 1976, the following sums, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be used for the funding of the following programs for the purposes designated:

1. HIGHER EDUCATION FACILITIES COMMISSION

For salaries, support, maintenance and miscellaneous purposes ..... \$ 130,547

2. TUITION GRANT PROGRAM

To finance tuition grants to full-time resident students attending accredited private institutions of higher education in Iowa under sections two hundred sixty-one point nine (261.9) to two hundred sixty-one point sixteen (261.16), inclusive, of the Code ..... \$ 9,000,000

3. SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

To finance scholarships awarded by the higher education facilities commission under subsection four (4) of section two hundred sixty-one point two (261.2) of the Code ..... \$ 325,000

4. VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL TUITION GRANTS

To finance tuition grants to full-time resident students attending a vocational-technical program at an area school in the state under section two hundred sixty-one point seventeen (261.17) of the Code ..... \$ 75,000

Sec. 2. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the higher education facilities commission for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1975 and ending June 30, 1976 the sum of seven hundred fifty thousand (750,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be paid to the college of osteopathic medicine and surgery for a subvention program created pursuant to sections five (5) and six (6) of this Act. The subvention shall be used for the admission and education of not more than thirty percent of each of the lower two classes of students in the college of osteopathic medicine and surgery for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1975 and ending June 30, 1976. Funds shall only be expended for resident students and funds expended on behalf of the second year class shall not exceed four hundred thousand dollars and the funds expended on behalf of the first year class shall not exceed three hundred fifty thousand dollars. For the purposes of this section and for the 1975-1976 academic year, resident students are students who were residents of this state for twelve months prior to the time they enrolled in the first year academic class, or who are persons who graduated from a high school located in Iowa.

4. Prepare and administer a state plan for a state supported and administered scholarship program. Said state plan shall provide for scholarships based on ability and need to deserving students of Iowa, matriculating in Iowa universities, colleges, area vocational schools, area community colleges,

The registrar of the college of osteopathic medicine and surgery shall file, not later than August first of each year, a certificate of enrollment which shall include the number, names and addresses of all students enrolled, by class, and shall indicate which students are resident students. If the number of resident students does not equal thirty percent of the total enrollment of a class, the higher education facilities commission shall deduct the sum of twenty thousand dollars for each class member under the required percentage. The higher education facilities commission shall compute the amount of the subvention and shall transmit the funds to the college of osteopathic medicine and surgery by August fifteenth of each year for

which funds are appropriated by the general assembly.

Sec. 8. The state board of regents shall establish a uniform budgeting and accounting system for the institutions of higher education under its control not later than June 30, 1976.

Sec. 9. It is the intent of the general assembly that the state board of regents shall initiate a proposal for program budgeting to the legislative fiscal committee by December 1, 1975.

Sec. 10. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1975 and ending June 30, 1976 to the department of public instruction the following amounts, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be used in the manner designated:

For the use of the professional teaching practices commission to carry out the provisions of chapter two hundred seventy-two A (272A) of the Code ..... \$ 35,000

The state board of regents, with the approval of the state comptroller, shall establish a ~~unified~~ uniform budgeting and accounting system for the institutions of higher education under its control, and shall require each of the institutions of higher education to begin operating under the ~~unified~~ uniform system not later than ~~July-17-1974~~ June 30, 1976.

Sec. 12. Notwithstanding the provisions of section eight point thirty-three (8.33) of the Code, funds appropriated in subsection twelve (12) of section ten (10) of this Act, shall revert to the general fund on September 30, 1977.

Sec. 13. Moneys appropriated by this Act shall not be used for capital improvements.

Sec. 14. When any of the laws of this state are in conflict with this Act, the provisions of this Act shall govern for the fiscal year 1975-1976.

Sec. 15. All federal grants to and the federal receipts of the agencies appropriated funds under this Act are appropriated for the purposes set forth in such federal grants or receipts.

Dear Mr. Synhorst:

I hereby transmit House File 864, An Act providing for and making appropriations for financing state postsecondary education programs including programs under the State Board of Regents, the Higher Education Facilities Commission, and the Department of Public Instruction.

House File 864 is approved June 3, 1975, with the following exception which I hereby disapprove.

I am unable to approve Item 3 designated in the Act as Section 3 which reads as follows:

"Sec. 3. Section two hundred sixty-one point two (261.2), subsection four (4), Code 1975, is amended to read as follows:

4. Prepare and administer a state plan for a state supported and administered scholarship program. Said state plan shall provide for scholarships based on ability and need to deserving students of Iowa, matriculating in Iowa universities, colleges, area vocational schools, area community colleges, or schools of professional nursing.

The provisions of this section shall be effective July 1, 1976, however, if a deserving student who receives a scholarship for the 1975-1976 academic year also receives a scholarship for the 1976-1977 academic year, it shall be based on both ability and need."

Heretofore, the Iowa scholarship program administered by the Higher Education Facilities Commission awarded scholarships under this program on ability and need of the applicant. This provision I am deleting eliminates the need factor.

I am sympathetic with the idea of recognizing Iowa high school students for academic achievement, but to reduce the number of scholarships awarded to students on a need basis for this purpose would be unwise.


The primary purpose of this program is to provide financial assistance to high academic achievers who need the assistance to further their education. Section 3 would be counter to this.

The action taken by the General Assembly in Section 3 also has the effect of diluting the present scholarship program by spreading the number of scholarship awards among more students, regardless of need, thereby reducing the size of the scholarships to those who need them most.

The action I take in eliminating this section of House File 864 does not alter the amount of the appropriation made by the General Assembly to the Iowa Scholarship Program. The program can continue to function well without Section 3 - with scholarships being distributed to students on the basis of both "need" and "ability" as is done now.

For these reasons, I hereby disapprove this item in accordance with Amendment 4 of the Amendments of 1968 to the Constitution of the State of Iowa. All other items of House File 864 are hereby approved this date.
