10 Textbooks adopted and purchased by a school district may,
11 and shall to the extent funds are appropriated by the general
12 assembly, be made available to pupils attending nonpublic
13 schools upon request of the pupil or the pupil's parent under
14 ~~the same~~ comparable terms as made available to pupils attending
15 public schools.

16 Sec. 15. Chapter three hundred one (301), Code 1977, is
17 amended by adding the following new section:

18 NEW SECTION. PAYMENT OF CLAIMS FOR NONPUBLIC SCHOOL PUPIL
19 TEXTBOOK SERVICES. Boards of directors of school districts
20 shall be required to provide textbooks services to nonpublic
21 school pupils as provided in section three hundred one point
22 one (301.1) of the Code only during school years when the
23 general assembly has appropriated funds to the department
24 of public instruction for the payment of claims for textbook
25 costs submitted by the school district.

8 1977, is repealed.

9 Sec. 18. The intent of the general assembly in appro-
10 priating funds pursuant to section seven (7) of this Act is
11 to provide additional funds, if needed, during the 1979 Ses-
12 sion of the general assembly for the purchase of fuel and
13 electricity if the costs for fuel and electricity will exceed
14 fourteen million two hundred eighty-two thousand (14,282,000)
15 dollars for 1978-79. Any funds remaining which are in excess
16 of such estimated fuel and electricity costs during 1978-79
17 may be used for other purposes such as maintenance, equipment,
18 and miscellaneous purposes.

19 Sec. 19. All federal grants to and the federal receipts
20 of agencies appropriated funds under this Act are appropriated
21 for the purposes set forth in such federal grants or receipts.

24 Sec. 21. When any laws of this state are in conflict with
25 this Act, the provisions of this Act shall govern for the

27 EXPLANATION

28 Iowa Commission for the Blind

29 The \$742,300 appropriation provides funding for 114 full-
30 time equivalent positions plus support costs.

31 Bonus Board

32 The \$40,000 appropriation funds the war orphans' educa-
33 tional aid at the anticipated usage level. Any unused moneys
34 from this appropriation will revert.

35 The \$60,400 appropriation for salaries and support anti-

1 cipates continued operation of this agency for the same pur-
2 poses and responsibilities but with a reduction in staff from
3 five to three employees due to the conclusion of the Vietnam
4 claims.

5 Higher Education Facilities Commission

6 The \$220,000 appropriation provides funding for 13 full-
7 time equivalent positions plus support costs which includes
8 one additional person.

9 Tuition Grant Program

10 The \$2,180,000 appropriation is in addition to the
11 \$10,000,000 standing limited funds available for this program.

12 Vocational Technical Tuition Grant

13 The \$200,000 appropriation is in addition to the \$150,000
14 standing limited funds available for this program. These
15 additional state funds matched with federal funds will expand
16 this grant program to \$700,000 which is the anticipated full
17 funding level.

18 Optometric Assistance Program

19 The \$90,000 appropriation is directed to continue this
20 program for the students that started the program in 1976
21 and 1977 and provides another \$30,000 for the 1978 class under
22 the same procedures as found in the Code for the 1976 and
23 1977 classes. Provisions for payment of funds include delivery
24 of specific financial audits to the legislative fiscal bureau.

25 College of Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery Subvention

26 This provision of financial assistance or support to as-
27 sist an enterprise deemed advantageous to the public includes
28 funding for each of three classes at a level of \$400,000.
29 Provisions for payment of this subvention include delivery
30 of specific financial audits to the legislative fiscal bureau.

31 National Guard Enlistment Program

NEW SECTION. PAYMENT OF CLAIMS FOR NONPUBLIC SCHOOL PUPIL TEXTBOOK SERVICES. Boards of directors of school districts shall be required to provide textbook services to nonpublic

school pupils as provided in section three hundred one point one (301.1) of the Code only during school years when the general assembly has appropriated funds to the department of public instruction for the payment of claims for textbook costs submitted by the school district.

If the funds appropriated by the general assembly are not sufficient to pay claims submitted by the school districts, the amount paid to each school district by the department shall be prorated on the basis of funds so appropriated. The difference between the amount of the claim of a school district and the amount of payment received from the department of public instruction shall be paid by the parent or guardian of the nonpublic school pupil served.

The costs of providing textbook services to nonpublic school pupils as provided in section three hundred one point one (301.1) of the Code shall not be included in the computation of district cost under chapter four hundred forty-two (442) of the Code, but shall be shown in the budget as an expense from miscellaneous income. Any textbook reimbursements received by a local school district for serving nonpublic school pupils shall not affect district cost limitations of chapter four hundred forty-two (442) of the Code. The reimbursements provided in this section are miscellaneous income as defined in section four hundred forty-two point five (442.5) of the Code.

Claims for reimbursement shall be made to the department of public instruction by the public school district providing textbook services during a school year on a form prescribed by the department, and the claim shall state the services provided and the actual costs incurred. Claims shall be accompanied by an affidavit of an officer of the public school district affirming the accuracy of the claim. By February first and by July fifteenth of each year the department shall certify to the state comptroller the amounts of approved claims to be paid, and the state comptroller shall draw

warrants payable to school districts which have established claims. The public school district in which the pupil resides may contract with the public school district of attendance to have the latter school furnish the services and shall receive reimbursement for the payment of said contract; however, said services must be comparable to the services of the district of residence and cannot exceed the per pupil cost of the program of the district of residence.

Sec. 17. The intent of the general assembly in appropriating funds pursuant to section seven (7) of this Act is to provide additional funds, if needed, during the 1979 Session of the general assembly for the purchase of fuel and electricity if the costs for fuel and electricity will exceed fourteen million two hundred eighty-two thousand (14,282,000) dollars for 1978-79. Any funds remaining which are in excess of such estimated fuel and electricity costs during 1978-79 may be used for other purposes such as maintenance, equipment, and miscellaneous purposes.

Sec. 18. All federal grants to and the federal receipts of agencies appropriated funds under this Act are appropriated for the purposes set forth in such federal grants or receipts.
