A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to the funding of state agencies for designated
2 service programs including health programs, civil rights,
3 citizens' aide, women, veterans' services, vocational re-
4 habilitation, substance abuse, and programs for minority,
5 elderly, and disadvantaged persons for the fiscal year
6 beginning July 1, 1985 and ending June 30, 1986.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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HF 571

1 Section 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of
2 the state for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1985, and
3 ending June 30, 1986, the following amounts, or so much
4 thereof as is necessary, to be used by the following agencies
5 for the purposes designated:

8 1. COMMISSION ON THE AGING	
9 a. For salaries and support

22 All funds appropriated under this paragraph shall be
23 received and disbursed by the commission in accordance with
24 sections 249B.15 through 249B.21, shall not be used for
25 administrative purposes, and shall be used for citizens of
26 Iowa over sixty-five years of age for chore, telephone
27 reassurance, adult day care, and home repair services,
28 including the winterizing of homes, and for the construction
29 of entrance ramps which meet the requirements of section
30 104A.4 and make residences accessible to the physically
31 handicapped. Funds appropriated under this paragraph may be
32 used to supplement federal funds under federal regulations.

14 Sec. 2. There is appropriated from the general fund of the
15 state to the state department of health for the fiscal year
16 beginning July 1, 1985, and ending June 30, 1986, the
17 following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be
18 used for the purposes designated:

23 For salaries and support of
24 not more than sixty-four and
25 three-tenths full-time equiva-

29 2. HEALTH FACILITIES
30 DIVISION

31 For salaries and support of
32 not more than fifty-five full-
33 time equivalent positions an-
34 nually, maintenance, and mis-
35 cellaneous purposes \$ 750,153

3393 1 As a condition of the appropriation made by this
2 subsection, the state department of health shall conditionally
3 issue a license under section 135C.12 for the fiscal year
4 beginning July 1, 1985 to any community residential facility
5 for mentally retarded adults which received per diem funding
6 for mentally retarded adults from the department of human
7 services for the prior fiscal year.

8 Notwithstanding Division VII of chapter 135, the department
9 of health shall not begin the hospice licensure procedure
10 until July 1, 1987.

11 3. HEALTH PLANNING AND
12 DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

13 For salaries and support of
14 not more than sixteen and seventy-
15 five hundredths full-time equiva-
16 lent positions annually, mainte-
17 nance, and miscellaneous purposes \$ 264,110

18 4. DISEASE PREVENTION
19 DIVISION

20 For salaries and support of
21 not more than fifty-six and six-
22 tenths full-time equivalent po-
23 sitions annually, maintenance,
24 and miscellaneous purposes \$ 1,226,434

25 5. PROFESSIONAL LICENSURE

26 For salaries and support of
27 not more than seventeen full-
28 time equivalent positions an-
29 nually, maintenance, and mis-
30 cellaneous purposes \$ 640,109

31 Professional licensure shall prepare estimates of projected
32 receipts to be generated by the licensing, certification, and
33 examination fees of each board as well as a projection of the
34 fairly apportioned administrative costs and rental expenses
35 attributable to each board. Each board shall annually review

1 and adjust its schedule of fees so that, as nearly as
2 possible, projected receipts equal projected costs.

3 6. PERSONAL AND FAMILY

4 HEALTH DIVISION

5 a. For salaries and support
6 of not more than fifty full-time
7 equivalent positions annually,
8 maintenance, and miscellaneous
9 purposes \$ 1,242,427

10 The department shall allocate from the funds appropriated
11 under this paragraph at least six hundred nine thousand seven
12 hundred sixty-seven (609,767) dollars for the fiscal year
13 beginning July 1, 1985, and ending June 30, 1986, for the
14 birth defects and genetics counseling program and of these
15 funds, forty thousand (40,000) dollars shall be allocated for
16 a central Iowa birth defects registry pilot program.

17 Of the funds appropriated in this paragraph, the following
18 amounts shall be allocated to the university of Iowa hospitals
19 and clinics under the control of the state board of regents
20 for the following programs under the Iowa specialized child
21 health care services:

22 (1) Mobile and regional child
23 health specialty clinics \$ 252,000
24 (2) Muscular dystrophy and
25 related genetic disease programs \$ 131,657
26 (3) Statewide perinatal pro-
27 gram \$ 43,740

28 The birth defects and genetic counseling service shall
29 apply a sliding fee scale to determine the amount a person re-
30 ceiving the services is required to pay for the services.
31 These fees shall be considered repayment receipts and used for
32 the program.

33 The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall receive
34 an allocation for indirect costs of no more than eight percent
35 from the funds for each program.

1 b. Sexual abuse investiga-
2 tions.

3 For medical procedures re-
4 quired by section 709.10 \$ 57,795

5 c. Sudden infant death syn-
6 drome autopsies.

7 For reimbursing counties for
8 expenses resulting from autop-
9 sies of suspected victims of
10 sudden infant death syndrome
11 required under section 331.802,
12 subsection 3, paragraph "j" \$ 15,000

13 7. COMMUNITY HEALTH DIVISION

14 a. For salaries and support
15 of not more than thirty-seven and
16 twenty-five hundredths full-time
17 equivalent positions annually,
18 maintenance, and miscellaneous
19 purposes \$ 1,834,852

20 The department shall allocate from the funds appropriated
21 under this lettered paragraph nine hundred forty thousand nine
22 hundred sixteen (940,916) dollars for the fiscal year
23 beginning July 1, 1985, for the chronic renal disease program.

24 The types of assistance to eligible recipients under the
25 program may include hospital and medical expenses, home
26 dialysis supplies, insurance premiums, travel expenses,
27 prescription and nonprescription drugs, and lodging expenses
28 for persons in training. The program expenditures shall not
29 exceed these allocations. If projected expenditures will
30 exceed the allocations, the department shall establish by
31 administrative rule a mechanism to reduce financial assistance
32 under the renal disease program in order to keep expenditures
33 within the allocations.

34 b. For grants to local boards
35 of health for the public health

1 nursing program \$ 2,207,472

2 Funds appropriated under this paragraph shall be used to
3 maintain and expand the existing public health nursing program
4 for elderly and low-income persons with the objective of
5 preventing or reducing inappropriate institutionalization.
6 The funds shall not be used for any other purpose. As used in
7 this paragraph, "elderly person" means a person who is sixty
8 years of age or older and "low-income person" means a person
9 whose income and resources are below the guidelines
10 established by the department.

11 One-fourth of the total amount to be allocated shall be
12 divided so that an equal amount is available for use in each
13 county in the state. Three-fourths of the total amount to be
14 allocated shall be divided so that the share available for use
15 in each county is proportionate to the number of elderly and
16 low-income persons living in that county in relation to the
17 total number of elderly and low-income persons living in the
18 state.

19 In order to receive allocations under this paragraph, the
20 local board of health having jurisdiction shall prepare a
21 proposal for the use of the allocated funds available for that
22 jurisdiction that will provide the maximum benefits of
23 expanded public health nursing care to elderly and low-income
24 persons in the jurisdiction. After approval of the proposal
25 by the department, the department shall enter into a contract
26 with the local board of health. The local board of health
27 shall subcontract with a nonprofit nurses' association, an
28 independent nonprofit agency, or a suitable local governmental
29 body to use the allocated funds to provide public health
30 nursing care. Local boards of health shall make an effort to
31 subcontract with agencies that are currently providing
32 services to prevent duplication of services.

33 If by July 30 of each year of the biennium, the department
34 is unable to conclude contracts for use of the allocated funds
35 in a county, the department shall consider the unused funds

1 appropriated under this paragraph an unallocated pool. If the
2 unallocated pool is fifty thousand dollars or more it shall be
3 reallocated to the counties in substantially the same manner
4 as the original allocations. The reallocated funds are
5 available for use in those counties during the period
6 beginning January 1 and ending June 30 of each fiscal year of
7 the biennium. If the unallocated pool is less than fifty
8 thousand dollars, the department may allocate it to counties
9 with demonstrated special needs for public health nursing.

10 The department shall maintain rules governing the
11 expenditure of funds appropriated by paragraph "b". The rules
12 require each local agency receiving funds to establish and use
13 a sliding fee scale for those persons able to pay for all or a
14 portion of the cost of the care.

15 The department shall annually evaluate the success of the
16 public health nursing program. The evaluation shall include
17 the extent to which the program reduced or prevented
18 inappropriate institutionalization, the extent to which the
19 program increased the availability of public health nursing
20 care to elderly and low-income persons, and the extent of
21 public health nursing care provided to elderly and low-income
22 persons. The department shall submit a report of each annual
23 evaluation to the governor and the general assembly.

24 c. For grants to county boards
25 of supervisors for the homemaker-
26 home health aide program \$ 7,389,200

27 Funds appropriated under this paragraph shall be used to
28 provide homemaker-home health aide services with emphasis on
29 services to elderly and low-income persons and children and
30 adults in need of protective services with the objective of
31 preventing or reducing inappropriate institutionalization. In
32 addition, up to ten percent of the funds appropriated under
33 this paragraph may be used to provide chore services. The
34 funds shall not be used for any other purposes. As used in
35 this paragraph:

1 (1) "Chore services" means services provided to
2 individuals or families, who, due to absence, incapacity, or
3 illness, are unable to perform certain home maintenance
4 functions. The services include but are not limited to yard
5 work such as mowing lawns, raking leaves, and shoveling walks;
6 window and door maintenance such as hanging screen windows and
7 doors, replacing window panes, and washing windows; and minor
8 repairs to walls, floors, stairs, railings, and handles. It
9 also includes heavy house cleaning which includes cleaning
10 attics or basements to remove fire hazards, moving heavy
11 furniture, extensive wall washing, floor care or painting, and
12 trash removal.

13 (2) "Elderly person" means a person who is sixty years of
14 age or older.

15 (3) "Homemaker-home health aide services" means services
16 intended to enhance the capacity of household members to
17 attain or maintain the independence of the household members
18 and provided by trained and supervised workers to individuals
19 or families, who, due to the absence, incapacity, or
20 limitations of the usual homemaker, are experiencing stress or
21 crisis. The services include but are not limited to essential
22 shopping, housekeeping, meal preparation, child care, respite
23 care, money management and consumer education, family
24 management, personal services, transportation and providing
25 information, assistance, household management and learning
26 experiences.

27 (4) "Low-income person" means a person whose income and
28 resources are below the guidelines established by the
29 department.

30 (5) "Protective services" means those homemaker-home
31 health aide services intended to stabilize a child's or an
32 adult's residential environment and relationships with
33 relatives, caretakers, and other persons or household members
34 in order to alleviate a situation involving abuse or neglect
35 or to otherwise protect the child or adult from a threat of

1 abuse or neglect.

2 (a) The department shall initiate the following allocation
3 process unless determined unfeasible. In that event, the
4 department shall utilize the allocation process in
5 subparagraph (b). The amount appropriated under this
6 paragraph shall be allocated for use in the counties of the
7 state. Fifteen percent of the amount shall be divided so that
8 an equal amount is available for use in each county in the
9 state. The following percentages of the remaining amount
10 shall be allocated to each county according to that county's
11 proportion of residents with the following demographic
12 characteristics compared to all state residents with the same
13 demographic characteristics: sixty percent according to the
14 number of elderly persons living in the county; twenty percent
15 according to the number of low-income persons living in the
16 county; and twenty percent according to the number of
17 substantiated cases of child abuse in the county during the
18 three most recent fiscal years for which data is available.

19 (b) In the event subparagraph (a) is determined
20 unfeasible, the amount appropriated under this paragraph shall
21 be allocated for use in the counties of the state. The entire
22 amount shall be allocated based on a range determined from the
23 formula based on subparagraph (a). However a county shall not
24 receive less than ninety-four point seventy-eight percent nor
25 more than one hundred three percent of the funding allocated
26 to the county in the previous fiscal year. If a county is
27 calculated to receive less than the determined range, the
28 department shall increase the level of funding to the lowest
29 level of the determined range by using no more than forty
30 percent of the funds from counties calculated to receive more
31 than two thousand dollars above the highest level of the
32 determined range.

33 In order to receive allocations under this paragraph, the
34 county board of supervisors, after consultation with the local
35 boards of health, county board of social welfare, area agency

1 on aging advisory council, local office of the department of
2 human services, and other in-home health care provider
3 agencies in the jurisdiction, shall prepare a proposal for the
4 use of the allocated funds available for that jurisdiction
5 that will provide the maximum benefits of expanded homemaker-
6 home health aide services to elderly and low-income persons
7 and children and adults in need of protective services in the
8 jurisdiction. The proposal may provide that a maximum of ten
9 percent of the allocated funds will be used to provide chore
10 services. The proposal shall include a statement assuring
11 that children and adults in need of protective services are
12 given priority for homemaker-home health aide services and
13 that the appropriate local agencies have participated in the
14 formulation of the proposal. After approval of the proposal
15 by the department, the department shall enter into a contract
16 with the county board of supervisors or a governmental body
17 designated by the county board of supervisors. The county
18 board of supervisors or its designee shall subcontract with a
19 nonprofit nurses' association, an independent nonprofit
20 agency, the department of human services, or a suitable local
21 governmental body to use the allocated funds to provide
22 homemaker-home health aide services and chore services
23 providing that the subcontract requires any service provided
24 away from the home to be documented in a report available for
25 review by the department.

26 If by July 30 of each year of the biennium, the department
27 is unable to conclude contracts for use of the allocated funds
28 in a county, the department shall consider the unused funds
29 appropriated under this paragraph an unallocated pool. The
30 department shall also identify any allocated funds which the
31 counties do not anticipate spending during each fiscal year of
32 the biennium. If the anticipated excess funds to any county
33 are substantial, the department and the county may agree to
34 return those excess funds, if the funds are other than program
35 revenues, to the department, and if returned, the department

1 shall consider the returned funds a part of the unallocated
2 pool. The department shall prior to February 15 of each fis-
3 cal year of the biennium, reallocate the funds in the
4 unallocated pool among the counties in which the department
5 has concluded contracts under this paragraph. The department
6 shall also review the first ten months' expenditures for each
7 county in May of each year, to determine if any counties have
8 contracted funds which they do not anticipate spending. If
9 such funds are identified and the county agrees to release the
10 funds, the released funds will be considered a new
11 reallocation pool. The department may, prior to June 1 of
12 each year, reallocate funds from this new reallocation pool to
13 those counties which have experienced a high utilization of
14 protective service hours for children and dependent adults.

15 The department shall maintain rules governing the
16 expenditure of funds appropriated by this paragraph. The
17 rules require each local agency receiving funds to establish
18 and use a sliding fee scale for those persons able to pay for
19 all or a portion of the cost of the services and shall require
20 the payments to be applied to the cost of the services. The
21 department shall also maintain rules for standards regarding
22 training, supervision, recordkeeping, appeals, program
23 evaluation, cost analysis, and financial audits, and rules
24 specifying reporting requirements.

25 The department shall annually evaluate the success of the
26 homemaker-home health aide program. The evaluation shall
27 include a description of the program and its implementation,
28 the extent of local participation, the extent to which the
29 program reduced or prevented inappropriate
30 institutionalization, the extent to which the program provided
31 or increased the availability of homemaker-home health aide
32 services to elderly and low-income persons and children and
33 adults in need of protective services, any problems and
34 recommendations concerning the program, and an analysis of the
35 costs of services across the state. The department shall

1 submit a report of the annual evaluation to the governor and
2 the general assembly.

3 d. For the development and main-
4 tenance of well-elderly clinics in the
5 state \$ 216,367

6 Sec. 3. There is appropriated from the general fund of the
7 state to the Iowa department of veterans affairs for the
8 fiscal year beginning July 1, 1985, and ending June 30, 1986,
9 the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to
10 be used for the purposes designated:

34 Sec. 5. The licensing boards for which general fund appro-
35 priations have been provided for in section 2, subsection 5 of

1 this Act may expend additional funds, if those additional
2 expenditures are directly the cause of actual examination
3 expenses exceeding funds budgeted for examinations. Before a
4 licensing board included in section 2, subsection 5 of this
5 Act expends or encumbers an amount in excess of the funds
6 budgeted for examinations, the state comptroller shall approve
7 the expenditure or encumbrance. Before approval is given, the
8 state comptroller shall determine that the examination
9 expenses exceed the funds budgeted by the general assembly to
10 the board and the board does not have other funds from which
11 examination expenses can be paid. Upon approval of the state
12 comptroller the licensing board may expend and encumber funds
13 for excess examination expenses. The amounts necessary to
14 fund the excess examination expenses shall be collected as
15 fees from additional examination applicants and shall be
16 treated as repayment receipts as defined in section 8.2,
17 subsection 5.

18 Sec. 6. All federal grants to and federal receipts of the
19 agencies appropriated funds under this Act are appropriated
20 for the purposes set forth in the federal grants or receipts
21 unless otherwise provided by the general assembly. Full-time
22 equivalent positions funded entirely with federal funds are
23 exempt from the limits on the number of full-time equivalent
24 positions provided in this Act, except for the department of
25 substance abuse pursuant to section 4 of this Act, but are
26 approved only for the period of time for which the federal
27 funds are available for the position.

28 EXPLANATION

29 This bill appropriates funding for the 1985-1986 fiscal
30 year to the commission on the aging, the commission for the
31 blind, the office of citizens' aide, the civil rights
32 commission, the Spanish-speaking peoples commission, the
33 commission on the status of women, the committee on employment
34 of the handicapped, the vocational rehabilitation division of
35 the department of public instruction, the department of

1 health, the department of veterans affairs, and the department
2 of substance abuse. The bill appropriates funding for the
3 divisions within the department of health and provides
4 designations for the specialized child health care services,
5 in-home health care grants, homemaker-home health aide
6 programs, and well-elderly clinics. The bill establishes
7 certain distribution and expenditure requirements for certain
8 special programs.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1985, and ending June 30, 1986, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used by the following agencies for the purposes designated:

 - a. For salaries and support of not more than twenty-nine and five-tenths full-time equivalent positions annually, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes \$ 260,117

 - d. For the older Iowans legislature \$ 13,608

The types of assistance to eligible recipients under the program may include hospital and medical expenses, home dialysis supplies, insurance premiums, travel expenses, prescription and nonprescription drugs, and lodging expenses for persons in training. The program expenditures shall not exceed these allocations. If projected expenditures will

exceed the allocations, the department shall establish by administrative rule a mechanism to reduce financial assistance under the renal disease program in order to keep expenditures within the allocations.

b. For grants to local boards of health for the public health nursing program \$ 2,207,477

Funds appropriated under this paragraph shall be used to maintain and expand the existing public health nursing program for elderly and low-income persons with the objective of preventing or reducing inappropriate institutionalization. The funds shall not be used for any other purpose. As used in this paragraph, "elderly person" means a person who is sixty years of age or older and "low-income person" means a person whose income and resources are below the guidelines established by the department.

One fourth of the total amount to be allocated shall be divided so that an equal amount is available for use in each county in the state. Three fourths of the total amount to be allocated shall be divided so that the share available for use in each county is proportionate to the number of elderly and low-income persons living in that county in relation to the total number of elderly and low-income persons living in the state.

In order to receive allocations under this paragraph, the local board of health having jurisdiction shall prepare a proposal for the use of the allocated funds available for that jurisdiction that will provide the maximum benefits of expanded public health nursing care to elderly and low-income persons in the jurisdiction. After approval of the proposal by the department, the department shall enter into a contract with the local board of health. The local board of health shall subcontract with a nonprofit nurses' association, an independent nonprofit agency, or a suitable local governmental body to use the allocated funds to provide public health nursing care. Local boards of health shall make an effort to

subcontract with agencies that are currently providing services to prevent duplication of services.

If by July 30 of each year of the biennium, the department is unable to conclude contracts for use of the allocated funds in a county, the department shall consider the unused funds appropriated under this paragraph an unallocated pool. If the unallocated pool is fifty thousand dollars or more it shall be reallocated to the counties in substantially the same manner as the original allocations. The reallocated funds are available for use in those counties during the period beginning January 1 and ending June 30 of each fiscal year of the biennium. If the unallocated pool is less than fifty thousand dollars, the department may allocate it to counties with demonstrated special needs for public health nursing.

The department shall maintain rules governing the expenditure of funds appropriated by paragraph "b". The rules require each local agency receiving funds to establish and use a sliding fee scale for those persons able to pay for all or a portion of the cost of the care.

The department shall annually evaluate the success of the public health nursing program. The evaluation shall include the extent to which the program reduced or prevented inappropriate institutionalization, the extent to which the program increased the availability of public health nursing care to elderly and low-income persons, and the extent of public health nursing care provided to elderly and low-income persons. The department shall submit a report of each annual evaluation to the governor and the general assembly.

c. For grants to county boards of supervisors for the homemaker-home health aide program \$ 7,389,200

Funds appropriated under this paragraph shall be used to provide homemaker-home health aide services with emphasis on services to elderly and low income persons and children and adults in need of protective services with the objective of preventing or reducing inappropriate institutionalization. In

addition, up to fifteen percent of the funds appropriated under this paragraph may be used to provide chore services. The funds shall not be used for any other purposes. As used in this paragraph:

(1) "Chore services" means services provided to individuals or families, who, due to absence, incapacity, or illness, are unable to perform certain home maintenance functions. The services include but are not limited to yard work such as mowing lawns, raking leaves, and shoveling walks; window and door maintenance such as hanging screen windows and doors, replacing window panes, and washing windows; and minor repairs to walls, floors, stairs, railings, and handies. It also includes heavy house cleaning which includes cleaning attics or basements to remove fire hazards, moving heavy furniture, extensive wall washing, floor care or painting, and trash removal.

(2) "Elderly person" means a person who is sixty years of age or older.

(3) "Homemaker-home health aide services" means services intended to enhance the capacity of household members to attain or maintain the independence of the household members and provided by trained and supervised workers to individuals or families, who, due to the absence, incapacity, or limitations of the usual homemaker, are experiencing stress or crisis. The services include but are not limited to essential shopping, housekeeping, meal preparation, child care, respite care, money management and consumer education, family management, personal services, transportation and providing information, assistance, household management and learning experiences.

(4) "Low-income person" means a person whose income and resources are below the guidelines established by the department.

(5) "Protective services" means those homemaker-home health aide services intended to stabilize a child's or an adult's residential environment and relationships with

relatives, caretakers, and other persons or household members in order to alleviate a situation involving abuse or neglect or to otherwise protect the child or adult from a threat of abuse or neglect.

(a) The department shall initiate the following allocation process unless determined unfeasible. In that event, the department shall utilize the allocation process in subparagraph (b). The amount appropriated under this paragraph shall be allocated for use in the counties of the state. Fifteen percent of the amount shall be divided so that an equal amount is available for use in each county in the state. The following percentages of the remaining amount shall be allocated to each county according to that county's proportion of residents with the following demographic characteristics compared to all state residents with the same demographic characteristics: sixty percent according to the number of elderly persons living in the county; twenty percent according to the number of low-income persons living in the county; and twenty percent according to the number of substantiated cases of child abuse in the county during the three most recent fiscal years for which data is available.

(b) In the event subparagraph (a) is determined unfeasible, the amount appropriated under this paragraph shall be allocated for use in the counties of the state. The entire amount shall be allocated based on a range determined from the formula based on subparagraph (a). However a county shall not receive less than ninety-four point seventy-eight percent nor more than one hundred three percent of the funding allocated to the county in the previous fiscal year. If a county is calculated to receive less than the determined range, the department shall increase the level of funding to the lowest level of the determined range by using no more than forty percent of the funds from counties calculated to receive more than two thousand dollars above the highest level of the determined range.

In order to receive allocations under this paragraph, the county board of supervisors, after consultation with the local boards of health, county board of social welfare, area agency on aging advisory council, local office of the department of human services, and other in-home health care provider agencies in the jurisdiction, shall prepare a proposal for the use of the allocated funds available for that jurisdiction that will provide the maximum benefits of expanded homemaker-home health aide services to elderly and low income persons and children and adults in need of protective services in the jurisdiction. The proposal may provide that a maximum of fifteen percent of the allocated funds will be used to provide chore services. The proposal shall include a statement assuring that children and adults in need of protective services are given priority for homemaker-home health aide services and that the appropriate local agencies have participated in the formulation of the proposal. After approval of the proposal by the department, the department shall enter into a contract with the county board of supervisors or a governmental body designated by the county board of supervisors. The county board of supervisors or its designee shall subcontract with a nonprofit nurses' association, an independent nonprofit agency, the department of human services, or a suitable local governmental body to use the allocated funds to provide homemaker-home health aide services and chore services providing that the subcontract requires any service provided away from the home to be documented in a report available for review by the department.

If by July 30 of each year of the biennium, the department is unable to conclude contracts for use of the allocated funds in a county, the department shall consider the unused funds appropriated under this paragraph an unallocated pool. The department shall also identify any allocated funds which the counties do not anticipate spending during each fiscal year of the biennium. If the anticipated excess funds to any county are substantial, the department and the county may agree to

return those excess funds, if the funds are other than program revenues, to the department, and if returned, the department shall consider the returned funds a part of the unallocated pool. The department shall prior to February 15 of each fiscal year of the biennium, reallocate the funds in the unallocated pool among the counties in which the department has concluded contracts under this paragraph. The department shall also review the first ten months' expenditures for each county in May of each year, to determine if any counties have contracted funds which they do not anticipate spending. If such funds are identified and the county agrees to release the funds, the released funds will be considered a new reallocation pool. The department may, prior to June 1 of each year, reallocate funds from this new reallocation pool to those counties which have experienced a high utilization of protective service hours for children and dependent adults.

The department shall maintain rules governing the expenditure of funds appropriated by this paragraph. The rules require each local agency receiving funds to establish and use a sliding fee scale for those persons able to pay for all or a portion of the cost of the services and shall require the payments to be applied to the cost of the services. The department shall also maintain rules for standards regarding training, supervision, recordkeeping, appeals, program evaluation, cost analysis, and financial audits, and rules specifying reporting requirements.

The department shall annually evaluate the success of the homemaker-home health aide program. The evaluation shall include a description of the program and its implementation, the extent of local participation, the extent to which the program reduced or prevented inappropriate institutionalization, the extent to which the program provided or increased the availability of homemaker home health aide services to elderly and low income persons and children and adults in need of protective services, any problems and recommendations concerning the program, and an analysis of the

costs of services across the state. The department shall submit a report of the annual evaluation to the governor and the general assembly.

d. For the development and maintenance of well-elderly clinics in the state \$ 216,367

Sec. 3. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the Iowa department of veterans affairs for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1985, and ending June 30, 1986, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

- 1. For salaries and support of not more than five full-time equivalent positions annually, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes \$ 114,866
- 2. For the war orphans educational aid fund \$ 15,000
- 3. For a chemical exposure reporting program \$ 34,593

It is the intent of the general assembly that for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1986, and every fiscal year thereafter, this additional funding for a chemical exposure reporting program shall not be appropriated.

Sec. 4. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the Iowa department of substance abuse for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1985, and ending June 30, 1986, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

- 1. For salaries and support of not more than twenty and five-tenths full-time equivalent posi-

tions annually funded from both state and federal funds, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes \$ 385,129

2. For program grants \$ 7,348,958

Sec. 5. The licensing boards for which general fund appropriations have been provided for in section 2, subsection 5 of this Act may expend additional funds, if those additional expenditures are directly the cause of actual examination expenses exceeding funds budgeted for examinations. Before a licensing board included in section 2, subsection 5 of this Act expends or encumbers an amount in excess of the funds budgeted for examinations, the state comptroller shall approve the expenditure or encumbrance. Before approval is given, the state comptroller shall determine that the examination expenses exceed the funds budgeted by the general assembly to the board and the board does not have other funds from which examination expenses can be paid. Upon approval of the state comptroller the licensing board may expend and encumber funds for excess examination expenses. The amounts necessary to fund the excess examination expenses shall be collected as fees from additional examination applicants and shall be treated as repayment receipts as defined in section 8.2, subsection 5.

Sec. 6. The amount of the funds appropriated under sections 1, 2, 3, and 4 of this Act for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1985 and ending June 30, 1986 shall be reduced by one percent, rounded to the nearest whole dollar, and the provisions of this section shall prevail over any other provisions of this Act. However, the funds appropriated in section 1, subsections 3, 4, and 8 and section 4 shall not be so reduced.

Sec. 7. All federal grants to and federal receipts of the agencies appropriated funds under this Act are appropriated for the purposes set forth in the federal grants or receipts unless otherwise provided by the general assembly. Full-time equivalent positions funded entirely with federal funds are

exempt from the limits on the number of full-time equivalent positions provided in this Act, except for the department of substance abuse pursuant to section 4 of this Act, but are approved only for the period of time for which the federal funds are available for the position.

Sec. 8. Total appropriations specified in this Act for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1985 and ending June 30, 1986 shall not be exceeded in the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1986 and ending June 30, 1987 unless revenue growth as estimated by the legislative fiscal bureau in its December 31, 1985 quarterly report exceeds four and one-half percent.
