A BILL FOR

1 An Act appropriating federal funds made available from federal
2 block grants and other federal grants, allocating portions of
3 federal block grants, and providing procedures if federal
4 funds are more or less than anticipated or if federal block
5 grants are more or less than anticipated or if categorical
6 grants are consolidated into new or existing block grants and
7 providing an effective date.

1 Section 1. ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE AND MENTAL HEALTH
2 SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

3 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
4 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
5 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September
6 30, 1993, the following amount:

7 \$ 8,212,000

8 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
9 funds to be received from the federal government for the
10 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
11 IX, Subtitle A, and Pub. L. No. 97-414 which provides for the
12 alcohol and drug abuse and mental health services block grant.
13 The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this
14 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds
15 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

16 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
17 exceeding 4.25 percent shall be used by the department for
18 administrative expenses.

19 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
20 exceeding \$29,680 shall be used for audits.

21 2. Ten percent of the remaining funds, as allowed pursuant
22 to Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title IX, subtitle A, and which are
23 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be transferred to the
24 division of mental health, mental retardation, and
25 developmental disabilities within the department of human
26 services and allocated for community mental health centers
27 with priority being given to dual diagnosis. Of this amount,
28 10 percent shall be used to provide services and programs for
29 severely emotionally disturbed children and adolescents, and
30 55 percent shall be used to develop and provide community
31 mental health services and programs not available on October
32 1, 1988. New services developed between October 1, 1984, and
33 October 1, 1988, with alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health
34 services block grant funds may be treated as new services. Of
35 the amount transferred to the division under this subsection,

1 an amount not exceeding 5 percent shall be used by the
2 department of human services for administrative expenses.

3 3. Ten percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1
4 shall be used to provide alcohol and drug abuse services to
5 women.

6 4. After deducting the funds allocated in subsections 1,
7 2, and 3, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1
8 shall be allocated according to the following percentages to
9 supplement appropriations for the following programs within
10 the Iowa department of public health:

11 a. Drug abuse treatment programs
12 38.89%

13 Of the amount appropriated under this paragraph, at least
14 \$1,436,856 shall be used for intravenous drug abusers unless a
15 waiver is granted from the federal government.

16 b. Alcohol abuse treatment programs
17 38.89%

18 c. Alcohol and drug abuse prevention programs
19 22.22%

20 Priority shall be given to maintaining existing services,
21 reducing the treatment waiting lists, providing aftercare
22 services, and providing early intervention in the treatment of
23 substance-abusing pregnant women.

24 Priority shall be given to maintaining existing services
25 and funding additional prevention services.

26 Sec. 2. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

27 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
28 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
29 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September
30 30, 1993, the following amount:

31 \$ 6,793,917

32 The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
33 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
34 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
35 XXI, Subtitle D, as amended, which provides for the maternal

1 and child health services block grant. The department shall
2 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
3 in the federal law making the funds available and in
4 conformance with chapter 17A.

5 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
6 exceeding \$57,184 shall be used for audits.

7 Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by
8 the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect
9 costs.

10 2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds
11 appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public
12 health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health
13 for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be
14 used for audits in subsection 1.

15 The departments of public health, human services, and
16 education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
17 child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the
18 maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of
19 services to women and children in selected pilot areas.

20 3. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds appropriated
21 in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement
22 appropriations for maternal and child health programs within
23 the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds,
24 \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care
25 program.

26 Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
27 subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa
28 hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of
29 regents for mobile and regional child health specialty
30 clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall
31 not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds
32 for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment
33 and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional
34 child-health speciality clinics.

35 4. Those federal maternal and child health services block

1 grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and
2 health services block grant funds under section 3, subsection
3 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
4 1992, are transferred to the maternal and child health
5 programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
6 child health specialty clinics according to the percentages
7 specified in subsection 3.

8 5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer
9 the statewide maternal and child health program and the
10 crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional
11 child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities
12 to improve the health of low-income women and children and to
13 promote the welfare of children with actual or potential
14 handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance
15 with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social
16 Security Act.

17 Sec. 3. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES
18 APPROPRIATIONS.

19 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
20 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
21 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September
22 30, 1993, the following amount:

23 \$ 1,064,250

24 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
25 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
26 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
27 IX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive health and
28 health services block grant. The department shall expend the
29 funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the
30 federal law making the funds available and in conformance with
31 chapter 17A.

32 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
33 exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

34 2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds
35 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa

1 department of public health for administrative expenses in
2 addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

3 3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1,
4 the specific amount of funds required by Pub. L. No. 97-35,
5 Title IX, Subtitle A, shall be allocated to the rape
6 prevention program.

7 4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title IX, Subtitle A, as
8 amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
9 subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the
10 state treasury established under section 8.41, for use by the
11 Iowa department of public health as authorized by Pub. L. No.
12 97-35, Title XXI, Subtitle D, as amended, and section 2 of
13 this Act.

14 5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in
15 subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated
16 in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for risk
17 reduction services, including nutrition programs, health
18 incentive programs, chronic disease services, emergency
19 medical services, monitoring of the fluoridation program and
20 startup fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency
21 syndrome. The moneys used by the department concerning
22 acquired immune deficiency syndrome shall not be used for the
23 funding of indirect costs. Of the funds used by the
24 department under this subsection, an amount not exceeding
25 \$90,000 shall be used for the monitoring of the fluoridation
26 program and for start-up fluoridation grants to public water
27 systems, and at least \$50,000 shall be used to provide
28 chlamydia testing.

29 Sec. 4. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM
30 APPROPRIATION.

31 1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section
32 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement
33 and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year
34 beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the
35 following amount:

1 \$ 4,750,446

2 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
3 funds to be received from the federal government for the
4 designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which
5 provides for the drug control and system improvement grant
6 program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall
7 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
8 in the federal law making the funds available and in
9 conformance with chapter 17A.

10 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
11 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug
12 enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for
13 administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
14 subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement
15 and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of
16 state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use
17 and administration of the state's portion of the funds
18 appropriated in subsection 1.

19 Sec. 5. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

20 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by
21 section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of
22 the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
23 beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the
24 following amount:

25 \$ 3,946,078

26 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
27 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
28 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
29 VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services
30 block grant. The division of community action agencies of the
31 department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated
32 by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the
33 funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

34 b. The administrator of the division of community action
35 agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not

1 less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to
2 programs benefiting low-income persons based upon the size of
3 the poverty-level population in the area represented by the
4 community action areas compared to the size of the poverty-
5 level population in the state.

6 2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent of the funds
7 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the division of
8 community action agencies of the department of human rights
9 for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
10 subsection for administrative expenses, the division of
11 community action agencies of the department of human rights
12 shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay
13 the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's
14 portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The
15 auditor of state shall bill the division of community action
16 agencies for the costs of the audits.

17 Sec. 6. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

18 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
19 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal
20 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September
21 30, 1993, the following amount:

22 \$ 25,100,000

23 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
24 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
25 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
26 III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development
27 block grant. The department of economic development shall
28 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
29 in the federal law making the funds available and in
30 conformance with chapter 17A.

31 2. An amount not exceeding \$1,204,000 for the federal
32 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, shall be used by the
33 department of economic development for administrative expenses
34 for the community development block grant. The total amount
35 used for administrative expenses includes \$602,000 for the

1 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, of funds
2 appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from
3 the state equal to \$602,000 from the appropriation of state
4 funds for the community development block grant and state
5 appropriations for related activities of the department of
6 economic development. From the funds set aside for
7 administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of
8 economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an
9 amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
10 administration of the state's portion of the funds
11 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
12 the department for the costs of the audit.

13 Sec. 7. EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.

14 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
15 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year
16 beginning July 1, 1992, and ending June 30, 1993, the fol-
17 lowing amount:

18 \$ 4,950,000

19 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
20 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
21 Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The
22 department shall expend the funds appropriated by this
23 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds
24 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

25 2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
26 1, not to exceed \$990,000, shall be used by the department for
27 targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students
28 at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and
29 educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out
30 schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and
31 professional development, for programs to enhance personal ex-
32 cellence of students, and for other innovative projects.
33 However, not more than 25 percent of the amount available for
34 state programs shall be used by the department for state
35 administrative expenses.

1 3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
2 1 shall be allocated by the department to local educational
3 agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined
4 in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this
5 subsection shall be allocated to local educational agencies
6 according to the following percentages and enrollments:

7 a. Eighty percent shall be allocated on the basis of
8 enrollments in public and approved nonpublic schools.

9 b. Twenty percent shall be allocated to those local edu-
10 cational agencies enrolling the greatest percent of dis-
11 advantaged children.

12 4. Funds appropriated in this section shall not be used to
13 aid schools or programs that illegally discriminate in
14 employment or educational programs on the basis of sex, race,
15 color, national origin, or disability.

16 Sec. 8. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

17 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
18 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the
19 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
20 beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the
21 following amount:

22 \$ 27,446,162

23 The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
24 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
25 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
26 XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the
27 low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division
28 of community action agencies of the department of human rights
29 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
30 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
31 conformance with chapter 17A.

32 2. An amount not exceeding \$2,744,615, or 10 percent of
33 the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may
34 be used for administrative expenses for the low-income home
35 energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be

1 used for administrative expenses of the division of community
2 action agencies of the department of human rights. Not more
3 than \$274,462 shall be used for administrative expenses for
4 the affordable heating program. From the total funds set
5 aside by this subsection for administrative expenses for the
6 low-income home energy assistance program, an amount
7 sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and
8 administration of the state's portion of the funds
9 appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of
10 state shall bill the division of community action agencies for
11 the costs of the audits.

12 3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall
13 be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in ac-
14 cordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of
15 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to
16 meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable
17 portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the
18 funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the
19 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, at least 15
20 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be
21 used for low-income residential weatherization or other
22 related home repairs for low-income households. Of this
23 amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for
24 administrative expenses.

25 4. An eligible household must be willing to allow
26 residential weatherization or other related home repairs in
27 order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible
28 household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the
29 landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related
30 home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving
31 home energy assistance.

32 5. Of the funds appropriated under subsection 1,
33 \$4,500,000 shall be used to fund the affordable heating
34 program.

35 6. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated

1 under subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution
2 of energy problems.

3 Sec. 9. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

4 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
5 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal
6 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September
7 30, 1993, the following amount:

8 \$ 31,853,745

9 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
10 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
11 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
12 XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-
13 1397f, which provides for the social services block grant.
14 The department of human services shall expend the funds
15 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
16 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
17 17A.

18 2. Not more than \$1,837,961 of the funds appropriated in
19 subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services
20 for general administration. From the funds set aside by this
21 subsection for general administration, the department of human
22 services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount
23 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
24 administration of the state's portion of the funds
25 appropriated in subsection 1.

26 3. In addition to the allocation for general
27 administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds
28 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the
29 following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal
30 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, for the following
31 programs within the department of human services:

32 a. Field operations:
33 \$ 12,582,229

34 b. Preventive services:
35 \$ 146,527

1	c. Child and family services:	
2	\$ 14,633,611
3	d. Child care assistance:	
4	\$ 1,360,155
5	e. Local administrative costs:	
6	\$ 1,165,847
7	f. Volunteers:	
8	\$ 127,415

9 Any funds that would have been allocated from the federal
10 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, to local services for
11 the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1993, shall be
12 allocated to the child and family services appropriation.

13 Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department
14 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop
15 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant
16 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

17 The proposed plan shall include all programs and services
18 at the state level which the department proposes to fund with
19 federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify
20 state and other funds which the department proposes to use to
21 fund the state programs and services.

22 The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and
23 services which are eligible to be funded with federal social
24 services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social
25 services block grant funds available for the local programs
26 and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal
27 social services block grant funds to the counties. The
28 proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will
29 be used to fund the local programs and services.

30 The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's
31 budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

32 Sec. 11. MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE HOMELESS BLOCK
33 GRANT. Upon receipt of the minimum block grant from the
34 federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration
35 to provide mental health services for the homeless, the

1 division of mental health, mental retardation, and
2 developmental disabilities of the department of human services
3 shall assure that a project which receives funds under the
4 block grant from either the federal or nonfederal state match
5 share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to
6 persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who
7 are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless
8 shall do all of the following:

- 9 1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic
10 services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and
11 rehabilitation services.
- 12 2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary
13 hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health
14 services and substance abuse services.
- 15 3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide
16 services to persons targeted by the grant.
- 17 4. Provide case management to homeless persons.
- 18 5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain
19 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not
20 otherwise supported.

21 Sec. 12. JOBS CHILD CARE ENTITLEMENT BLOCK GRANT. There
22 is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
23 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
24 beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the
25 following amount:

26 \$ 3,226,408

27 Funds appropriated by this section are the funds
28 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
29 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5081, which provides for the jobs
30 child care entitlement block grant. The department shall
31 expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in
32 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
33 with chapter 17A.

34 Sec. 13. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is
35 appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the

1 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
2 beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the
3 following amount:

4 \$ 7,191,272

5 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
6 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
7 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the
8 child care and development block grant. The department shall
9 expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in
10 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
11 with chapter 17A.

12 Sec. 14. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

13 1. If the funds received from the federal government for
14 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the
15 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be
16 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than
17 for the rape prevention program under section 3, subsection 3
18 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according
19 to the percentages that each program is to receive as
20 specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines
21 that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be
22 sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or
23 if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the
24 governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect
25 to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various
26 programs for which the block grants are available.

27 2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for
28 in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

29 a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and
30 house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate
31 chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those
32 committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau
33 shall be notified of the proposed action.

34 b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and
35 information on the reasons why particular percentages or

1 amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the
2 departments and programs affected, and other information
3 deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at
4 least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action
5 before the action is taken.

6 Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

7 1. If funds received from the federal government in the
8 form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in
9 sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13 of this Act,
10 the excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs
11 according to the percentages specified in those sections,
12 except additional funds shall not be prorated for
13 administrative expenses.

14 2. If funds received from the federal government from
15 block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 8 of
16 this Act, at least 10 percent and not more than 15 percent of
17 the excess shall be allocated to the low-income residential
18 weatherization program.

19 3. If funds received from the federal government from
20 community services block grants exceed the amount appropriated
21 in section 5 of this Act, 100 percent of the excess is

No. 97-35, Title IX, Subtitle A, and Pub. L. No. 97-414 which provides for the alcohol and drug abuse and mental health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding 4.25 percent shall be used by the department for administrative expenses.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$29,680 shall be used for audits.

2. Ten percent of the remaining funds, as allowed pursuant to Pub. L. APPROPRIATING FEDERAL FUNDS MADE AVAILABLE FROM FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS AND OTHER FEDERAL GRANTS, ALLOCATING PORTIONS OF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS, AND PROVIDING PROCEDURES IF FEDERAL FUNDS ARE MORE OR LESS THAN ANTICIPATED OR IF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS ARE MORE OR LESS THAN ANTICIPATED OR IF CATEGORICAL GRANTS ARE CONSOLIDATED INTO NEW OR EXISTING BLOCK GRANTS AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE AND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

4. After deducting the funds allocated in subsections 1, 2, and 3, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated according to the following percentages to supplement appropriations for the following programs within the Iowa department of public health:

- a. Drug abuse treatment programs 38.89%
- Of the amount appropriated under this paragraph, at least \$1,436,856 shall be used for intravenous drug abusers unless a waiver is granted from the federal government.
- b. Alcohol abuse treatment programs 38.89%
- c. Alcohol and drug abuse prevention programs 22.22%

Priority shall be given to maintaining existing services, reducing the treatment waiting lists, providing aftercare services, and providing early intervention in the treatment of substance-abusing pregnant women.

Priority shall be given to maintaining existing services and funding additional prevention services.

Sec. 2. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

..... \$ 6,793,917

The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXI, Subtitle D, as amended, which provides for the maternal and child health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$57,184 shall be used for audits.

Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect costs.

2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

The departments of public health, human services, and education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of services to women and children in selected pilot areas.

3. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement appropriations for maternal and child health programs within the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds, \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care program.

Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of regents for mobile and regional child health specialty clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional child health specialty clinics.

4. Those federal maternal and child health services block grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and health services block grant funds under section 3, subsection 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, are transferred to the maternal and child health

programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional child health specialty clinics according to the percentages specified in subsection 3.

5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer the statewide maternal and child health program and the crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities to improve the health of low-income women and children and to promote the welfare of children with actual or potential handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social Security Act.

Sec. 3. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

..... \$ 1,511,916

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title IX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive health and health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa department of public health for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1, the specific amount of funds required by Pub. L. No. 97-35,

Title IX, Subtitle A, shall be allocated to the rape prevention program.

4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title IX, Subtitle A, as amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the state treasury established under section 8.41, for use by the Iowa department of public health as authorized by Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXI, Subtitle D, as amended, and section 2 of this Act.

5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for risk reduction services, including nutrition programs, health incentive programs, chronic disease services, emergency medical services, monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome. The moneys used by the department concerning acquired immune deficiency syndrome shall not be used for the funding of indirect costs. Of the funds used by the department under this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$90,000 shall be used for the monitoring of the fluoridation program and for start-up fluoridation grants to public water systems, and at least \$50,000 shall be used to provide chlamydia testing.

Sec. 4. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

..... \$ 4,750,446

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which

provides for the drug control and system improvement grant program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

Sec. 5. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

..... \$ 3,946,078

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services block grant. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. The administrator of the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to programs benefiting low-income persons based upon the size of the poverty-level population in the area represented by the community action areas compared to the size of the poverty-level population in the state.

2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the division of community action agencies for the costs of the audits.

Sec. 6. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

..... \$ 25,100,000

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development block grant. The department of economic development shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding \$1,204,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, shall be used by the department of economic development for administrative expenses for the community development block grant. The total amount used for administrative expenses includes \$602,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, of funds appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from the state equal to \$602,000 from the appropriation of state funds for the community development block grant and state appropriations for related activities of the department of

economic development. From the funds set aside for administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the department for the costs of the audit.

Sec. 7. EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1992, and ending June 30, 1993, the following amount:

..... \$ 4,967,755

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, not to exceed \$993,550, shall be used by the department for targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and professional development, for programs to enhance personal excellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the ability of teachers and school counselors to identify, particularly in the early grades, students with reading and reading-related problems which place those students at risk for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount available for state programs shall be used by the department for state administrative expenses.

3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated by the department to local educational agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this subsection shall be allocated to local educational agencies according to the following percentages and enrollments:

a. Eighty percent shall be allocated on the basis of enrollments in public and approved nonpublic schools.

b. Twenty percent shall be allocated to those local educational agencies enrolling the greatest percent of disadvantaged children.

4. Funds appropriated in this section shall not be used to aid schools or programs that illegally discriminate in employment or educational programs on the basis of sex, race, color, national origin, or disability.

Sec. 8. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

..... \$ 27,446,162

The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding \$2,744,615, or 10 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may be used for administrative expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be

used for administrative expenses of the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights. Not more than \$274,462 shall be used for administrative expenses for the affordable heating program. From the total funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program, an amount sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of state shall bill the division of community action agencies for the costs of the audits.

3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in accordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, at least 15 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be used for low-income residential weatherization or other related home repairs for low-income households. Of this amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for administrative expenses.

4. An eligible household must be willing to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs in order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving home energy assistance.

5. Of the funds appropriated under subsection 1, \$4,500,000 shall be used to fund the affordable heating program.

6. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated under subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution of energy problems.

Sec. 9. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

..... \$ 31,089,115

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-1397f, which provides for the social services block grant. The department of human services shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Not more than \$1,793,842 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services for general administration. From the funds set aside by this subsection for general administration, the department of human services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

3. In addition to the allocation for general administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, for the following programs within the department of human services:

a. Field operations:

Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop a plan for the use of federal social services block grant funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

The proposed plan shall include all programs and services at the state level which the department proposes to fund with federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify state and other funds which the department proposes to use to fund the state programs and services.

The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and services which are eligible to be funded with federal social services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social services block grant funds available for the local programs and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal social services block grant funds to the counties. The proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will be used to fund the local programs and services.

The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

Sec. 11. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration to provide mental health services for the homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities of the department of human

services shall assure that a project which receives funds under the formula grant from either the federal or local match share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless shall do all of the following:

1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and rehabilitation services.
2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health services and substance abuse services.
3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide services to persons targeted by the grant.
4. Provide case management to homeless persons.
5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain homeless persons living in residential settings which are not otherwise supported.
6. Projects may expend funds for housing services including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing, security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental payments to prevent eviction.

Sec. 12. JOBS CHILD CARE ENTITLEMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

Funds appropriated by this section are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5081, which provides for the jobs child care entitlement block grant. The department shall

expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Sec. 13. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, and ending September 30, 1993, the following amount:

..... \$ 7,191,272

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the child care and development block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Sec. 14. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If the funds received from the federal government for the block grants specified in this Act are less than the amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than for the rape prevention program under section 3, subsection 3 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according to the percentages that each program is to receive as specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various programs for which the block grants are available.

2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate

chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau shall be notified of the proposed action.

b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and information on the reasons why particular percentages or amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the departments and programs affected, and other information deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action before the action is taken.

Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If funds received from the federal government in the form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13 of this Act, the excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs according to the percentages specified in those sections, except additional funds shall not be prorated for administrative expenses.

2. If funds received from the federal government from block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 8 of this Act, at least 10 percent and not more than 15 percent of the excess shall be allocated to the low-income residential weatherization program.

3. If funds received from the federal government from community services block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 5 of this Act, 100 percent of the excess is allocated to the community services block grant program.

Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR CONSOLIDATED, CATEGORICAL, OR EXPANDED FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS. Notwithstanding section 8.41, federal funds made available to the state which are authorized for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, resulting from the federal government consolidating former categorical grants into block grants, or which expand block grants included in Pub. L. No. 97-35, to include additional programs formerly funded by categorical grants, which are not

otherwise appropriated by the general assembly, are appropriated for the programs formerly receiving the categorical grants, subject to the conditions of this section. The governor shall, whenever possible, allocate from the block grant to each program in the same proportion as the amount of federal funds received by the program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1991, as modified by the 1992 Session of the Seventy-fourth General Assembly for the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1992, compared to the total federal funds received in the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1991, by all programs consolidated into the block grant. However, if one agency did not have categorical funds appropriated for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1991, but had anticipated applying for funds during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1992, the governor may allocate the funds in order to provide funding.

If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or expanded block grant is less than the total amount of federal funds received for the programs in the form of categorical grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1991, state funds appropriated to the program by the general assembly to match the federal funds shall be reduced by the same proportion of the reduction in federal funds for the program. State funds released by the reduction shall be deposited in a special fund in the state treasury and are available for appropriation by the general assembly. The governor shall notify the chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of the subcommittees of those committees, and the legislative fiscal director before making the allocation of federal funds or any proportional reduction of state funds under this section. The notice shall state the amount of federal funds to be allocated to each program, the amount of federal funds received by the program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,

1991, the amount by which state funds for the program will be reduced according to this section and the amount of state funds received by the program during the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1991. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action before the action is taken.

If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or expanded block grant is more than the total amount of federal funds received for the programs in the form of categorical grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1991, the excess funds shall be deposited in the special fund created in section 8.41 and are subject to the provisions of that section.

If other federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds become available or are awarded which are not available or awarded during the period in which the general assembly is in session, but which require expenditure by the department of education prior to March 15 of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1992, and ending June 30, 1993, these grants, receipts, and funds are appropriated to the extent necessary, provided that the fiscal committee of the legislative council is notified within thirty days of receipt of the grants, receipts, or funds and the fiscal committee of the legislative council has an opportunity to comment on the expenditure of the grants, receipts, or funds.

Sec. 54. NOTIFICATION OF RECEIPT OF FEDERAL AND OTHER NONSTATE FUNDS. All agencies of this state enumerated in this Act shall report to the department of management and the legislative fiscal bureau the receipt of federal and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1991, and ending June 30, 1992, and the

anticipated receipt of federal and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1992, and ending June 30, 1993. The notification shall be made no later than November 15, 1992, and shall include the names of the grantor and the grant or the source of the funds, the estimated amount of the funds, and the planned expenditures and use of the funds. The format of the notification shall be specified by the legislative fiscal bureau.

Sec. 55. Section 16 of this Act, being deemed of immediate importance, takes effect upon enactment.
