A BILL FOR

1 An Act appropriating federal funds made available from federal
2 block grants and other federal grants, allocating portions of
3 federal block grants, and providing procedures if federal
4 funds are more or less than anticipated or if federal block
5 grants are more or less than anticipated or if categorical
6 grants are consolidated into new or existing block grants and
7 providing an effective date.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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HF 2323

1 Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

2 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
3 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
4 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September
5 30, 1995, the following amount:

6:..... \$ 9,769,497

7 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
8 funds to be received from the federal government for the
9 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
10 XIX, Subtitle B, section 202, which provides for the substance
11 abuse prevention and treatment block grant. The department
12 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
13 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
14 conformance with chapter 17A.

15 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
16 exceeding 5 percent shall be used by the department for
17 administrative expenses.

18 Of the amount appropriated in this subsection, an amount
19 not less than five percent shall be used to increase, from the
20 amount available in fiscal years beginning July 1, 1991, and
21 July 1, 1992, the amount available for treatment services for
22 pregnant women and women with dependent children with
23 provisions that prenatal and child care be provided to those
24 women while they are in treatment.

25 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
26 exceeding \$24,585 shall be used for audits, including a study
27 of the effectiveness of treatment programs.

28 2. The funds remaining from the appropriation made in
29 subsection 1 shall be allocated as follows:

30 a. At least 20 percent of the allocation shall be for
31 prevention programs.

32 b. At least thirty-five percent of the allocation shall be
33 spent on drug treatment and prevention activities.

34 c. At least thirty-five percent of the allocation shall be
35 spent on alcohol treatment and prevention activities.

1 3. The substance abuse block grant funds received from the
 2 federal government in excess of the amount of the anticipated
 3 federal fiscal year 1994-1995 award appropriated in subsection
 4 1 shall be distributed at least fifty percent to treatment
 5 programs and fifty percent to prevention programs except that,
 6 based upon federal guidelines, the total amount of the excess
 7 awarded to prevention programs shall not exceed \$1,000,000.

8 Sec. 2. COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

9 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by
 10 section 8.41 to the Iowa department of human services for the
 11 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending
 12 September 30, 1995, the following amount:

13 \$ 2,047,187

14 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
 15 funds to be received from the federal government for the
 16 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-321,
 17 Title II, Subpart I, section 1911, which provides for the
 18 community mental health services block grant. The department
 19 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
 20 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
 21 conformance with chapter 17A.

22 b. The administrator of the division of mental health,
 23 mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall
 24 allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the block
 25 grant to eligible community mental health services providers
 26 for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved by the
 27 federal substance abuse and mental health services
 28 administration for the fiscal year involved.

29 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
 30 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department
 31 of human services for administrative expenses. From the funds
 32 set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the
 33 division of mental health, mental retardation, and
 34 developmental disabilities shall pay to the auditor of state
 35 an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and

1 administration of the state's portion of the funds
2 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
3 the division of mental health, mental retardation, and
4 developmental disabilities for the costs of the audits.

5 Sec. 3. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

6 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
7 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
8 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September
9 30, 1995, the following amount:

10 \$ 6,827,338

11 The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
12 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
13 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
14 V, which provides for the maternal and child health services
15 block grant. The department shall expend the funds
16 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
17 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
18 17A.

19 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
20 exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

21 Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by
22 the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect
23 costs.

24 2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds
25 appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public
26 health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health
27 for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be
28 used for audits in subsection 1.

29 The departments of public health, human services, and
30 education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
31 child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the
32 maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of
33 services to women and children.

34 3. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds appropriated
35 in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement

1 appropriations for maternal and child health programs within
2 the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds,
3 \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care
4 program.

5 Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
6 subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa
7 hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of
8 regents for mobile and regional child health specialty
9 clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall
10 not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds
11 for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment
12 and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional
13 child health specialty clinics.

14 4. Those federal maternal and child health services block
15 grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and
16 health services block grant funds under section 4, subsection
17 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
18 1994, are transferred to the maternal and child health
19 programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
20 child health specialty clinics according to the percentages
21 specified in subsection 3.

22 5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer
23 the statewide maternal and child health program and the
24 crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional
25 child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities
26 to improve the health of low-income women and children and to
27 promote the welfare of children with actual or potential
28 handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance
29 with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social
30 Security Act.

31 Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES
32 APPROPRIATIONS.

33 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
34 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
35 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September

1 30, 1995, the following amount:

2 \$ 1,676,182

3 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
4 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
5 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-531,
6 Title XIX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive
7 health and health services block grant. The department shall
8 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
9 in the federal law making the funds available and in
10 conformance with chapter 17A.

11 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
12 exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

13 2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds
14 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa
15 department of public health for administrative expenses in
16 addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

17 3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1,
18 the specific amount of funds stipulated by the notice of block
19 grant award shall be allocated to the rape prevention program.

20 4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 102-531 Title XIX, Subtitle A,
21 as amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
22 subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the
23 state treasury established under section 8.41, for use by the
24 Iowa department of public health as authorized by Pub. L. No.
25 97-35, Title V, and section 3 of this Act.

26 5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in
27 subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated
28 in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy
29 people 2000/healthy Iowans 2000 program objectives, preventive
30 health advisory committee, and risk reduction services,
31 including nutrition programs, health incentive programs,
32 chronic disease services, emergency medical services,
33 monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up
34 fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome.
35 The moneys used by the department concerning acquired immune

1 deficiency syndrome shall not be used for the funding of
2 indirect costs. Of the funds used by the department under
3 this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$90,000 shall be used
4 for the monitoring of the fluoridation program and for start-
5 up fluoridation grants to public water systems, and at least
6 \$50,000 shall be used to provide chlamydia testing.

7 Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM
8 APPROPRIATION.

9 1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section
10 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement
11 and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year
12 beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the
13 following amount:

14 \$ 4,200,000

15 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
16 funds to be received from the federal government for the
17 designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which
18 provides for the drug control and system improvement grant
19 program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall
20 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
21 in the federal law making the funds available and in
22 conformance with chapter 17A.

23 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
24 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug
25 enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for
26 administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
27 subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement
28 and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of
29 state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use
30 and administration of the state's portion of the funds
31 appropriated in subsection 1.

32 Sec. 6. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

33 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by
34 section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of
35 the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year

1 beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the
2 following amount:

3 \$ 4,198,770

4 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
5 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
6 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
7 VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services
8 block grant. The division of community action agencies of the
9 department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated
10 by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the
11 funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

12 b. The administrator of the division of community action
13 agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not
14 less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to
15 eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting
16 low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a
17 minimum allocation of no less than \$100,000. The minimum
18 allocation shall be achieved by redistributing increased funds
19 from agencies experiencing a greater share of available funds.
20 The funds shall be distributed on the basis of the poverty-
21 level population in the area represented by the community
22 action areas compared to the size of the poverty-level
23 population in the state.

24 2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent of the funds
25 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the division of
26 community action agencies of the department of human rights
27 for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
28 subsection for administrative expenses, the division of
29 community action agencies of the department of human rights
30 shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay
31 the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's
32 portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The
33 auditor of state shall bill the division of community action
34 agencies for the costs of the audits.

35 Sec. 7. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

1 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
2 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal
3 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September
4 30, 1995, the following amount:

5 \$ 31,600,000

6 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
7 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
8 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
9 III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development
10 block grant. The department of economic development shall
11 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
12 in the federal law making the funds available and in
13 conformance with chapter 17A.

14 2. An amount not exceeding \$1,464,000 for the federal
15 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, shall be used by the
16 department of economic development for administrative expenses
17 for the community development block grant. The total amount
18 used for administrative expenses includes \$732,000 for the
19 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, of funds
20 appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from
21 the state equal to \$732,000 from the appropriation of state
22 funds for the community development block grant and state
23 appropriations for related activities of the department of
24 economic development. From the funds set aside for
25 administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of
26 economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an
27 amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
28 administration of the state's portion of the funds
29 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
30 the department for the costs of the audit.

31 Sec. 8. EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.

32 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
33 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year
34 beginning July 1, 1994, and ending June 30, 1995, the fol-
35 lowing amount:

1 \$ 4,796,625

2 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
3 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
4 Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The
5 department shall expend the funds appropriated by this
6 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds
7 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

8 2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
9 1, not to exceed \$959,325, shall be used by the department for
10 targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students
11 at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and
12 educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out
13 schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and
14 professional development, for programs to enhance personal ex-
15 cellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the
16 ability of teachers and school counselors to identify,
17 particularly in the early grades, students with reading and
18 reading-related problems which place those students at risk
19 for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative
20 projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount
21 available for state programs shall be used by the department
22 for state administrative expenses.

23 3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
24 1 shall be allocated by the department to local educational
25 agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined
26 in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this
27 subsection shall be allocated to local educational agencies
28 according to the following percentages and enrollments:

29 a. Eighty percent shall be allocated on the basis of
30 enrollments in public and approved nonpublic schools.

31 b. Twenty percent shall be allocated to those local edu-
32 cational agencies enrolling the greatest percent of dis-
33 advantaged children.

34 4. Funds appropriated in this section shall not be used to
35 aid schools or programs that illegally discriminate in

1 employment or educational programs on the basis of sex, race,
2 color, national origin, or disability.

3 Sec. 9. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

4 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
5 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the
6 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
7 beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the
8 following amount:

9 \$ 26,281,082

10 The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
11 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
12 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
13 XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the
14 low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division
15 of community action agencies of the department of human rights
16 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
17 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
18 conformance with chapter 17A.

19 2. An amount not exceeding \$2,233,892, or 10 percent of
20 the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may
21 be used for administrative expenses for the low-income home
22 energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be
23 used for administrative expenses of the division of community
24 action agencies of the department of human rights. From the
25 total funds set aside by this subsection for administrative
26 expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program, an
27 amount sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and
28 administration of the state's portion of the funds
29 appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of
30 state shall bill the division of community action agencies for
31 the costs of the audits.

32 3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall
33 be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in ac-
34 cordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of
35 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to

1 meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable
2 portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the
3 funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the
4 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, at least 15
5 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be
6 used for low-income residential weatherization or other
7 related home repairs for low-income households. Of this
8 amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for
9 administrative expenses.

10 4. An eligible household must be willing to allow
11 residential weatherization or other related home repairs in
12 order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible
13 household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the
14 landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related
15 home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving
16 home energy assistance.

17 5. Of the funds appropriated under subsection 1,
18 \$1,000,000 shall be reserved to pay final vendor
19 reconciliations of all affordable heating assistance
20 participants.

21 6. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated
22 under subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution
23 of energy problems.

24 Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

25 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
26 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal
27 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September
28 30, 1995, the following amount:

29 \$ 30,694,425

30 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
31 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
32 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
33 XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-
34 1397f, which provides for the social services block grant.
35 The department of human services shall expend the funds

1 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
2 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
3 17A.

4 2. Not more than \$1,725,148 of the funds appropriated in
5 subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services
6 for general administration. From the funds set aside by this
7 subsection for general administration, the department of human
8 services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount
9 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
10 administration of the state's portion of the funds
11 appropriated in subsection 1.

12 3. In addition to the allocation for general
13 administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds
14 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the
15 following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal
16 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, for the following
17 programs within the department of human services:

- 18 a. Field operations:
19 \$ 12,124,297
- 20 b. Child and family services:
21 \$ 14,101,019
- 22 c. Child care assistance:
23 \$ 1,310,652
- 24 d. Local administrative costs
25 and other local services:
26 \$ 1,164,210
- 27 e. Volunteers:
28 \$ 122,778
- 29 f. Community-based services:
30 \$ 146,321

31 Sec. 11. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department
32 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop
33 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant
34 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

35 The proposed plan shall include all programs and services

1 at the state level which the department proposes to fund with
2 federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify
3 state and other funds which the department proposes to use to
4 fund the state programs and services.

5 The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and
6 services which are eligible to be funded with federal social
7 services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social
8 services block grant funds available for the local programs
9 and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal
10 social services block grant funds to the counties. The
11 proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will
12 be used to fund the local programs and services.

13 The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's
14 budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

15 Sec. 12. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM
16 HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from
17 the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health
18 administration to provide mental health services for the
19 homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation,
20 and developmental disabilities of the department of human
21 services shall assure that a project which receives funds
22 under the formula grant from either the federal or local match
23 share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to
24 persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who
25 are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless
26 shall do all of the following:

27 1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic
28 services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and
29 rehabilitation services.

30 2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary
31 hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health
32 services and substance abuse services.

33 3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide
34 services to persons targeted by the grant.

35 4. Provide case management to homeless persons.

1 5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain
2 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not
3 otherwise supported.

4 6. Projects may expend funds for housing services
5 including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing,
6 security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance
7 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing
8 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless
9 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental
10 payments to prevent eviction.

11 Sec. 13. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is
12 appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
13 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
14 beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the
15 following amount:

16 \$ 8,469,766

17 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
18 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
19 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the
20 child care and development block grant. The department shall
21 expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in
22 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
23 with chapter 17A.

24 Sec. 14. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

25 1. If the funds received from the federal government for
26 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the
27 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be
28 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than
29 for the rape prevention program under section 4, subsection 3
30 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according
31 to the percentages that each program is to receive as
32 specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines
33 that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be
34 sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or
35 if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the

1 governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect
2 to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various
3 programs for which the block grants are available.

4 2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for
5 in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

6 a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and
7 house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate
8 chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those
9 committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau
10 shall be notified of the proposed action.

11 b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and
12 information on the reasons why particular percentages or
13 amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the
14 departments and programs affected, and other information
15 deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at
16 least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action
17 before the action is taken.

18 Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

19 1. If funds received from the federal government in the
20 form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in
21 sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, and 13 of this Act, the
22 excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs according
23 to the percentages specified in those sections, except
24 additional funds shall not be prorated for administrative

22 a. At least 20 percent of the allocation shall be for
23 prevention programs.

24 b. Thirty-five percent of the allocation must be spent on
25 drug treatment and prevention activities.

26 c. Thirty-five percent of the allocation must be spent on
27 alcohol treatment and prevention activities with not less than
28 5 percent of the grant to increase, from the amount available
29 in fiscal years beginning July 1, 1991, and July 1, 1992, the
30 amount available for treatment services for pregnant women and
31 women with dependent children with provisions that prenatal
32 and child care be provided to those women while they are in
33 treatment.

34 Sec. 2. COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

35 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by

1 section 8.41 to the Iowa department of human services for the
2 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending
3 September 30, 1995, the following amount:

4 \$ 2,047,187

5 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
6 funds to be received from the federal government for the
7 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-321,
8 Title II, Subpart I, section 1911, which provides for the
9 community mental health services block grant. The department
10 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
11 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
12 conformance with chapter 17A.

13 b. The administrator of the division of mental health,
14 mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall
15 allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the block
16 grant to eligible community mental health services providers
17 for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved by the
18 federal substance abuse and mental health services
19 administration for the fiscal year involved.

20 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
21 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department
22 of human services for administrative expenses. From the funds
23 set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the
24 division of mental health, mental retardation, and
25 developmental disabilities shall pay to the auditor of state
26 an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
27 administration of the state's portion of the funds
28 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
29 the division of mental health, mental retardation, and
30 developmental disabilities for the costs of the audits.

31 **Sec. 3. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.**

32 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
33 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
34 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September
35 30, 1995, the following amount:

1 \$ 6,827,338

2 The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
3 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
4 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
5 V, which provides for the maternal and child health services
6 block grant. The department shall expend the funds
7 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
8 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
9 17A.

10 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
11 exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

12 Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by
13 the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect
14 costs.

15 2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds
16 appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public
17 health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health
18 for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be
19 used for audits in subsection 1.

20 The departments of public health, human services, and
21 education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
22 child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the
23 maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of
24 services to women and children in selected pilot areas.

25 3. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds appropriated
26 in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement
27 appropriations for maternal and child health programs within
28 the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds,
29 \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care
30 program.

31 Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
32 subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa
33 hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of
34 regents for mobile and regional child health specialty
35 clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall

1 not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds
2 for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment
3 and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional

6 grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and
7 health services block grant funds under section 4, subsection

11 child health specialty clinics according to the percentages
12 specified in subsection 3.

13 5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer
14 the statewide maternal and child health program and the
15 crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional
16 child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities
17 to improve the health of low-income women and children and to
18 promote the welfare of children with actual or potential
19 handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance
20 with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social
21 Security Act.

22 Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES
23 APPROPRIATIONS.

24 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
25 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
26 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September
27 30, 1995, the following amount:

28 \$ 1,676,182

29 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
30 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
31 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-531,
32 Title XIX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive
33 health and health services block grant. The department shall
34 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
35 in the federal law making the funds available and in

1 conformance with chapter 17A.

2 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
3 exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

4 2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds
5 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa
6 department of public health for administrative expenses in
7 addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

8 3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1,
9 the specific amount of funds stipulated by the notice of block
10 grant award shall be allocated to the rape prevention program.

11 4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 102-531 Title XIX, Subtitle A,
12 as amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
13 subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the
14 state treasury established under section 8.41, for use by the
15 Iowa department of public health as authorized by Pub. B. No.
16 97-35, Title V, and section 3 of this Act.

17 5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in
18 subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated
19 in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy
20 people 2000/healthy Iowans 2000 program objectives, preventive
21 health advisory committee, and risk reduction services,
22 including nutrition programs, health incentive programs,
23 chronic disease services, emergency medical services,

33 Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM
34 APPROPRIATION.

35 1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section

1 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement
2 and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year
3 beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the
4 following amount:

5 \$ 4,200,000

6 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
7 funds to be received from the federal government for the
8 designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which
9 provides for the drug control and system improvement grant
10 program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall
11 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
12 in the federal law making the funds available and in
13 conformance with chapter 17A.

14 2. An amount not exceeding 6 percent of the funds
15 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug
16 enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for
17 administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
18 subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement
19 and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of
20 state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use
21 and administration of the state's portion of the funds
22 appropriated in subsection 1.

23 Sec. 6. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

24 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by
25 section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of
26 the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
27 beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the
28 following amount:

29 \$ 4,198,770

30 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
31 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
32 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
33 VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services
34 block grant. The division of community action agencies of the
35 department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated

1 by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the
2 funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

3 b. The administrator of the division of community action
4 agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not
5 less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to
6 eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting
7 low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a
8 minimum allocation of no less than \$100,000. The minimum
9 allocation shall be achieved by redistributing increased funds
10 from agencies experiencing a greater share of available funds.

26 Sec. 7. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

27 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
28 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal
29 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September
30 30, 1995, the following amount:

31 \$ 31,600,000

32 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
33 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
34 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
35 III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development

1 block grant. The department of economic development shall
2 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
3 in the federal law making the funds available and in
4 conformance with chapter 17A.

5 2. An amount not exceeding \$1,464,000 for the federal
6 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, shall be used by the
7 department of economic development for administrative expenses
8 for the community development block grant. The total amount
9 used for administrative expenses includes \$732,000 for the
10 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, of funds
11 appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from
12 the state equal to \$732,000 from the appropriation of state
13 funds for the community development block grant and state
14 appropriations for related activities of the department of
15 economic development. From the funds set aside for
16 administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of
17 economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an
18 amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
19 administration of the state's portion of the funds
20 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
21 the department for the costs of the audit.

22 Sec. 8. EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.

23 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
24 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year
25 beginning July 1, 1994, and ending June 30, 1995, the fol-
26 lowing amount:

27 \$ 4,076,355

28 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
29 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
30 Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The
31 department shall expend the funds appropriated by this
32 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds
33 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

34 2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
35 1, not to exceed \$815,271, shall be used by the department for

1 targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students
2 at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and
3 educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out
4 schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and
5 professional development, for programs to enhance personal ex-
6 cellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the
7 ability of teachers and school counselors to identify,
8 particularly in the early grades, students with reading and
9 reading-related problems which place those students at risk
10 for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative
11 projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount
12 available for state programs shall be used by the department

14 3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection

16 agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined
17 in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this

29 Sec. 9. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

30 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
31 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the
32 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
33 beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the
34 following amount:

35 \$ 26,281,082

1 The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
2 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
3 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
4 XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the
5 low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division
6 of community action agencies of the department of human rights
7 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
8 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
9 conformance with chapter 17A.

10 2. An amount not exceeding \$2,233,892, or 10 percent of
11 the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may
12 be used for administrative expenses for the low-income home
13 energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be
14 used for administrative expenses of the division of community
15 action agencies of the department of human rights. Not more
16 than \$194,390 shall be used for administrative expenses for
17 the affordable heating program. From the total funds set
18 aside by this subsection for administrative expenses for the
19 low-income home energy assistance program, an amount
20 sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and
21 administration of the state's portion of the funds
22 appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of
23 state shall bill the division of community action agencies for
24 the costs of the audits.

25 3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall
26 be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in ac-
27 cordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of
28 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to
29 meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable
30 portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the
31 funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the
32 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, at least 15
33 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be
34 used for low-income residential weatherization or other
35 related home repairs for low-income households. Of this

1 amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for
2 administrative expenses.

3 4. An eligible household must be willing to allow
4 residential weatherization or other related home repairs in
5 order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible
6 household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the
7 landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related
8 home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving
9 home energy assistance.

10 5. Of the funds appropriated under subsection 1,
11 \$3,500,000 shall be used to fund the affordable heating
12 program.

13 6. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated
14 under subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution
15 of energy problems.

16 Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

17 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
18 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal
19 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September
20 30, 1995, the following amount:

21 \$ 30,694,425

22 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
23 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
24 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
25 XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-
26 1397f, which provides for the social services block grant.
27 The department of human services shall expend the funds
28 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
29 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
30 17A.

31 2. Not more than \$1,725,148 of the funds appropriated in
32 subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services
33 for general administration. From the funds set aside by this
34 subsection for general administration, the department of human
35 services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount

1 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
2 administration of the state's portion of the funds
3 appropriated in subsection 1.

4 3. In addition to the allocation for general
5 administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds
6 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the
7 following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal
8 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, for the following
9 programs within the department of human services:

10 a. Field operations:

11 \$ 12,124,297

12 b. Child and family services:

13 \$ 14,101,019

14 c. Child care assistance:

15 \$ 1,310,652

16 d. Local administrative costs

17 and other local services:

18 \$ 1,164,210

19 e. Volunteers:

23 Sec. 11. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department
24 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop
25 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant
26 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

27 The proposed plan shall include all programs and services
28 at the state level which the department proposes to fund with
29 federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify
30 state and other funds which the department proposes to use to
31 fund the state programs and services.

32 The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and
33 services which are eligible to be funded with federal social
34 services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social
35 services block grant funds available for the local programs

1 and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal
2 social services block grant funds to the counties. The
3 proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will
4 be used to fund the local programs and services.

5 The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's
6 budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

7 Sec. 12. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM
8 HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from
9 the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health
10 administration to provide mental health services for the
11 homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation,
12 and developmental disabilities of the department of human
13 services shall assure that a project which receives funds
14 under the formula grant from either the federal or local match
15 share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to
16 persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who
17 are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless
18 shall do all of the following:

19 1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic
20 services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and
21 rehabilitation services.

22 2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary
23 hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health
24 services and substance abuse services.

25 3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide
26 services to persons targeted by the grant.

27 4. Provide case management to homeless persons.

28 5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain
29 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not
30 otherwise supported.

31 6. Projects may expend funds for housing services
32 including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing,
33 security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance
34 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing
35 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless

1 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental
2 payments to prevent eviction.

3 Sec. 13. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is
4 appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
5 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
6 beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the
7 following amount:

8 \$ 8,469,766

9 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
10 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
11 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the
12 child care and development block grant. The department shall
13 expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in
14 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
15 with chapter 17A.

16 Sec. 14. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

17 1. If the funds received from the federal government for
18 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the
19 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be
20 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than
21 for the rape prevention program under section 4, subsection 3
22 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according
23 to the percentages that each program is to receive as
24 specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines
25 that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be
26 sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or
27 if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the
28 governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect
29 to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various
30 programs for which the block grants are available.

31 2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for
32 in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

33 a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and
34 house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate
35 chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those

1 committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau
2 shall be notified of the proposed action.

3 b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and
4 information on the reasons why particular percentages or
5 amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the
6 departments and programs affected, and other information
7 deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at
8 least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action
9 before the action is taken.

10 Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

11 1. If funds received from the federal government in the
12 form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in
13 sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, and 13 of this Act, the
14 excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs according
15 to the percentages specified in those sections, except
16 additional funds shall not be prorated for administrative
17 expenses.

18 2. If funds received from the federal government from
19 block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 9 of
20 this Act, at least 15 percent and not more than 15 percent of
21 the excess shall be allocated to the low-income residential
22 weatherization program.

23 3. If funds received from the federal government from
24 community services block grants exceed the amount appropriated
25 in section 6 of this Act, 100 percent of the excess is
26 allocated to the community services block grant program.

27 Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR CONSOLIDATED, CATEGORICAL, OR
28 EXPANDED FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS. Notwithstanding section 8.41,
29 federal funds made available to the state which are authorized
30 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994,
31 resulting from the federal government consolidating former
32 categorical grants into block grants, or which expand block
33 grants included in Pub. L. No. 97-35, to include additional
34 programs formerly funded by categorical grants, which are not
35 otherwise appropriated by the general assembly, are

1 appropriated for the programs formerly receiving the .
2 categorical grants, subject to the conditions of this section.
3 The governor shall, whenever possible, allocate from the block
4 grant to each program in the same proportion as the amount of
5 federal funds received by the program during the federal
6 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, as modified by the 1994
7 Session of the Seventy-fifth General Assembly for the state
8 fiscal year beginning July 1, 1994, compared to the total
9 federal funds received in the federal fiscal year beginning
10 October 1, 1993, by all programs consolidated into the block
11 grant. However, if one agency did not have categorical funds
12 appropriated for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
13 1993, but had anticipated applying for funds during the
14 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, the governor
15 may allocate the funds in order to provide funding.

16 If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or
17 expanded block grant is less than the total amount of federal
18 funds received for the programs in the form of categorical
19 grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993,
20 state funds appropriated to the program by the general
21 assembly to match the federal funds shall be reduced by the
22 same proportion of the reduction in federal funds for the
23 program. State funds released by the reduction shall be
24 deposited in a special fund in the state treasury and are
25 available for appropriation by the general assembly. The
26 governor shall notify the chairpersons and ranking members of
27 the senate and house standing committees on appropriations,
28 the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of the
29 subcommittees of those committees, and the legislative fiscal
30 director before making the allocation of federal funds or any

The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding 5 percent shall be used by the department for administrative expenses.

Of the amount appropriated in this subsection, an amount not less than five percent shall be used to increase, from the amount available in fiscal years beginning July 1, 1991, and July 1, 1992, the amount available for treatment services for pregnant women and women with dependent children with provisions that prenatal and child care be provided to those women while they are in treatment.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$24,585 shall be used for audits, including a study of the effectiveness of treatment programs.

2. The funds remaining from the appropriation made in subsection 1 shall be allocated as follows:

- a. At least 20 percent of the allocation shall be for prevention programs.
- b. At least thirty-five percent of the allocation shall be spent on drug treatment and prevention activities.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

federal fiscal year 1994-1995 award appropriated in subsection 1 shall be distributed at least fifty percent to treatment programs and fifty percent to prevention programs except that, based upon federal guidelines, the total amount of the excess awarded to prevention programs shall not exceed \$1,000,000.

b. The administrator of the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the block grant to eligible community mental health services providers for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved by the federal substance abuse and mental health services administration for the fiscal year involved.

2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities for the costs of the audits.

Sec. 3. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the following amount:

The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title V, which provides for the maternal and child health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect costs.

2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

The departments of public health, human services, and education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of services to women and children.

3. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement appropriations for maternal and child health programs within the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds, \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care program.

Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of regents for mobile and regional child health specialty

clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional child health specialty clinics.

4. Those federal maternal and child health services block grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and health services block grant funds under section 4, subsection 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, are transferred to the maternal and child health programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional child health specialty clinics according to the percentages specified in subsection 3.

After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy people 2000/healthy Iowans 2000 program objectives, preventive health advisory committee, and risk reduction services, including nutrition programs, health incentive programs, chronic disease services, emergency medical services, monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome. The moneys used by the department concerning acquired immune deficiency syndrome shall not be used for the funding of indirect costs. Of the funds used by the department under this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$90,000 shall be used for the monitoring of the fluoridation program and for start-up fluoridation grants to public water systems, and at least \$50,000 shall be used to provide chlamydia testing.

Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the following amount:

..... \$ 4,200,000

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which provides for the drug control and system improvement grant program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

Sec. 6. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the following amount:

..... \$ 4,198,770

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services block grant. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. The administrator of the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a

minimum allocation of no less than \$100,000. The minimum allocation shall be achieved by redistributing increased funds from agencies experiencing a greater share of available funds. The funds shall be distributed on the basis of the poverty-level population in the area represented by the community action areas compared to the size of the poverty-level population in the state.

2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the division of community action agencies for the costs of the audits.

Sec. 7. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the following amount:

..... \$ 31,600,000

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development block grant. The department of economic development shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding \$1,464,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, shall be used by the department of economic development for administrative expenses for the community development block grant. The total amount used for administrative expenses includes \$732,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, of funds

appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from the state equal to \$732,000 from the appropriation of state funds for the community development block grant and state appropriations for related activities of the department of economic development. From the funds set aside for administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the department for the costs of the audit.

Sec. 8. EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1994, and ending June 30, 1995, the following amount:

..... \$ 4,796,625

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, not to exceed \$959,325, shall be used by the department for targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and professional development, for programs to enhance personal excellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the ability of teachers and school counselors to identify, particularly in the early grades, students with reading and reading-related problems which place those students at risk for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount available for state programs shall be used by the department for state administrative expenses.

3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated by the department to local educational agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this subsection shall be allocated to local educational agencies according to the following percentages and enrollments:

a. Eighty percent shall be allocated on the basis of enrollments in public and approved nonpublic schools.

b. Twenty percent shall be allocated to those local educational agencies enrolling the greatest percent of disadvantaged children.

4. Funds appropriated in this section shall not be used to aid schools or programs that illegally discriminate in employment or educational programs on the basis of sex, race, color, national origin, or disability.

Sec. 9. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the following amount:

..... \$ 26,281,082

The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding \$2,233,892, or 10 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may be used for administrative expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be used for administrative expenses of the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights. From the total funds set aside by this subsection for administrative

expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program, an amount sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of state shall bill the division of community action agencies for the costs of the audits.

3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in accordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, at least 15 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be used for low-income residential weatherization or other related home repairs for low-income households. Of this amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for administrative expenses.

4. An eligible household must be willing to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs in order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving home energy assistance.

5. Of the funds appropriated under subsection 1, \$1,000,000 shall be reserved to pay final vendor reconciliations of all affordable heating assistance participants.

6. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated under subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution of energy problems.

Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the following amount:

..... \$ 30,694,425

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-1397f, which provides for the social services block grant. The department of human services shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Not more than \$1,725,148 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services for general administration. From the funds set aside by this subsection for general administration, the department of human services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

3. In addition to the allocation for general administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, for the following programs within the department of human services:

- a. Field operations: \$ 12,124,297
- b. Child and family services: \$ 14,101,019
- c. Child care assistance: \$ 1,010,652
- d. Local administrative costs and other local services: \$ 1,164,210
- e. Volunteers: \$ 122,778
- f. Community-based services: \$ 146,321

Sec. 11. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop a plan for the use of federal social services block grant funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

The proposed plan shall include all programs and services at the state level which the department proposes to fund with federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify state and other funds which the department proposes to use to fund the state programs and services.

The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and services which are eligible to be funded with federal social services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social services block grant funds available for the local programs and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal social services block grant funds to the counties. The proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will be used to fund the local programs and services.

The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

Sec. 12. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration to provide mental health services for the homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities of the department of human services shall assure that a project which receives funds under the formula grant from either the federal or local match share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless shall do all of the following:

1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and rehabilitation services.
2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health services and substance abuse services.

3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide services to persons targeted by the grant.

4. Provide case management to homeless persons.

5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain homeless persons living in residential settings which are not otherwise supported.

6. Projects may expend funds for housing services including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing, security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental payments to prevent eviction.

Sec. 13. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, and ending September 30, 1995, the following amount:

..... \$ 8,469,766

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the child care and development block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Sec. 14. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If the funds received from the federal government for the block grants specified in this Act are less than the amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than for the rape prevention program under section 4, subsection 3 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according to the percentages that each program is to receive as specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the

governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various programs for which the block grants are available.

2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau shall be notified of the proposed action.

b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and information on the reasons why particular percentages or amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the departments and programs affected, and other information deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action before the action is taken.

Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If funds received from the federal government in the form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, and 13 of this Act, the excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs according to the percentages specified in those sections, except additional funds shall not be prorated for administrative expenses.

2. If funds received from the federal government from block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 9 of this Act, at least 15 percent and not more than 15 percent of the excess shall be allocated to the low-income residential weatherization program.

3. If funds received from the federal government from community services block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 6 of this Act, 100 percent of the excess is allocated to the community services block grant program.

Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR CONSOLIDATED, CATEGORICAL, OR EXPANDED FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS. Notwithstanding section 8.41, federal funds made available to the state which are authorized for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994,

resulting from the federal government consolidating former categorical grants into block grants, or which expand block grants included in Pub. L. No. 97-35, to include additional programs formerly funded by categorical grants, which are not otherwise appropriated by the general assembly, are appropriated for the programs formerly receiving the categorical grants, subject to the conditions of this section. The governor shall, whenever possible, allocate from the block grant to each program in the same proportion as the amount of federal funds received by the program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, as modified by the 1994 Session of the Seventy-fifth General Assembly for the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1994, compared to the total federal funds received in the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, by all programs consolidated into the block grant. However, if one agency did not have categorical funds appropriated for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, but had anticipated applying for funds during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, the governor may allocate the funds in order to provide funding.

If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or expanded block grant is less than the total amount of federal funds received for the programs in the form of categorical grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, state funds appropriated to the program by the general assembly to match the federal funds shall be reduced by the same proportion of the reduction in federal funds for the program. State funds released by the reduction shall be deposited in a special fund in the state treasury and are available for appropriation by the general assembly. The governor shall notify the chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of the subcommittees of those committees, and the legislative fiscal director before making the allocation of federal funds or any proportional reduction of state funds under this section. The notice shall state the amount of federal funds to be allocated to each program, the amount of federal funds received by the

program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, the amount by which state funds for the program will be reduced according to this section and the amount of state funds received by the program during the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1993. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action before the action is taken.

If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or expanded block grant is more than the total amount of federal funds received for the programs in the form of categorical grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1993, the excess funds shall be deposited in the special fund created in section 8.41 and are subject to the provisions of that section.

Sec. 17. PROCEDURE FOR EXPENDITURE OF ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDS. If other federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds become available or are awarded which are not available or awarded during the period in which the general assembly is in session, but which require expenditure by the applicable department or agency prior to March 15 of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1994, and ending June 30, 1995, these grants, receipts, and funds are appropriated to the extent necessary, provided that the fiscal committee of the legislative council is notified within thirty days of receipt of the grants, receipts, or funds and the fiscal committee of the legislative council has an opportunity to comment on the expenditure of the grants, receipts, or funds.

Sec. 18. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP. Federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds, available in whole or in part for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1994, and ending June 30, 1995, are appropriated to the department of agriculture and land stewardship for the purposes set forth in the grants, receipts, or conditions accompanying the receipt of the funds, unless otherwise provided by law, in the following amounts for the purposes indicated.
