3	A Concurrent Resolution calling for a nationwide cease
4	fire in the escalating business recruitment war.
5	WHEREAS, the development of a global economy,
6	acceleration of technological innovation, and other
7	economic conditions have intensified pressures on
8	state governments to offer financial incentives to
9	attract and retain jobs; and
10	WHEREAS, Iowa is being asked to become involved in
11	very high-stakes bidding wars with other states and
12	localities to compete for new, relocating, and
13	expanding businesses; and
14	WHEREAS, businesses are increasingly prone to
15	routinely request financial incentives, regardless of
16	actual need, and without a demonstrated method of
17	determining actual need; and
18	WHEREAS, increasing use of financial incentives by
19	state governments fosters a reliance on incentives to
20	the detriment of other more salutary long-term
21	economic strategies, such as workforce development
22	programs; and
2 3	WHEREAS, increasing reliance on financial
	incentives by state governments has engendered a
25	pernicious bidding war with ever-escalating costs for
26	each new job created; and
27	WHEREAS, increasing per-job costs of financial
	incentives raise serious questions concerning the
	relative benefit of certain economic development
30	projects based on their ever-increasing costs; and

- 1 WHEREAS, increasing per-job costs of financial
- 2 incentive packages will inevitably inflate the minimum
- 3 expectation of businesses seeking assistance; and
- 4 WHEREAS, state governments cannot determine whether
- 5 the award of, or failure to award, financial
- 6 incentives has a significant influence on the decision
- 7 of a specific business to locate at a particular site;
- 8 and
- 9 WHEREAS, a 1992 survey of 200 executives conducted
- 10 for the International Association of Corporate Real
- 11 Estate Executives revealed that of the top 10 factors
- 12 in site location decisions, property taxes and
- 13 business taxes ranked only eighth and tenth
- 14 respectively; and
- 15 WHEREAS, the economic bidding war between the
- 16 states produces no gain for the nation's economy as a
- 17 whole, and the nation, Iowa, and other individual
- 18 states stand to benefit more from economic cooperation
- 19 than confrontation; NOW THEREFORE,
- 20 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, THE
- 21 SENATE CONCURRING, That the Governor of the State of
- 22 Iowa is urged to enter into negotiations with the
- 23 governors of the other states to enter into an
- 24 agreement to foster cooperative economic development
- 25 policies and limit the mutually destructive financial
- 26 incentive war.
- 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the members of the
- 28 Iowa congressional delegation are urged to solicit the
- 29 help of members of Congress from other states in
- 30 securing the cooperation of other governors in

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1 negotiating such an agreement.
       BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Chief Clerk of the
  3 Iowa House of Representatives send copies of this
  4 resolution to the Governor of the State of Iowa and to
 5 each member of the Iowa congressional delegation.
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
