HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 311 MERTZ, EDDIE, VANDE HOEF, MAY, GREIG, DREES, 2 BY and BRANSTAD 3 (COMPANION TO SCR 20 BY COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE) 4 5 A Concurrent Resolution in support of improvement in the wetland delineation process and a moratorium 6 on wetlands determination until the 1995 farm bill 7 has been passed and signed into law by the Congress 8 and the President. 9 WHEREAS, it has been historically consistent policy 10 11 of Iowa to improve the productivity of our soil to the 12 ultimate economic benefit of all Iowans; and WHEREAS, federal agencies have too much latitude 13 14 for interpretation to consistently apply wetland 15 policies, including a determination of which years 16 employed in the evaluation process are "wet", "dry", 17 or "normal" years; and WHEREAS, the definition of wetland is too complex 18 19 for people to understand; and 20 WHEREAS, wetland delineation issues will be debated 21 and modified in the 1995 farm bill requiring current 22 wetland delineations to be revised; and WHEREAS, the Fish and Wildlife Service, the 23 24 Environmental Protection Agency, the United States 25 Department of Agriculture, and the Army Corps of 26 Engineers all have federal jurisdiction over wetlands; 27 NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, THE 28 29 SENATE CONCURRING, That there be a moratorium on 30 wetland delineation until passage of the 1995 farm

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1 bill; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Congress should sencourage the voluntary preservation of wetlands, including the offering of incentives, but should not impose mandatory practices on owners of private property; and

7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Congress support the 8 right of farmers to repair, maintain, or improve 9 private drainage systems; and

10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Congress require lands 11 designated as a wetland be an area of not less than 12 ten acres in size; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That Congress recognize the need to reduce the financial burdens placed on our children's future due to its unsound budget practices which means fewer federal dollars can be dedicated to wetland issues making it essential to focus efforts on protecting true wetland areas, such as clearly identifiable swamps and marshes; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States; the Chief of Engineers, United States Army Corps of Engineers, North Central Division; the United States Secretary of Agriculture; the administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency; the Secretary of the Interior; the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives; the Majority Leader of the United States Senate; and the members of Iowa's congressional delegation.

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
