1 Section 1. Section 85.1, subsection 1, Code 1995, is
2 amended to read as follows:

3 1. Any employee engaged in any type of service in or about
4 a private dwelling except that after July 1, 1974, this
5 chapter shall apply to such persons who earn ~~two~~ seven hundred
6 fifty dollars or more from such employer for whom employed at
7 the time of the injury during the thirteen consecutive weeks
8 prior to the injury, provided ~~said~~ the employee is not a
9 regular member of the household. For purposes of this
10 subsection "member of the household" is defined to be the
11 spouse of the employer or relatives of either the employer or
12 spouse residing on the premises of the employer.

13 Sec. 2. Section 85.1, subsection 2, Code 1995, is amended
14 to read as follows:

15 2. Persons whose employment is purely casual and not for
16 the purpose of the employer's trade or business, except that
17 after July 1, 1974, this chapter shall apply to such employees
18 who earn ~~two~~ seven hundred fifty dollars or more from such
19 employer for whom employed at the time of the injury during
20 the thirteen consecutive weeks prior to the injury.

21 EXPLANATION

22 This bill provides that a person engaged in casual
23 employment or in service in or about a private dwelling is not
24 covered by workers' compensation if they earn less than \$750
25 during the 13 weeks prior to the injury. Current law provides
26 that workers' compensation does not apply if the person earns
27 less than \$200 during the 13 weeks. An employer is still able
28 to assume workers' compensation liability for these persons
29 but only if the employer purchases workers' compensation
30 insurance.
