A BILL FOR

1 An Act appropriating federal funds made available from federal
2 block grants and other federal grants, allocating portions of
3 federal block grants, and providing procedures if federal
4 funds are more or less than anticipated or if federal block
5 grants are more or less than anticipated or if categorical
6 grants are consolidated into new or existing block grants and
7 providing an effective and retroactive applicability date.

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

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HF 481

1 Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

2 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
3 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
4 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September
5 30, 1996, the following amount:

6 \$ 11,190,416

7 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
8 funds to be received from the federal government for the
9 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
10 XIX, Subtitle B, section 202, which provides for the substance
11 abuse prevention and treatment block grant. The department
12 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
13 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
14 conformance with chapter 17A.

15 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
16 exceeding 5 percent shall be used by the department for
17 administrative expenses.

18 The department shall expend no less than an amount equal to
19 the amount expended for treatment services in state fiscal
20 year beginning July 1, 1994, for pregnant women and women with
21 dependent children.

22 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
23 exceeding \$24,585 shall be used for audits.

24 2. The funds remaining from the appropriation made in
25 subsection 1 shall be allocated as follows:

26 a. At least 20 percent of the allocation shall be for
27 prevention programs.

28 b. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on
29 drug treatment and prevention activities.

30 c. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on
31 alcohol treatment and prevention activities.

32 3. The substance abuse block grant funds received from the
33 federal government in excess of the amount of the anticipated
34 federal fiscal year 1995-1996 award appropriated in subsection
35 1 shall be distributed at least 50 percent to treatment

1 programs and 50 percent to prevention programs except that,
2 based upon federal guidelines, the total amount of the excess
3 awarded to prevention programs shall not exceed \$1,000,000.

4 Sec. 2. COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

5 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by
6 section 8.41 to the Iowa department of human services for the
7 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending
8 September 30, 1996, the following amount:

9 \$ 2,829,397

10 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
11 funds to be received from the federal government for the
12 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-321,
13 Title II, Subpart I, section 1911, which provides for the
14 community mental health services block grant. The department
15 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
16 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
17 conformance with chapter 17A.

18 b. The administrator of the division of mental health,
19 mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall
20 allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the block
21 grant to eligible community mental health services providers
22 for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved by the
23 federal substance abuse and mental health services
24 administration for the fiscal year involved.

25 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
26 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department
27 of human services for administrative expenses. From the funds
28 set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the
29 division of mental health, mental retardation, and
30 developmental disabilities shall pay to the auditor of state
31 an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
32 administration of the state's portion of the funds
33 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
34 the division of mental health, mental retardation, and
35 developmental disabilities for the costs of the audits.

1 Sec. 3. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

2 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
3 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
4 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September
5 30, 1996, the following amount:

6 \$ 6,949,058

7 The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
8 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
9 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
10 V, which provides for the maternal and child health services
11 block grant. The department shall expend the funds
12 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
13 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
14 17A.

15 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
16 exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

17 Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by
18 the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect
19 costs.

20 2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds
21 appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public
22 health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health
23 for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be
24 used for audits in subsection 1.

25 The departments of public health, human services, and
26 education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
27 child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the
28 maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of
29 services to women and children.

30 3. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds appropriated
31 in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement
32 appropriations for maternal and child health programs within
33 the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds,
34 \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care
35 program.

1 Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
2 subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa
3 hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of
4 regents for mobile and regional child health specialty
5 clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall
6 not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds
7 for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment
8 and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional
9 child health specialty clinics.

10 4. Those federal maternal and child health services block
11 grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and
12 health services block grant funds under section 4, subsection
13 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
14 1995, are transferred to the maternal and child health
15 programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
16 child health specialty clinics according to the percentages
17 specified in subsection 3.

18 5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer
19 the statewide maternal and child health program and the
20 crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional
21 child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities
22 to improve the health of low-income women and children and to
23 promote the welfare of children with actual or potential
24 handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance
25 with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social
26 Security Act.

27 Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES
28 APPROPRIATIONS.

29 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
30 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
31 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September
32 30, 1996, the following amount:

33 \$ 1,783,899

34 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
35 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the

1 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-531,
2 Title XIX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive
3 health and health services block grant. The department shall
4 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
5 in the federal law making the funds available and in
6 conformance with chapter 17A.

7 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
8 exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

9 2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds
10 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa
11 department of public health for administrative expenses in
12 addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

13 3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1,
14 the specific amount of funds stipulated by the notice of block
15 grant award shall be allocated to the rape prevention program.

16 4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 102-531 Title XIX, Subtitle A,
17 as amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
18 subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the
19 state treasury established under section 8.41, for use by the
20 Iowa department of public health as authorized by Pub. L. No.
21 97-35, Title V, and section 3 of this Act.

22 5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in
23 subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated
24 in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy
25 people 2000/healthy Iowans 2000 program objectives, preventive
26 health advisory committee, and risk reduction services,
27 including nutrition programs, health incentive programs,
28 chronic disease services, emergency medical services,
29 monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up
30 fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome.
31 The moneys used pursuant to this subsection shall not be used
32 by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics or by the
33 state hygienic laboratory for the funding of indirect costs.
34 Of the funds used by the department under this subsection, an
35 amount not exceeding \$90,000 shall be used for the monitoring

1 of the fluoridation program and for start-up fluoridation
2 grants to public water systems, and at least \$50,000 shall be
3 used to provide chlamydia testing.

4 Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM
5 APPROPRIATION.

6 1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section
7 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement
8 and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year
9 beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the
10 following amount:

11 \$ 5,297,000

12 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
13 funds to be received from the federal government for the
14 designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which
15 provides for the drug control and system improvement grant
16 program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall
17 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
18 in the federal law making the funds available and in
19 conformance with chapter 17A.

20 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
21 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug
22 enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for
23 administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
24 subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement
25 and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of
26 state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use
27 and administration of the state's portion of the funds
28 appropriated in subsection 1.

29 Sec. 6. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

30 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by
31 section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of
32 the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
33 beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the
34 following amount:

35 \$ 4,216,399

1 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
2 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
3 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
4 VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services
5 block grant. The division of community action agencies of the
6 department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated
7 by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the
8 funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

9 b. The administrator of the division of community action
10 agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not
11 less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to
12 eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting
13 low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a
14 minimum allocation of no less than \$100,000. The minimum
15 allocation shall be achieved by redistributing increased funds
16 from agencies experiencing a greater share of available funds.
17 The funds shall be distributed on the basis of the poverty-
18 level population in the area represented by the community
19 action areas compared to the size of the poverty-level
20 population in the state.

21 2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent of the funds
22 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the division of
23 community action agencies of the department of human rights
24 for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
25 subsection for administrative expenses, the division of
26 community action agencies of the department of human rights
27 shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay
28 the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's
29 portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The
30 auditor of state shall bill the division of community action
31 agencies for the costs of the audits.

32 Sec. 7. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

33 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
34 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal
35 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September

1 30, 1996, the following amount:

2 \$ 31,501,000

3 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
4 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
5 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
6 III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development
7 block grant. The department of economic development shall
8 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
9 in the federal law making the funds available and in
10 conformance with chapter 17A.

11 2. An amount not exceeding \$1,460,000 for the federal
12 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, shall be used by the
13 department of economic development for administrative expenses
14 for the community development block grant. The total amount
15 used for administrative expenses includes \$730,000 for the
16 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, of funds
17 appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from
18 the state equal to \$730,000 from the appropriation of state
19 funds for the community development block grant and state
20 appropriations for related activities of the department of
21 economic development. From the funds set aside for
22 administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of
23 economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an
24 amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
25 administration of the state's portion of the funds
26 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
27 the department for the costs of the audit.

28 Sec. 8. EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.

29 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
30 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year
31 beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996, the fol-
32 lowing amount:

33 \$ 4,076,355

34 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
35 anticipated to be received from the federal government under

1 Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The
2 department shall expend the funds appropriated by this
3 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds
4 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

5 2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
6 1, not to exceed \$815,271 shall be used by the department for
7 targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students
8 at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and
9 educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out
10 schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and
11 professional development, for programs to enhance personal ex-
12 cellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the
13 ability of teachers and school counselors to identify,
14 particularly in the early grades, students with reading and
15 reading-related problems which place those students at risk
16 for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative
17 projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount
18 available for state programs shall be used by the department
19 for state administrative expenses.

20 3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
21 1 shall be allocated by the department to local educational
22 agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined
23 in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this
24 subsection shall be allocated to local educational agencies
25 according to the following percentages and enrollments:

26 a. Eighty percent shall be allocated on the basis of
27 enrollments in public and approved nonpublic schools.

28 b. Twenty percent shall be allocated to those local edu-
29 cational agencies enrolling the greatest percent of dis-
30 advantaged children.

31 4. Funds appropriated in this section shall not be used to
32 aid schools or programs that illegally discriminate in
33 employment or educational programs on the basis of sex, race,
34 color, national origin, or disability.

35 Sec. 9. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

1 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
2 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the
3 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
4 beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the
5 following amount:

6 \$ 23,976,768

7 The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
8 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
9 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
10 XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the
11 low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division
12 of community action agencies of the department of human rights
13 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
14 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
15 conformance with chapter 17A.

16 2. An amount not exceeding \$2,038,025 or 10 percent of the
17 funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may be
18 used for administrative expenses for the low-income home
19 energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be
20 used for administrative expenses of the division of community
21 action agencies of the department of human rights. From the
22 total funds set aside by this subsection for administrative
23 expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program, an
24 amount sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and
25 administration of the state's portion of the funds
26 appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of
27 state shall bill the division of community action agencies for
28 the costs of the audits.

29 3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall
30 be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in ac-
31 cordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of
32 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to
33 meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable
34 portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the
35 funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the

1 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1996, at least 15
2 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be
3 used for low-income residential weatherization or other
4 related home repairs for low-income households. Of this
5 amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for
6 administrative expenses.

7 4. An eligible household must be willing to allow
8 residential weatherization or other related home repairs in
9 order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible
10 household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the
11 landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related
12 home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving
13 home energy assistance.

14 5. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated
15 under subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution
16 of energy problems.

17 Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

18 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
19 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal
20 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September
21 30, 1996, the following amount:

22 \$ 30,379,684

23 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
24 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
25 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
26 XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-
27 1397f, which provides for the social services block grant.
28 The department of human services shall expend the funds
29 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
30 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
31 17A.

32 2. Not more than \$1,844,952 of the funds appropriated in
33 subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services
34 for general administration. From the funds set aside by this
35 subsection for general administration, the department of human

1 services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount
2 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
3 administration of the state's portion of the funds
4 appropriated in subsection 1.

5 3. In addition to the allocation for general
6 administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds
7 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the
8 following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal
9 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, for the following
10 programs within the department of human services:

- 11 a. Field operations:
12 \$ 11,034,866
- 13 b. Child and family services:
14 \$ 1,650,509
- 15 c. Child care assistance:
16 \$ 1,365,329
- 17 d. Local administrative costs
18 and other local services:
19 \$ 1,170,281
- 20 e. Volunteers:
21 \$ 127,900
- 22 f. Community-based services:
23 \$ 147,084
- 24 g. MH/MR/DD/BI community service (local purchase):
25 \$ 13,038,763

26 Sec. 11. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department
27 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop
28 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant
29 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

30 The proposed plan shall include all programs and services
31 at the state level which the department proposes to fund with
32 federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify
33 state and other funds which the department proposes to use to
34 fund the state programs and services.

35 The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and

1 services which are eligible to be funded with federal social
2 services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social
3 services block grant funds available for the local programs
4 and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal
5 social services block grant funds to the counties. The
6 proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will
7 be used to fund the local programs and services.

8 The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's
9 budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

10 Sec. 12. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM
11 HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from
12 the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health
13 administration to provide mental health services for the
14 homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation,
15 and developmental disabilities of the department of human
16 services shall assure that a project which receives funds
17 under the formula grant from either the federal or local match
18 share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to
19 persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who
20 are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless
21 shall do all of the following:

22 1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic
23 services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and
24 rehabilitation services.

25 2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary
26 hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health
27 services and substance abuse services.

28 3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide
29 services to persons targeted by the grant.

30 4. Provide case management to homeless persons.

31 5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain
32 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not
33 otherwise supported.

34 6. Projects may expend funds for housing services
35 including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing,

1 security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance
2 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing
3 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless
4 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental
5 payments to prevent eviction.

6 Sec. 13. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is
7 appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
8 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
9 beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the
10 following amount:

11 \$ 8,306,132

12 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
13 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
14 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the
15 child care and development block grant. The department shall
16 expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in
17 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
18 with chapter 17A.

19 Sec. 14. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

20 1. If the funds received from the federal government for
21 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the
22 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be
23 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than
24 for the rape prevention program under section 4, subsection 3
25 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according
26 to the percentages that each program is to receive as
27 specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines
28 that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be
29 sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or
30 if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the
31 governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect
32 to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various
33 programs for which the block grants are available.

34 2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for
35 in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

1 a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and
2 house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate
3 chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those
4 committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau
5 shall be notified of the proposed action.

6 b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and
7 information on the reasons why particular percentages or
8 amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the
9 departments and programs affected, and other information
10 deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at
11 least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action
12 before the action is taken.

13 Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

14 1. If funds received from the federal government in the
15 form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in
16 sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, and 13 of this Act, the
17 excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs according
18 to the percentages specified in those sections, except
19 additional funds shall not be prorated for administrative
20 expenses.

21 2. If funds received from the federal government from
22 block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 9 of
23 this Act, 15 percent of the excess shall be allocated to the
24 low-income residential weatherization program.

31 in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement
32 appropriations for maternal and child health programs within
33 the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds,
34 \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care
35 program.

1 Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
2 subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa
3 hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of
4 regents for mobile and regional child health specialty
5 clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall
6 not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds
7 for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment
8 and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional
9 child health specialty clinics.

10 4. Those federal maternal and child health services block
11 grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and
12 health services block grant funds under section 4, subsection
13 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
14 1995, are transferred to the maternal and child health
15 programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional
16 child health specialty clinics according to the percentages
17 specified in subsection 3.

18 5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer
19 the statewide maternal and child health program and the
20 crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional
21 child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities
22 to improve the health of low-income women and children and to
23 promote the welfare of children with actual or potential
24 handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance
25 with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social
26 Security Act.

27 Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES
28 APPROPRIATIONS.

29 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
30 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal
31 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September
32 30, 1996, the following amount:

33 \$ 1,783,899

34 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
35 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the

1 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-531,
2 Title XIX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive
3 health and health services block grant. The department shall
4 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
5 in the federal law making the funds available and in
6 conformance with chapter 17A.

7 Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not
8 exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

9 2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds
10 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa
11 department of public health for administrative expenses in
12 addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

13 3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1,
14 the specific amount of funds stipulated by the notice of block
15 grant award shall be allocated to the rape prevention program.

16 4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 102-531 Title XIX, Subtitle A,
17 as amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in
18 subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the
19 state treasury established under section 8.41, for use by the
20 Iowa department of public health as authorized by Pub. L. No.
21 97-35, Title V, and section 3 of this Act.

22 5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in
23 subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated
24 in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy
25 people 2000/healthy Iowans 2000 program objectives, preventive
26 health advisory committee, and risk reduction services,
27 including nutrition programs, health incentive programs,
28 chronic disease services, emergency medical services,
29 monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up
30 fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome.
31 The moneys used pursuant to this subsection shall not be used
32 by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for the
33 funding of indirect costs. Of the funds used by the
34 department under this subsection, an amount not exceeding
35 \$90,000 shall be used for the monitoring of the fluoridation

1 program and for start-up fluoridation grants to public water
2 systems, and at least \$50,000 shall be used to provide
3 chlamydia testing.

4 Sec. 5. DRUG CONTROL AND SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT GRANT PROGRAM
5 APPROPRIATION.

6 1. There is appropriated from the fund created in section
7 8.41 to the office of the governor for the drug enforcement
8 and abuse prevention coordinator for the federal fiscal year
9 beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the
10 following amount:

11 \$ 5,297,000

12 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated
13 funds to be received from the federal government for the
14 designated fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 100-690 which
15 provides for the drug control and system improvement grant
16 program. The drug enforcement and abuse coordinator shall
17 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
18 in the federal law making the funds available and in
19 conformance with chapter 17A.

20 2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds
21 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the drug
22 enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator for
23 administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this
24 subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement
25 and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of
26 state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use
27 and administration of the state's portion of the funds
28 appropriated in subsection 1.

29 Sec. 6. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

30 1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by
31 section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of
32 the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
33 beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the
34 following amount:

35 \$ 4,216,399

1 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
2 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
3 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
4 VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services
5 block grant. The division of community action agencies of the
6 department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated
7 by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the
8 funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

9 b. The administrator of the division of community action
10 agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not
11 less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to
12 eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting
13 low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a
14 minimum allocation of no less than \$100,000. The minimum
15 allocation shall be achieved by redistributing increased funds

33 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section

35 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September

1 30, 1996, the following amount:

2 \$ 31,501,000

3 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
4 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
5 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
6 III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development
7 block grant. The department of economic development shall
8 expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided
9 in the federal law making the funds available and in
10 conformance with chapter 17A.

11 2. An amount not exceeding \$1,460,000 for the federal
12 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, shall be used by the
13 department of economic development for administrative expenses
14 for the community development block grant. The total amount
15 used for administrative expenses includes \$730,000 for the
16 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, of funds
17 appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from
18 the state equal to \$730,000 from the appropriation of state
19 funds for the community development block grant and state
20 appropriations for related activities of the department of
21 economic development. From the funds set aside for
22 administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of
23 economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an
24 amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
25 administration of the state's portion of the funds
26 appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill
27 the department for the costs of the audit.

28 Sec. 8. EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.

29 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
30 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year
31 beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996, the fol-
32 lowing amount:

33 \$ 4,076,355

34 Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds
35 anticipated to be received from the federal government under

1 Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The
2 department shall expend the funds appropriated by this
3 subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds
4 available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

5 2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection
6 1, not to exceed \$815,271 shall be used by the department for
7 targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students
8 at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and
9 educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out
10 schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and
11 professional development, for programs to enhance personal ex-
12 cellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the
13 ability of teachers and school counselors to identify,
14 particularly in the early grades, students with reading and
15 reading-related problems which place those students at risk
16 for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative
17 projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount

35 Sec. 9. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

1 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
2 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the
3 department of human rights for the federal fiscal year
4 beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the
5 following amount:

6 \$ 23,976,768

7 The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
8 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
9 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
10 XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the
11 low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division
12 of community action agencies of the department of human rights
13 shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as
14 provided in the federal law making the funds available and in
15 conformance with chapter 17A.

16 2. An amount not exceeding \$2,038,025 or 10 percent of the
17 funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may be
18 used for administrative expenses for the low-income home
19 energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be
20 used for administrative expenses of the division of community
21 action agencies of the department of human rights. From the
22 total funds set aside by this subsection for administrative
23 expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program, an
24 amount sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and
25 administration of the state's portion of the funds
26 appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of
27 state shall bill the division of community action agencies for
28 the costs of the audits.

29 3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall
30 be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in ac-
31 cordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of
32 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to
33 meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable
34 portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the
35 funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the

1 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1996, at least 15
2 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be
3 used for low-income residential weatherization or other
4 related home repairs for low-income households. Of this
5 amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for
6 administrative expenses.

7 4. An eligible household must be willing to allow
8 residential weatherization or other related home repairs in
9 order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible
10 household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the
11 landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related
12 home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving
13 home energy assistance.

14 5. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated
15 under subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution
16 of energy problems.

17 Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

18 1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section
19 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal
20 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September
21 30, 1996, the following amount:

22 \$ 30,379,684

23 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
24 anticipated to be received from the federal government for the
25 designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title
26 XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-
27 1397f, which provides for the social services block grant.
28 The department of human services shall expend the funds
29 appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law
30 making the funds available and in conformance with chapter
31 17A.

32 2. Not more than \$1,844,952 of the funds appropriated in
33 subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services
34 for general administration. From the funds set aside by this
35 subsection for general administration, the department of human

1 services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount
2 sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and
3 administration of the state's portion of the funds
4 appropriated in subsection 1.

5 3. In addition to the allocation for general
6 administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds
7 appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the
8 following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal
9 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, for the following
10 programs within the department of human services:

26 Sec. 11. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department
27 of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop
28 a plan for the use of federal social services block grant
29 funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

30 The proposed plan shall include all programs and services
31 at the state level which the department proposes to fund with
32 federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify
33 state and other funds which the department proposes to use to
34 fund the state programs and services.

35 The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and

1 services which are eligible to be funded with federal social
2 services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social
3 services block grant funds available for the local programs
4 and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal
5 social services block grant funds to the counties. The
6 proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will
7 be used to fund the local programs and services.

8 The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's
9 budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

10 Sec. 12. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM
11 HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from
12 the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health
13 administration to provide mental health services for the
14 homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation,
15 and developmental disabilities of the department of human
16 services shall assure that a project which receives funds
17 under the formula grant from either the federal or local match
18 share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to
19 persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who
20 are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless
21 shall do all of the following:

22 1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic
23 services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and
24 rehabilitation services.

25 2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary
26 hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health
27 services and substance abuse services.

28 3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide
29 services to persons targeted by the grant.

30 4. Provide case management to homeless persons.

31 5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain
32 homeless persons living in residential settings which are not
33 otherwise supported.

34 6. Projects may expend funds for housing services
35 including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing,

1 security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance
2 in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing
3 services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless
4 individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental
5 payments to prevent eviction.

6 Sec. 13. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is
7 appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the
8 department of human services for the federal fiscal year
9 beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the
10 following amount:

11 \$ 8,306,132

12 Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds
13 anticipated to be received from the federal government under
14 Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the
15 child care and development block grant. The department shall
16 expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in
17 the federal law making the funds available and in conformance
18 with chapter 17A.

19 Sec. 14. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

20 1. If the funds received from the federal government for
21 the block grants specified in this Act are less than the
22 amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be
23 prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than
24 for the rape prevention program under section 4, subsection 3
25 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according
26 to the percentages that each program is to receive as
27 specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines
28 that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be
29 sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or
30 if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the
31 governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect
32 to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various
33 programs for which the block grants are available.

34 2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for
35 in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

1 a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and
2 house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate

4 committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau
5 shall be notified of the proposed action.

6 b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and
7 information on the reasons why particular percentages or
8 amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the
9 departments and programs affected, and other information
10 deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at
11 least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action
12 before the action is taken.

13 Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

14 1. If funds received from the federal government in the
15 form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in
16 sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, and 13 of this Act, the
17 excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs according
18 to the percentages specified in those sections, except
19 additional funds shall not be prorated for administrative
20 expenses.

21 2. If funds received from the federal government from
22 block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 9 of
23 this Act, 15 percent of the excess shall be allocated to the
24 low-income residential weatherization program.

25 3. If funds received from the federal government from
26 community services block grants exceed the amount appropriated
27 in section 6 of this Act, 100 percent of the excess is
28 allocated to the community services block grant program.

29 Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR CONSOLIDATED, CATEGORICAL, OR
30 EXPANDED FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS. Notwithstanding section 8.41,
31 federal funds made available to the state which are authorized
32 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995,
33 resulting from the federal government consolidating former
34 categorical grants into block grants, or which expand block
35 grants included in Pub. L. No. 97-35, to include additional

1 programs formerly funded by categorical grants, which are not
2 otherwise appropriated by the general assembly, are
3 appropriated for the programs formerly receiving the
4 categorical grants, subject to the conditions of this section.
5 The governor shall, whenever possible, allocate from the block
6 grant to each program in the same proportion as the amount of
7 federal funds received by the program during the federal
8 fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, as modified by the 1995
9 Session of the Seventy-sixth General Assembly for the state
10 fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, compared to the total
11 federal funds received in the federal fiscal year beginning
12 October 1, 1994, by all programs consolidated into the block
13 grant. However, if one agency did not have categorical funds
14 appropriated for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
15 1994, but had anticipated applying for funds during the
16 federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, the governor
17 may allocate the funds in order to provide funding.

18 If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or
19 expanded block grant is less than the total amount of federal
20 funds received for the programs in the form of categorical
21 grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994,
22 state funds appropriated to the program by the general
23 assembly to match the federal funds shall be reduced by the
24 same proportion of the reduction in federal funds for the
25 program. State funds released by the reduction shall be
26 deposited in a special fund in the state treasury and are
27 available for appropriation by the general assembly. The
28 governor shall notify the chairpersons and ranking members of
29 the senate and house standing committees on appropriations,
30 the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of the
31 subcommittees of those committees, and the legislative fiscal
32 director before making the allocation of federal funds or any
33 proportional reduction of state funds under this section. The
34 notice shall state the amount of federal funds to be allocated
35 to each program, the amount of federal funds received by the

1 program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1,
2 1994, the amount by which state funds for the program will be
3 reduced according to this section and the amount of state
4 funds received by the program during the state fiscal year
5 beginning July 1, 1994. Chairpersons notified shall be
6 allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the
7 proposed action before the action is taken.

8 If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or
9 expanded block grant is more than the total amount of federal
10 funds received for the programs in the form of categorical
11 grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994,
12 the excess funds shall be deposited in the special fund
13 created in section 8.41 and are subject to the provisions of
14 that section.

15 Sec. 17. PROCEDURE FOR EXPENDITURE OF ADDITIONAL FEDERAL
16 FUNDS. If other federal grants, receipts, and funds and other
17 nonstate grants, receipts, and funds become available or are
18 awarded which are not available or awarded during the period
19 in which the general assembly is in session, but which require
20 expenditure by the applicable department or agency prior to
21 March 15 of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, and ending
22 June 30, 1996, these grants, receipts, and funds are
23 appropriated to the extent necessary, provided that the fiscal
24 committee of the legislative council is notified within thirty
25 days of receipt of the grants, receipts, or funds and the
26 fiscal committee of the legislative council has an opportunity
27 to comment on the expenditure of the grants, receipts, or
28 funds.

29 Sec. 18. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND LAND STEWARDSHIP.
30 Federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants,
31 receipts, and funds, available in whole or in part for the
32 fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996,
33 are appropriated to the department of agriculture and land
34 stewardship for the purposes set forth in the grants,
35 receipts, or conditions accompanying the receipt of the funds,

1 unless otherwise provided by law.

2 Sec. 19. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE. Federal grants, receipts,
3 and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds,
4 available in whole or in part for the fiscal year beginning
5 July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996, are appropriated to
6 the department of justice for the purposes set forth in the
7 grants, receipts, or conditions accompanying the receipt of
8 the funds, unless otherwise provided by law.

9 Sec. 20. OFFICE OF AUDITOR OF STATE. Federal grants,
10 receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and
11 funds, available in whole or in part for the fiscal year
12 beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996, are
13 appropriated to the office of auditor of state for the
14 purposes set forth in the grants, receipts, or conditions
15 accompanying the receipt of the funds, unless otherwise
16 provided by law.

17 Sec. 21. DEPARTMENT FOR THE BLIND. Federal grants,
18 receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and
19 funds, available in whole or in part for the fiscal year
20 beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996, are
21 appropriated to the department for the blind for the purposes
22 set forth in the grants, receipts, or conditions accompanying
23 the receipt of the funds, unless otherwise provided by law.

24 Sec. 22. CAMPAIGN FINANCE DISCLOSURE COMMISSION. Federal
25 grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants,
26 receipts, and funds, available in whole or in part for the
27 fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996,
28 are appropriated to the campaign finance disclosure commission

AN ACT

APPROPRIATING FEDERAL FUNDS MADE AVAILABLE FROM FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS AND OTHER FEDERAL GRANTS, ALLOCATING PORTIONS OF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS, AND PROVIDING PROCEDURES IF FEDERAL FUNDS ARE MORE OR LESS THAN ANTICIPATED OR IF FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS ARE MORE OR LESS THAN ANTICIPATED OR IF CATEGORICAL GRANTS ARE CONSOLIDATED INTO NEW OR EXISTING BLOCK GRANTS AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE AND RETROACTIVE APPLICABILITY DATE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

Section 1. SUBSTANCE ABUSE APPROPRIATION.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the following amount:

..... \$ 11,190,416

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XIX, Subtitle B, section 202, which provides for the substance abuse prevention and treatment block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding 5 percent shall be used by the department for administrative expenses.

The department shall expend no less than an amount equal to the amount expended for treatment services in state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1994, for pregnant women and women with dependent children.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$24,585 shall be used for audits.

2. The funds remaining from the appropriation made in subsection 1 shall be allocated as follows:

a. At least 20 percent of the allocation shall be for prevention programs.

b. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on drug treatment and prevention activities.

c. At least 35 percent of the allocation shall be spent on alcohol treatment and prevention activities.

3. The substance abuse block grant funds received from the federal government in excess of the amount of the anticipated federal fiscal year 1995-1996 award appropriated in subsection 1 shall be distributed at least 50 percent to treatment programs and 50 percent to prevention programs except that, based upon federal guidelines, the total amount of the excess awarded to prevention programs shall not exceed \$1,000,000.

Sec. 2. COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATION.

1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the following amount:

..... \$ 2,829,397

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the anticipated funds to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-321, Title II, Subpart I, section 1911, which provides for the community mental health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. The administrator of the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall allocate not less than 95 percent of the amount of the block grant to eligible community mental health services providers for carrying out the plan submitted to and approved by the federal substance abuse and mental health services administration for the fiscal year involved.

2. An amount not exceeding 5 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities for the costs of the audits.

Sec. 3. MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the following amount:

..... \$ 6,949,058

The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title V, which provides for the maternal and child health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$45,700 shall be used for audits.

Funds appropriated in this subsection shall not be used by the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics for indirect costs.

2. An amount not exceeding \$150,000 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 to the Iowa department of public health shall be used by the Iowa department of public health for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

The departments of public health, human services, and education and the university of Iowa's mobile and regional child health specialty clinics shall continue to pursue to the maximum extent feasible the coordination and integration of services to women and children.

3. Sixty-three percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to supplement appropriations for maternal and child health programs within the Iowa department of public health. Of these funds, \$284,548 shall be set aside for the statewide perinatal care program.

Thirty-seven percent of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to the university of Iowa hospitals and clinics under the control of the state board of regents for mobile and regional child health specialty clinics. The university of Iowa hospitals and clinics shall not receive an allocation for indirect costs from the funds for this program. Priority shall be given to establishment and maintenance of a statewide system of mobile and regional child health specialty clinics.

4. Those federal maternal and child health services block grant funds transferred from the federal preventive health and health services block grant funds under section 4, subsection 4 of this Act for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, are transferred to the maternal and child health programs and to the university of Iowa's mobile and regional child health specialty clinics according to the percentages specified in subsection 3.

5. The Iowa department of public health shall administer the statewide maternal and child health program and the crippled children's program by conducting mobile and regional child health specialty clinics and conducting other activities to improve the health of low-income women and children and to promote the welfare of children with actual or potential handicapping conditions and chronic illnesses in accordance with the requirements of Title V of the federal Social Security Act.

Sec. 4. PREVENTIVE HEALTH AND HEALTH SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the Iowa department of public health for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the following amount:

..... \$ 1,783,899

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 102-531, Title XIX, Subtitle A, which provides for the preventive health and health services block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, an amount not exceeding \$5,522 shall be used for audits.

2. An amount not exceeding \$94,670 of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the Iowa department of public health for administrative expenses in addition to the amount to be used for audits in subsection 1.

3. Of the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1, the specific amount of funds stipulated by the notice of block grant award shall be allocated to the rape prevention program.

4. Pursuant to Pub. L. No. 102-531 Title XIX, Subtitle A, as amended, 7 percent of the remaining funds appropriated in

subsection 1 is transferred within the special fund in the state treasury established under section 8:41, for use by the Iowa department of public health as authorized by Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title V, and section 3 of this Act.

5. After deducting the funds allocated and transferred in subsections 1, 2, 3, and 4, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department for healthy people 2000/healthy Iowans 2000 program objectives, preventive health advisory committee, and risk reduction services, including nutrition programs, health incentive programs, chronic disease services, emergency medical services, monitoring of the fluoridation program and start-up fluoridation grants, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the drug enforcement and abuse prevention coordinator shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

Sec. 6. COMMUNITY SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. a. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the following amount:

..... \$ 4,216,399

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title VI, Subtitle B, which provides for the community services block grant. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

b. The administrator of the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall allocate not less than 96 percent of the amount of the block grant to eligible community action agencies for programs benefiting low-income persons. Each eligible agency shall receive a minimum allocation of no less than \$100,000. The minimum allocation shall be achieved by redistributing increased funds from agencies experiencing a greater share of available funds. The funds shall be distributed on the basis of the poverty-

level population in the area represented by the community action areas compared to the size of the poverty-level population in the state.

2. An amount not exceeding 4 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for administrative expenses. From the funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses, the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the division of community action agencies for the costs of the audits.

Sec. 7. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of economic development for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the following amount:

..... \$ 31,501,000

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title III, Subtitle A, which provides for the community development block grant. The department of economic development shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding \$1,460,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, shall be used by the department of economic development for administrative expenses for the community development block grant. The total amount used for administrative expenses includes \$730,000 for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, of funds appropriated in subsection 1 and a matching contribution from

the state equal to \$730,000 from the appropriation of state funds for the community development block grant and state appropriations for related activities of the department of economic development. From the funds set aside for administrative expenses by this subsection, the department of economic development shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1. The auditor of state shall bill the department for the costs of the audit.

Sec. 8. EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of education for the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996, the following amount:

Funds appropriated in this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 100-297, Hawkins-Stafford Act, chapter 2. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Twenty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, not to exceed \$815,271 shall be used by the department for targeted assistance to meet the educational needs of students at risk, programs for the acquisition of instructional and educational materials, for innovative programs to carry out schoolwide improvements, for programs of training and professional development, for programs to enhance personal excellence of students, for programs of training to enhance the ability of teachers and school counselors to identify, particularly in the early grades, students with reading and reading-related problems which place those students at risk for illiteracy in their adult years, and for other innovative projects. However, not more than 25 percent of the amount

available for state programs shall be used by the department for state administrative expenses.

3. Eighty percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated by the department to local educational agencies in this state, as local educational agency is defined in Pub. L. No. 100-297. The amount allocated under this subsection shall be allocated to local educational agencies according to the following percentages and enrollments:

a. Eighty percent shall be allocated on the basis of enrollments in public and approved nonpublic schools.

b. Twenty percent shall be allocated to those local educational agencies enrolling the greatest percent of disadvantaged children.

4. Funds appropriated in this section shall not be used to aid schools or programs that illegally discriminate in employment or educational programs on the basis of sex, race, color, national origin, or disability.

Sec. 9. LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the following amount:

..... \$ 23,976,768

The funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXVI, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, which provides for the low-income home energy assistance block grants. The division of community action agencies of the department of human rights shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. An amount not exceeding \$2,038,025 or 10 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, whichever is less, may be

used for administrative expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program. Not more than \$290,000 shall be used for administrative expenses of the division of community action agencies of the department of human rights. From the total funds set aside by this subsection for administrative expenses for the low-income home energy assistance program, an amount sufficient to pay the cost of an audit of the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated is allocated for that purpose. The auditor of state shall bill the division of community action agencies for the costs of the audits.

3. The remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated to help eligible households, as defined in accordance with the federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981, Pub. L. No. 97-35, as amended by Pub. L. No. 98-558, to meet the costs of home energy. After reserving a reasonable portion of the remaining funds not to exceed 10 percent of the funds appropriated in subsection 1, to carry forward into the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1996, at least 15 percent of the funds appropriated by subsection 1 shall be used for low-income residential weatherization or other related home repairs for low-income households. Of this amount, an amount not exceeding 10 percent may be used for administrative expenses.

4. An eligible household must be willing to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs in order to receive home energy assistance. If the eligible household resides in rental property, the unwillingness of the landlord to allow residential weatherization or other related home repairs shall not prevent the household from receiving home energy assistance.

5. Not more than \$1,000,000 of the funds appropriated under subsection 1 shall be used for assessment and resolution of energy problems.

Sec. 10. SOCIAL SERVICES APPROPRIATIONS.

1. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the following amount:

..... \$ 30,379,684

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government for the designated federal fiscal year under Pub. L. No. 97-35, Title XXIII, Subtitle C, as codified in 42 U.S.C. sections 1397-1397f, which provides for the social services block grant. The department of human services shall expend the funds appropriated by this subsection as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

2. Not more than \$1,844,952 of the funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be used by the department of human services for general administration. From the funds set aside by this subsection for general administration, the department of human services shall pay to the auditor of state an amount sufficient to pay the cost of auditing the use and administration of the state's portion of the funds appropriated in subsection 1.

3. In addition to the allocation for general administration in subsection 2, the remaining funds appropriated in subsection 1 shall be allocated in the following amounts to supplement appropriations for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, for the following programs within the department of human services:

Sec. 11. SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PLAN. The department of human services during each state fiscal year shall develop a plan for the use of federal social services block grant funds for the subsequent state fiscal year.

The proposed plan shall include all programs and services at the state level which the department proposes to fund with federal social services block grant funds, and shall identify state and other funds which the department proposes to use to fund the state programs and services.

The proposed plan shall also include all local programs and services which are eligible to be funded with federal social services block grant funds, the total amount of federal social services block grant funds available for the local programs and services, and the manner of distribution of the federal social services block grant funds to the counties. The proposed plan shall identify state and local funds which will be used to fund the local programs and services.

The proposed plan shall be submitted with the department's budget requests to the governor and the general assembly.

Sec. 12. PROJECTS FOR ASSISTANCE IN TRANSITION FROM HOMELESSNESS. Upon receipt of the minimum formula grant from the federal alcohol, drug abuse, and mental health administration to provide mental health services for the homeless, the division of mental health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities of the department of human services shall assure that a project which receives funds under the formula grant from either the federal or local match

share of 25 percent in order to provide outreach services to persons who are chronically mentally ill and homeless or who are subject to a significant probability of becoming homeless shall do all of the following:

1. Provide community mental health services, diagnostic services, crisis intervention services, and habilitation and rehabilitation services.
2. Refer clients to medical facilities for necessary hospital services, and to entities that provide primary health services and substance abuse services.
3. Provide appropriate training to persons who provide services to persons targeted by the grant.
4. Provide case management to homeless persons.
5. Provide supportive and supervisory services to certain homeless persons living in residential settings which are not otherwise supported.
6. Projects may expend funds for housing services including minor renovation, expansion and repair of housing, security deposits, planning of housing, technical assistance in applying for housing, improving the coordination of housing services, the costs associated with matching eligible homeless individuals with appropriate housing, and one-time rental payments to prevent eviction.

Sec. 13. CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT. There is appropriated from the fund created by section 8.41 to the department of human services for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, and ending September 30, 1996, the following amount:

..... \$ 8,306,132

Funds appropriated by this subsection are the funds anticipated to be received from the federal government under Pub. L. No. 101-508, section 5082, which provides for the child care and development block grant. The department shall expend the funds appropriated by this section as provided in the federal law making the funds available and in conformance with chapter 17A.

Sec. 14. PROCEDURE FOR REDUCED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If the funds received from the federal government for the block grants specified in this Act are less than the amounts appropriated, the funds actually received shall be prorated by the governor for the various programs, other than for the rape prevention program under section 4, subsection 3 of this Act, for which each block grant is available according to the percentages that each program is to receive as specified in this Act. However, if the governor determines that the funds allocated by the percentages will not be sufficient to effect the purposes of a particular program, or if the appropriation is not allocated by percentage, the governor may allocate the funds in a manner which will effect to the greatest extent possible the purposes of the various programs for which the block grants are available.

2. Before the governor implements the actions provided for in subsection 1, the following procedures shall be taken:

a. The chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of subcommittees of those committees, and the director of the legislative fiscal bureau shall be notified of the proposed action.

b. The notice shall include the proposed allocations, and information on the reasons why particular percentages or amounts of funds are allocated to the individual programs, the departments and programs affected, and other information deemed useful. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action before the action is taken.

Sec. 15. PROCEDURE FOR INCREASED FEDERAL FUNDS.

1. If funds received from the federal government in the form of block grants exceed the amounts appropriated in sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, and 13 of this Act, the excess shall be prorated to the appropriate programs according to the percentages specified in those sections, except

additional funds shall not be prorated for administrative expenses.

2. If funds received from the federal government from block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 9 of this Act, 15 percent of the excess shall be allocated to the low-income residential weatherization program.

3. If funds received from the federal government from community services block grants exceed the amount appropriated in section 6 of this Act, 100 percent of the excess is allocated to the community services block grant program.

Sec. 16. PROCEDURE FOR CONSOLIDATED, CATEGORICAL, OR EXPANDED FEDERAL BLOCK GRANTS. Notwithstanding section 8.41, federal funds made available to the state which are authorized for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, resulting from the federal government consolidating former categorical grants into block grants, or which expand block grants included in Pub. L. No. 97-35; to include additional programs formerly funded by categorical grants, which are not otherwise appropriated by the general assembly, are appropriated for the programs formerly receiving the categorical grants, subject to the conditions of this section. The governor shall, whenever possible, allocate from the block grant to each program in the same proportion as the amount of federal funds received by the program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, as modified by the 1995 Session of the Seventy-sixth General Assembly for the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, compared to the total federal funds received in the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, by all programs consolidated into the block grant. However, if one agency did not have categorical funds appropriated for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, but had anticipated applying for funds during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1995, the governor may allocate the funds in order to provide funding.

If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or expanded block grant is less than the total amount of federal funds received for the programs in the form of categorical grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, state funds appropriated to the program by the general assembly to match the federal funds shall be reduced by the same proportion of the reduction in federal funds for the program. State funds released by the reduction shall be deposited in a special fund in the state treasury and are available for appropriation by the general assembly. The governor shall notify the chairpersons and ranking members of the senate and house standing committees on appropriations, the appropriate chairpersons and ranking members of the subcommittees of those committees, and the legislative fiscal director before making the allocation of federal funds or any proportional reduction of state funds under this section. The notice shall state the amount of federal funds to be allocated to each program, the amount of federal funds received by the program during the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, the amount by which state funds for the program will be reduced according to this section and the amount of state funds received by the program during the state fiscal year beginning July 1, 1994. Chairpersons notified shall be allowed at least two weeks to review and comment on the proposed action before the action is taken.

If the amount received in the form of a consolidated or expanded block grant is more than the total amount of federal funds received for the programs in the form of categorical grants for the federal fiscal year beginning October 1, 1994, the excess funds shall be deposited in the special fund created in section 8.41 and are subject to the provisions of that section.

Sec. 17. PROCEDURE FOR EXPENDITURE OF ADDITIONAL FEDERAL FUNDS. If other federal grants, receipts, and funds and other nonstate grants, receipts, and funds become available or are

awarded which are not available or awarded during the period in which the general assembly is in session, but which require expenditure by the applicable department or agency prior to March 15 of the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996, these grants, receipts, and funds are appropriated to the extent necessary, provided that the fiscal committee of the legislative council is notified within thirty days of receipt of the grants, receipts, or funds and the fiscal committee of the legislative council has an opportunity to comment on the expenditure of the grants, receipts, or funds.
