- 1 Sec. 4. APPOINTED STATE OFFICERS. The governor shall
- 2 establish a salary for appointed nonelected persons in the
- 3 executive branch of state government holding a position
- 4 enumerated in section 5 of this Act within the range provided,
- 5 by considering, among other items, the experience of the
- 6 individual in the position, changes in the duties of the
- 7 position, the incumbent's performance of assigned duties, and
- 8 subordinates' salaries. However, the attorney general shall
- 9 establish the salary for the consumer advocate, the chief
- 10 justice of the state supreme court shall establish the salary
- 11 for the state court administrator, and the state fair board
- 12 shall establish the salary of the secretary of the state fair
- 13 board, each within the salary range provided in section 5 of
- 14 this Act.
- 15 The governor, in establishing salaries as provided in

- 26 expenses incurred in the performance of duties or fringe
- 27 benefits normally provided to employees of the state.
- 28 Sec. 5. STATE OFFICERS -- SALARY RATES AND RANGES. The
- 29 following annual salary ranges are effective for the positions

- 31 1, 1995, with the pay period beginning June 30, 1995, and for

- 31 distribution by the department of management to the various

- 8 June 30, 1995, shall be increased by 3 percent for the pay
- 9 period beginning June 30, 1995.

9 actual travel in going to and returning from the seat of

10 government by the nearest traveled route for not more than one

13 section-18:117-shall-not-become-effective-for-members-of-the

14 general-assembly-until-the-convening-of-the-next-general

18 3. The speaker of the house, presiding officer of the

19 senate, and the majority and minority floor leader of each

20 house shall each receive an annual salary of twenty-nine

21 thirty-one thousand six hundred dollars for the year 1995 1997

22 and subsequent years while serving in that capacity. The

23 president pro tempore of the senate and the speaker pro

24 tempore of the house shall receive an annual salary of

25 mineteen twenty-one thousand mine seven hundred dollars for

26 the year 1995 1997 and subsequent years while serving in that

27 capacity. Expense and travel allowances shall be the same for

28 the speaker of the house and the presiding officer of the

29 senate, the president pro tempore of the senate and the

30 speaker pro tempore of the house, and the majority and

31 minority leader of each house as provided for other members of

32 the general assembly.

33 6. In addition to the salaries and expenses authorized by

34 this section, members a member of the general assembly shall

35 be paid sixty eighty-six dollars per day, and necessary travel

1 and actual expenses incurred in attending meetings for which

2 per diem or expenses are authorized by law for members of the

- 3 general assembly who serve on statutory boards, commissions,
- 4 or councils, and for standing or interim committee or
- 5 subcommittee meetings subject to the provisions of section
- 6 2.14, or when on authorized legislative business when the
- 7 general assembly is not in session. However, if a member of
- 8 the general assembly is engaged in authorized legislative
- 9 business at a location other than at the seat of government
- 10 during the time the general assembly is in session, payment
- 11 may be made for the actual transportation and lodging costs
- 12 incurred because of the business. Such per diem or expenses
- 13 shall be paid promptly from funds appropriated pursuant to

- 15 7. If a special session of the general assembly is
- 16 convened, members of the general assembly shall receive, in
- 17 addition to their annual salaries, the sum of sixty eighty-six
- 18 dollars per day for each day the general assembly is actually
- 19 in special session, and the same travel allowances and
- 20 expenses as authorized by this section. A member of the
- 21 general assembly shall receive the additional per diem, travel
- 22 allowances and expenses only for the days of attendance during
- 23 a special session.
- Sec. 15. Section 2.40, subsection 1, unnumbered paragraph
- 25 2, Code 1995, is amended to read as follows:
- 26 A member of the general assembly may elect to become a
- 27 member of a state group insurance plan. A member of the
- 28 general assembly may continue membership in a state group
- 29 insurance plan without reapplication during the member's
- 30 tenure as a member of consecutive general assemblies. For the
- 31 purpose of electing to become a member of the state health or
- 32 medical service group insurance plan, a member of the general
- 33 assembly has the status of a "new hire", full-time state
- 34 employee following each election of that member in a general
- 35 or special election, or during the first subsequent annual

1 open enrollment. A member of the general assembly may elect 2 to be a member of a state health or medical group insurance 3 plan or may elect to receive increased per diem costs to pay a 4 continuation of group coverage (COBRA) health or medical group 5 insurance plan. The per diem payment to a member of the 6 general assembly selecting a COBRA health or medical insurance 7 plan shall not increase more than the yearly maximum amount 8 equal to the state's contribution to a health or medical 9 insurance family plan II before taxes are deducted. A member 10 of the general assembly who elects to become a member of a 11 state health or medical group insurance plan shall be exempted 12 from preexisting medical condition waiting periods. A member 13 of the general assembly may change programs or coverage under 14 the state health or medical service group insurance plan 15 during the month of January of odd-numbered years, but program 16 and coverage change selections shall be subject to the 17 enrollment rules established for full-time state employees 18 excluded from collective bargaining as provided in chapter 20. 19 A person who has been a member of the general assembly for two 20 years and who has elected to be a member of a state health or 21 medical group insurance plan may continue to be a member of 22 such state health or medical group insurance plan by 23 requesting continuation in writing to the finance officer 24 within thirty-one days after leaving office. The continuing 25 former member of the general assembly shall pay the total 26 premium for the state plan and shall have the same rights to 27 change programs or coverage as state employees. In the event 28 of the death of a former member of the general assembly who 29 has elected to continue to be a member of a state health or 30 medical group insurance plan, the surviving spouse of the 31 former member whose insurance would otherwise terminate 32 because of the death of the former member may elect to 33 continue to be a member of such state health or medical group 34 insurance plan by requesting continuation in writing to the 35 finance officer within thirty-one days after the death of the

- 1 former member. The surviving spouse of the former member
- 2 shall pay the total premium for the state plan and shall have
- 3 the same rights to change programs or coverage as state
- 4 employees.
- 5 Sec. 16. Section 7G.1, subsection 8, paragraph a, Code
- 6 1995, is amended to read as follows:
- 7 a. The commission may employ personnel, including an
- 8 executive director whose salary shall not exceed executive
- 9 branch pay grade classification 35 40, to administer its
- 10 programs and services. The personnel shall be considered
- 11 state employees.
- 12 Sec. 17. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 14 of this Act takes
- 13 effect upon the convening of the Seventy-seventh General
- 14 Assembly in January 1997.
- 15 EXPLANATION
- 16 This bill relates to and appropriates moneys to fund salary
- 17 adjustments for state elected executive branch officials,
- 18 appointed nonelected officers, justices, judges, magistrates,
- 19 employees subject to collective bargaining agreements, and
- 20 noncontract employees.
- 21 For the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, the salary
- 22 rates of justices, judges, and judicial magistrates are
- 23 increased by approximately 3 percent from the last increase.
- 24 Senior judges receive a salary of \$5,000 under the bill.
- 25 Other state officers and state employees, except the officers
- 26 and employees of the state board of regents, will receive a 3
- 27 percent increase with the pay period beginning June 30, 1995.
- 28 The state employees may also receive merit step increases.
- 29 The salaries for the elected executive officials are set as
- 30 follows: the governor at \$98,200 annually, the attorney
- 31 general at \$93,520 annually, and the lieutenant governor,
- 32 secretary of agriculture, auditor of state, secretary of
- 33 state, and treasurer of state at \$78,050 annually.
- 34 Salary ranges for appointed state officers are increased by
- 35 approximately 3 percent.

The state board of regents officers and employees not under 2 collective bargaining receive similar pay increases to the 3 regents contract employees. The bill funds the salary adjustments for the fiscal year 5 beginning July 1, 1995. Sec. 4. APPOINTED STATE OFFICERS. The governor shall establish a salary for appointed nonelected persons in the executive branch of state government holding a position enumerated in section 5 of this Act within the range provided, by considering, among other items, the experience of the individual in the position, changes in the duties of the position, the incumbent's performance of assigned duties, and subordinates' salaries. However, the attorney general shall establish the salary for the consumer advocate, the chief justice of the state supreme court shall establish the salary for the state fair board shall establish the salary of the secretary of the state fair board, each within the salary range provided in section 5 of this Act.

The governor, in establishing salaries as provided in section 5 of this Act, shall take into consideration other employee benefits which may be provided for an individual including, but not limited to, housing.

A person whose salary is established pursuant to section 5 of this Act and who is a full-time permanent employee of the state shall not receive any other remuneration from the state or from any other source for the performance of that person's duties unless the additional remuneration is first approved by

the governor or authorized by law. However, this provision does not exclude the reimbursement for necessary travel and expenses incurred in the performance of duties or fringe benefits normally provided to employees of the state.

Sec. 5. STATE OFFICERS -- SALARY RATES AND RANGES. The following annual salary ranges are effective for the positions specified in this section for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, with the pay period beginning June 30, 1995, and for subsequent fiscal years until otherwise provided by the general assembly. The governor or other person designated in section 4 of this Act shall determine the salary to be paid to the person indicated at a rate within the salary ranges indicated from funds appropriated by the general assembly for that purpose.

- Sec. 9. STATE EMPLOYEES -- STATE BOARD OF REGENTS. Funds from the appropriation in section 7 of this Act shall be allocated to the state board of regents for the purposes of providing increases for state board of regents employees

covered by section 7 of this Act and for employees not covered by a collective barqaining agreement as follows:

- For regents merit system employees to fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, increases comparable to those provided for similar contract-covered employees in this Act.
- 2. For faculty members and professional and scientific employees to fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, percentage increases comparable to those provided for contract-covered employees in section 7, subsection 6, of this Act.
  - Sec. 10. APPROPRIATIONS FROM ROAD FUNDS.
- 1. There is appropriated from the road use tax fund to the salary adjustment fund for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1996, the following amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be used for the purpose designated:

2. There is appropriated from the primary road fund to the
salary adjustment fund, for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
1995, and ending June 30, 1996, the following amount, or so

- 3. Except as otherwise provided in this Act, the amounts appropriated in subsections 1 and 2 shall be used to fund the annual pay adjustments, expense reimbursements, and related benefits for public employees as provided in this Act.
- Sec. 11. SPECIAL FUNDS -- AUTHORIZATION. To departmental revolving, trust, or special funds, except for the primary road fund or the road use tax fund, for which the general assembly has established an operating budget, a supplemental expenditure authorization is provided, unless otherwise

provided, in an amount necessary to fund salary adjustments as otherwise provided in this Act.

- Sec. 12. GENERAL FUND SALARY MONEYS. Funds appropriated from the general fund of the state in this Act relate only to salaries supported from general fund appropriations of the state except for employees of the state board of regents. It is the intent of the general assembly that the department of management and the legislative fiscal bureau in conjunction with the state agency affected by this section to prepare recommendations concerning the application of this section to the general assembly not later than February 1, 1996.
- Sec. 13. FEDERAL FUNDS APPROPRIATED. All federal grants to and the federal receipts of the agencies affected by this Act which are received and may be expended for purposes of this Act are appropriated for those purposes and as set forth in the federal grants or receipts.
- Sec. 14. Section 2.10, subsections 1, 3, 6, and 7, Code 1995, are amended to read as follows:
- 1. Every member of the general assembly except the presiding officer of the senate, the speaker of the house, the majority and minority floor leader of each house, and the president pro tempore of the senate and speaker pro tempore of the house, shall receive an annual salary of eighteen twenty thousand eight one hundred twenty dollars for the year 1995 1997 and subsequent years while serving as a member of the general assembly. In addition, each such member shall receive the sum of sixty eighty-six dollars per day for expenses of office, except travel, for each day the general assembly is in session commencing with the first day of a legislative session and ending with the day of final adjournment of each legislative session as indicated by the journals of the house and senate, except that if the length of the first regular session of the general assembly exceeds one hundred ten calendar days and the second regular session exceeds one hundred calendar days, the payments shall be made only for one hundred ten calendar days for the first session and one hundred calendar days for the second session. However,

members Members from Polk county shall receive forty-five sixty-five dollars per day. Each member shall receive a one two hundred twenty-five dollar per month allowance for legislative district constituency postage, travel, telephone costs, and other expenses. Travel expenses shall be paid at the rate established by section 18.117 for actual travel in going to and returning from the seat of government by the nearest traveled route for not more than one time per week during a legislative session. However,-any-increase-from-time to-time-in-the-mileage-rate-established-by-section-18.117 shall-not-become-effective-for-members-of-the-general-assembly until-the-convening-of-the-next-general-assembly-following-the session-in-which-the-increase-is-adopted;-and-this-provision shall-prevail-over-any-inconsistent-provision-of-any-present or-future-statute.

- 3. The speaker of the house, presiding officer of the senate, and the majority and minority floor leader of each house shall each receive an annual salary of twenty-nine thirty-one thousand thirty dollars for the year 1995 1997 and subsequent years while serving in that capacity. The president pro tempore of the senate and the speaker pro tempore of the house shall receive an annual salary of nineteen twenty-one thousand nine two hundred ninety dollars for the year 1995 1997 and subsequent years while serving in that capacity. Expense and travel allowances shall be the same for the speaker of the house and the presiding officer of the senate, the president pro tempore of the senate and the speaker pro tempore of the house, and the majority and minority leader of each house as provided for other members of the general assembly.
- 6. In addition to the salaries and expenses authorized by this section, members a member of the general assembly shall be paid sixty eighty-six dollars per day, and necessary travel and actual expenses incurred in attending meetings for which per diem or expenses are authorized by law for members of the general assembly who serve on statutory boards, commissions, or councils, and for standing or interim committee or

subcommittee meetings subject to the provisions of section 2.14, or when on authorized legislative business when the general assembly is not in session. However, if a member of the general assembly is engaged in authorized legislative business at a location other than at the seat of government during the time the general assembly is in session, payment may be made for the actual transportation and lodging costs incurred because of the business. Such per diem or expenses shall be paid promptly from funds appropriated pursuant to section 2.12.

7. If a special session of the general assembly is convened, members of the general assembly shall receive, in addition to their annual salaries, the sum of sixty eighty-six dollars per day for each day the general assembly is actually in special session, and the same travel allowances and expenses as authorized by this section. A member of the general assembly shall receive the additional per diem, travel allowances and expenses only for the days of attendance during a special session.

Sec. 15. Section 2.40, subsection 1, unnumbered paragraph
2, Code 1995, is amended to read as follows:

A member of the general assembly may elect to become a member of a state group insurance plan. A member of the general assembly may continue membership in a state group insurance plan without reapplication during the member's tenure as a member of consecutive general assemblies. For the purpose of electing to become a member of the state health or medical service group insurance plan, a member of the general assembly has the status of a "new hire", full-time state employee following each election of that member in a general or special election, or during the first subsequent annual open enrollment. In lieu of membership in a state health or medical group insurance plan, a member of the general assembly may elect to receive reimbursement for the costs paid by the member for a continuation of a group coverage (COBRA) health or medical insurance plan. The member shall apply for reimbursement by submitting evidence of payment for a COBRA

health or medical insurance plan. The maximum reimbursement shall be no greater than the state's contribution for health or medical insurance family plan II. A member of the general assembly who elects to become a member of a state health or medical group insurance plan shall be exempted from preexisting medical condition waiting periods. A member of the general assembly may change programs or coverage under the state health or medical service group insurance plan during the month of January of odd-numbered years, but program and coverage change selections shall be subject to the enrollment rules established for full-time state employees excluded from collective bargaining as provided in chapter 20. A person who has been a member of the general assembly for two years and who has elected to be a member of a state health or medical group insurance plan may continue to be a member of such state health or medical group insurance plan by requesting continuation in writing to the finance officer within thirtyone days after leaving office. The continuing former member of the general assembly shall pay the total premium for the state plan and shall have the same rights to change programs or coverage as state employees. In the event of the death of a former member of the general assembly who has elected to continue to be a member of a state health or medical group insurance plan, the surviving spouse of the former member whose insurance would otherwise terminate because of the death of the former member may elect to continue to be a member of such state health or medical group insurance plan by requesting continuation in writing to the finance officer within thirty-one days after the death of the former member. The surviving spouse of the former member shall pay the total premium for the state plan and shall have the same rights to change programs or coverage as state employees.

Sec. 16. Section 7G.1, subsection 8, paragraph a, Code 1995, is amended to read as follows:

a. The commission may employ personnel, including an executive director whose salary shall not exceed executive branch pay grade classification 35 40, to administer its

programs and services. The personnel shall be considered state employees.

Sec. 17. EFFECTIVE DATE. Section 14 of this Act takes effect upon the convening of the Seventy-seventh General Assembly in January 1997.
