

	A BILL FOR							
2	An Act relating to the establishment of an early childhood and elementary education improvement program and making an appropriation. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:							
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- 1 Section 1. <u>NEW SECTION</u>. 256D.1 LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND 2 INTENT.
- 3 It is the intent of the general assembly to provide
- 4 assistance to enable public school districts to work with
- 5 local community collaborative efforts to reduce gaps in
- 6 service and eliminate duplication in meeting the needs of
- 7 children from birth through grade three. These needs, at a
- 8 minimum, include child development, child care, children's
- 9 health and safety, and parent education needs. Therefore, the
- 10 general assembly finds that it is in the best interest of the
- 11 state to encourage and fund early childhood and elementary
- 12 education programs focused on children from birth through
- 13 grade three in the school districts. The goal of these
- 14 programs is to improve student achievement in the basic
- 15 educational subject matters, such as reading, language arts,
- 16 and mathematics, and to accomplish proficiency in those
- 17 subjects by grade four. Toward that goal, it is the intent of
- 18 this chapter to establish and fund an early childhood and
- 19 elementary education improvement program.
- 20 Sec. 2. NEW SECTION. 256D.2 EARLY CHILDHOOD AND
- 21 ELEMENTARY EDUCATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM APPROPRIATION.
- 22 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the
- 23 state to the department of education for the fiscal year
- 24 beginning July 1, 1998, and for each succeeding fiscal year,
- 25 the sum of thirty million dollars for the early childhood and
- 26 elementary education improvement program.
- 27 2. For each fiscal year for which moneys are appropriated
- 28 in subsection 1, the amount of moneys allocated to school
- 29 districts shall be in the proportion that the basic enrollment
- 30 of a district bears to the sum of the basic enrollments of all
- 31 school districts in the state for the budget year. However, a
- 32 district shall not receive less than twenty-five thousand
- 33 dollars in a fiscal year. The Iowa braille and sight saving
- 34 school, the Iowa school for the deaf, and the Price laboratory
- 35 school at the university of northern Iowa shall annually



- 3. For each year for which an appropriation is made to the 4 early childhood and elementary education improvement program,
- 5 the department of education shall notify the department of
- 6 revenue and finance of the amount to be paid to each school
- 7 district based upon the distribution plan set forth for the
- 8 appropriation made pursuant to this section. The allocation
- 9 to each school district under this section shall be made in
- 10 one payment on or about October 15 of the fiscal year for
- ll which the appropriation is made, taking into consideration the
- 12 relative budget and cash position of the state resources.
- 4. Moneys received under this section shall not be
- 14 commingled with state aid payments made under section 257.16
- 15 to a school district and shall be accounted for by the school
- 16 district separately from state aid payments.
- 5. Moneys received under this section shall supplement and
- 18 not supplant existing moneys or moneys otherwise received and
- 19 used by the school district for similar early childhood or
- 20 elementary education purposes.
- 21 6. Payments made to school districts under this section
- 22 are miscellaneous income for purposes of chapter 257 and are
- 23 considered encumbered. Each school district shall maintain a
- 24 separate listing within its budget for payments received and
- 25 expenditures made pursuant to this section.
- 7. Moneys received under this section shall not be used
- 27 for payment of any collective bargaining agreement or
- 28 arbitrator's decision negotiated or awarded under chapter 20.
- 29 8. For purposes of this chapter, "school district" means a
- 30 public school district, the Iowa braille and sight saving
- 31 school, the Iowa school for the deaf, and the Price laboratory
- 32 school at the university of northern Iowa.
- 33 Sec. 3. NEW SECTION. 256D.3 EARLY CHILDHOOD AND
- 34 ELEMENTARY EDUCATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM -- REPORTS.
- 35 l. By July 1, 1999, and by July 1 of each succeeding year,

- l each school district shall submit to the department of
- 2 education an annual report that describes the ways in which
- 3 the school district used the moneys received under this
- 4 chapter for early childhood and elementary education
- 5 improvement purposes.
- 6 2. By July 1, 1999, and by July 1 of each succeeding year,
- 7 the Iowa braille and sight saving school, the Iowa school for
- 8 the deaf, and the Price laboratory school at the university of
- 9 northern Iowa, shall each submit to the state board of regents
- 10 and department of education an annual report that describes
- 11 the ways in which the moneys received under this chapter for
- 12 early childhood and elementary education improvement purposes
- 13 were used.
- 14 3. The department shall submit, to the chairpersons and
- 15 ranking members of the house and senate education committees
- 16 by January 1, 2000, a report summarizing the ways in which the
- 17 school districts are making use of the moneys received under
- 18 this chapter. The department shall make the report available
- 19 to school districts upon request.
- 20 Sec. 4. NEW SECTION. 256D.4 EARLY CHILDHOOD AND
- 21 ELEMENTARY EDUCATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM EXPENDITURES.
- 22 1. School districts shall expend funds received pursuant
- 23 to section 256D.2 to support education practices, programs, or
- 24 assistance for children from birth through grade three that
- 25 include, but are not limited to, the following: preschool
- 26 services provided on a voluntary basis to four-year-old
- 27 children deemed at risk of not succeeding in elementary
- 28 school, in accordance with criteria established for the
- 29 definition of at-risk children by the child development
- 30 coordinating council; parent education programs provided on a
- 31 voluntary basis to parents of children from birth through
- 32 grade three; children's services relating to child development
- 33 and school readiness, child care, and children's health and
- 34 safety; all-day, everyday, kindergarten; reducing adult-to-
- 35 student ratios through the hiring of teachers and adult



- l teaching assistants; volunteer coordinator programs;
- 2 implementation of instructional programs designed to improve
- 3 student achievement in the areas of reading, language arts,
- 4 and mathematics; parental involvement programs; and
- 5 contributions toward implementation of an extended school day 6 or year program.
- 7 2. Funds expended in accordance with this chapter may be
- 8 used to support education practices, programs, or assistance
- 9 for children from birth through grade three, as provided in
- 10 this section, that may be located in buildings other than a
- 11 building owned or leased by the school district.
- 12 3. School districts expending program funds to support
- 13 education practices, programs, or assistance for children from
- 14 birth through age four shall consult with the departments of
- 15 public health and human services in developing and
- 16 implementing the practices, programs, or assistance.

17 EXPLANATION

- This bill establishes an early childhood and elementary
- 19 education improvement program, focused on children from birth
- 20 through grade three, with an annual appropriation of \$30
- 21 million from the state general fund to the department of
- 22 education.
- 23 The bill includes legislative intent to provide assistance
- 24 to enable public school districts to work with local community
- 25 collaborative efforts to reduce gaps in service and eliminate
- 26 duplication in meeting the needs of children from birth
- 27 through grade three. The general assembly finds, according to
- 28 the bill, that it is in the best interest of the state to
- 29 encourage and fund early childhood and elementary education
- 30 programs in public school districts. The bill defines the
- 31 goals of an eligible program and lists the components of early
- 32 childhood and elementary education practices and programs for
- 33 which state funding may be expended.
- 34 The bill provides for a per pupil annual distribution of
- 35 the funds appropriated, but stipulates that a school district

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1 shall receive no less than $25,000. The bill defines the term
2 "school district" to include public school districts, the Iowa
3 braille and sight saving school, the Iowa school for the deaf, ...
4 and the Price laboratory school at the university of northern
 5 Iowa.
      The bill requires that school districts report to the
 6
 7 appropriate state agencies ways in which the moneys received
8 under the program were spent by the school districts. The
9 bill also requires the department of education to submit to
10 the chairpersons and ranking members of the house and senate
11 committees on education reports summarizing the ways school
12 districts are using program moneys.
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
